COMES NOW, Plaintiff MANOLSA CHARLES (“Plaintiff”), individually, and on behalf of other members of the general public similarly situated, and alleges as follows:

JURISDICTION AND VENUE

1. This class action is brought pursuant to the California Code of Civil Procedure section 382. The monetary damages and restitution sought by Plaintiff exceed the minimal jurisdiction limits of the Superior Court and will be established according to proof at trial.

2. This Court has jurisdiction over this action pursuant to the California Constitution, Article VI, Section 10, which grants the superior court “original jurisdiction in all other causes” except those given by statute to other courts. The statutes under which this action is brought do not specify any other basis for jurisdiction.

3. This Court has jurisdiction over Defendant because, upon information and belief, Defendant is a citizen of California, has sufficient minimum contacts in California, or otherwise intentionally avails itself of the California market so as to render the exercise of jurisdiction over them by the California courts consistent with traditional notions of fair play and substantial justice.

4. Venue is proper in this Court because, upon information and belief, Defendant maintains offices, has agents, and/or transacts business in the State of California, including the County of Los Angeles. The majority of the acts and omissions alleged herein relating to Plaintiff took place in the State of California, County of Los Angeles. Defendant employed Plaintiff within the State of California, County of Los Angeles.

PARTIES

5. Plaintiff MANOLSA CHARLES is an individual residing in the State of California, County of Los Angeles.

6. Defendant QX LOGISTIX LLC, at all times herein mentioned, was and is, upon information and belief, a Delaware limited liability company headquartered in the State of California, and at all times herein mentioned, was and is, an employer whose employees are engaged throughout the State of California, including the County of Los Angeles.

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1 7. At all relevant times, Defendant QX LOGISTIX LLC was the “employer” of
2 Plaintiff within the meaning of all applicable California laws and statutes.

3 8. At all times herein relevant, Defendant QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1
4 through 100, and each of them, were the agents, partners, joint venturers, joint employers,
5 representatives, servants, employees, successors-in-interest, co-conspirators and assigns, each
6 of the other, and at all times relevant hereto were acting within the course and scope of their
7 authority as such agents, partners, joint venturers, joint employers, representatives, servants,
8 employees, successors-in-interest, co-conspirators and assigns, and all acts or omissions
9 alleged herein were duly committed with the ratification, knowledge, permission,
10 encouragement, authorization, and consent of each defendant designated herein.

11 9. The true names and capacities, whether corporate, associate, individual or
12 otherwise, of Defendants DOES 1 through 100, inclusive, are unknown to Plaintiff, who sues
13 said defendants by such fictitious names. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based on that
14 information and belief alleges, that each of the Defendants designated as a DOE is legally
15 responsible for the events and happenings referred to in this Complaint, and unlawfully caused
16 the injuries and damages to Plaintiff and the other class members as alleged in this Complaint.
17 Plaintiff will seek leave of court to amend this Complaint to show the true names and
18 capacities when the same have been ascertained.

19 10. Defendant QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1 through 100 will hereinafter
20 collectively be referred to as “Defendants.”

21 11. Plaintiff further alleges that Defendants directly or indirectly controlled or
22 affected the working conditions, wages, working hours, and conditions of employment of
23 Plaintiff and the other class members so as to make each of said Defendants and employers
24 liable under the statutory provisions set forth herein.

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1 **CLASS ACTION ALLEGATIONS**

2 12. Plaintiff brings this action individually and on behalf of all other members of the
3 general public similarly situated, and, thus, seeks class certification under Code of Civil
4 Procedure section 382.

5 13. The proposed class is defined as follows:

6 All current and former hourly-paid or non-exempt employees of Defendants
7 within the State of California at any time during the period from four years prior
8 to the filing of this Complaint to final judgment.

9 14. Plaintiff reserves the right to establish subclasses as appropriate.

10 15. The class is ascertainable and there is a well-defined community of interest in
11 the litigation:

12 a. Numerosity: The class members are so numerous that joinder of all class
13 members is impracticable. The membership of the entire class is
14 unknown to Plaintiff at this time; however, the class is estimated to be
15 greater than fifty (50) individuals and the identity of such membership is
16 readily ascertainable by inspection of Defendants' employment records.

17 b. Typicality: Plaintiff's claims are typical of all other class members'
18 claims as demonstrated herein. Plaintiff will fairly and adequately protect
19 the interests of the other class members with whom Plaintiff has a well-
20 defined community of interest.

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1 c. Adequacy: Plaintiff will fairly and adequately protect the interests of
2 each class member, with whom Plaintiff has a well-defined community
3 of interest and typicality of claims, as demonstrated herein. Plaintiff has
4 no interest that is antagonistic to the other class members. Plaintiff's
5 attorneys, the proposed class counsel, are versed in the rules governing
6 class action discovery, certification, and settlement. Plaintiff has
7 incurred, and during the pendency of this action will continue to incur,
8 costs and attorneys' fees, that have been, are, and will be necessarily
9 expended for the prosecution of this action for the substantial benefit of
10 each class member.

11 d. Superiority: A class action is superior to other available methods for the
12 fair and efficient adjudication of this litigation because individual joinder
13 of all class members is impractical.

14 e. Public Policy Considerations: Certification of this lawsuit as a class
15 action will advance public policy objectives. Employers of this great
16 state violate employment and labor laws every day. Current employees
17 are often afraid to assert their rights out of fear of direct or indirect
18 retaliation. However, class actions provide the class members who are
19 not named in the complaint anonymity that allows for the vindication of
20 their rights.

21 16. There are common questions of law and fact as to the class members that
22 predominate over questions affecting only individual members. The following common
23 questions of law or fact, among others, exist as to the members of the class:

24 a. Whether Defendants' failure to pay wages, without abatement or
25 reduction, in accordance with the California Labor Code, was willful;

26 b. Whether Defendants failed to pay their hourly-paid or non-exempt
27 employees within the State of California for all hours worked;

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- 1 c. Whether Defendants required Plaintiff and the other class members to
2 work over eight (8) hours per day and/or over forty (40) hours per week
3 and failed to pay the legally required overtime compensation to Plaintiff
4 and the other class members;
- 5 d. Whether Defendants properly calculated the regular rate for Plaintiff and
6 the other class members who worked overtime and earned incentive pay;
- 7 e. Whether Defendants failed to provide Plaintiff and the other class
8 members legally mandated meal and/or rest periods and failed to
9 compensate them the related premium wages pursuant to California
10 Labor Code section 226.7(c);
- 11 f. Whether Defendants failed to pay minimum wages to Plaintiff and the
12 other class members for all hours worked;
- 13 g. Whether Defendants failed to pay all wages due to class members within
14 the required time upon their discharge or resignation;
- 15 h. Whether Defendants failed to timely pay all wages due to Plaintiff and
16 the other class members during their employment;
- 17 i. Whether Defendants complied with wage reporting as required by the
18 California Labor Code, including, *inter alia*, section 226;
- 19 j. Whether Defendants failed to keep complete or accurate payroll records
20 for Plaintiff and the other class members;
- 21 k. Whether Defendants failed to reimburse Plaintiff and the other class
22 members for necessary business-related expenses and costs;
- 23 l. Whether Defendants' conduct was willful or reckless;
- 24 m. Whether Defendants engaged in unfair business practices in violation of
25 California Business & Professions Code sections 17200, *et seq.*;
- 26 n. The appropriate amount of damages, restitution, and/or monetary
27 penalties resulting from Defendants' violation of California law; and
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o. Whether Plaintiff and the other class members are entitled to compensatory damages pursuant to the California Labor Code.

GENERAL ALLEGATIONS

17. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants employed Plaintiff and other persons as hourly-paid or non-exempt employees within the State of California, including the County of Los Angeles.

18. Defendants, jointly and severally, employed Plaintiff as an hourly-paid non-exempt employee during the relevant time period in the State of California, County of Los Angeles.

19. Defendants had the authority to hire and terminate Plaintiff and the other class members; to set work rules and conditions governing Plaintiff's and other class members' employment; and to supervise their daily employment activities.

20. Defendants exercised sufficient authority over the terms and conditions of Plaintiff's and other class members' employment for them to be joint employers of Plaintiff and the other class members.

21. Defendants directly hired and paid wages and benefits to Plaintiff and the other class members.

22. Defendants continue to employ hourly-paid or non-exempt employees within the State of California.

23. Plaintiff and the other class members worked over eight (8) hours in a day, and/or forty (40) hours in a week during their employment with Defendants.

24. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants engaged in a uniform policy and systematic scheme of wage abuse against their hourly-paid or non-exempt employees within the State of California. This scheme involved, *inter alia*, failing to pay them for all hours worked, and failing to provide legally mandated meal and rest breaks or pay related premium wages, in violation of California law.

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1 25. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
2 knew or should have known that Plaintiff and the other class members were entitled to receive
3 certain wages for overtime compensation and that Plaintiff and the other class members were
4 not receiving wages for overtime compensation.

5 26. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
6 failed to provide Plaintiff and the other class members the required rest and meal periods
7 during the relevant time period as required under the Industrial Welfare Commission (“IWC”)
8 Wage Orders and thus they are entitled to any and all applicable penalties.

9 27. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
10 knew or should have known that Plaintiff and the other class members were entitled to receive
11 all timely and complete meal periods or payment of one additional hour of pay at Plaintiff’s
12 and the other class members’ regular rate of pay when a meal period was missed, late or
13 interrupted, and that Plaintiff and the other class members did not receive all timely and proper
14 meal periods or payment of one additional hour of pay at their regular rate of pay when a meal
15 period was missed.

16 28. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
17 knew or should have known that Plaintiff and other class members were entitled to receive all
18 timely rest periods without interruption or payment of one additional hour of pay at Plaintiff’s
19 and the other class members’ regular rate of pay when a rest period was missed, late or
20 interrupted, and that Plaintiff and the other class members did not receive all rest periods or
21 payment of one additional hour of pay at their regular rate of pay when a rest period was
22 missed.

23 29. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
24 knew or should have known that Plaintiff and the other class members were entitled to receive
25 at least minimum wages for compensation and that Plaintiff and the other class members were
26 not receiving at least minimum wages for all hours worked.

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1 30. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
2 knew or should have known that class members were entitled to receive the wages owed to
3 them upon discharge or resignation, including overtime and minimum wages and meal and
4 rest period premiums, and that class members did not, in fact, receive such wages owed to
5 them at the time of their discharge or resignation.

6 31. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
7 knew or should have known that Plaintiff and the other class members were entitled to receive
8 their wages within a specified time period during their employment, and that Plaintiff and the
9 other class members did not, in fact, receive such wages within the specified time period
10 during their employment.

11 32. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
12 knew or should have known that Plaintiff and the other class members were entitled to receive
13 complete and accurate wage statements in accordance with California law, but, in fact,
14 Plaintiff and the other class members did not receive complete and accurate wage statements
15 from Defendants. The deficiencies included, *inter alia*, the failure to include the total number
16 of hours worked by Plaintiff and the other class members.

17 33. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
18 knew or should have known that they had to keep complete and accurate payroll records for
19 Plaintiff and the other class members in accordance with California law, but, in fact, did not
20 keep complete and accurate payroll records for Plaintiff and the other class members.

21 34. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
22 knew or should have known that Plaintiff and the other class members were entitled to
23 reimbursement for necessary business-related expenses.

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1 35. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants
2 knew or should have known that they had a duty to compensate Plaintiff and the other class
3 members pursuant to California law, and that Defendants had the financial ability to pay such
4 compensation, but willfully, knowingly, and intentionally failed to do so, and falsely
5 represented to Plaintiff and the other class members that they were properly denied wages, all
6 in order to increase Defendants' profits.

7 36. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to pay
8 overtime wages to Plaintiff and the other class members for all hours worked. Plaintiff and
9 other class members were required to work more than eight (8) hours per day and/or forty (40)
10 hours per week without overtime compensation.

11 37. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to provide the
12 requisite uninterrupted and timely meal and rest periods to Plaintiff and the other class
13 members and failed to compensate them the related premium wages.

14 38. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to pay
15 Plaintiff and the other class members at least minimum wages for all hours worked.

16 39. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to pay class
17 members the wages owed to them upon discharge or resignation.

18 40. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to pay
19 Plaintiff and the other class members wages within a specified time period during their
20 employment.

21 41. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to provide
22 complete or accurate wage statements to Plaintiff and the other class members.

23 42. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to keep
24 complete or accurate payroll records for Plaintiff and the other class members.

25 43. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to reimburse
26 Plaintiff and the other class members for necessary business-related expenses.

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44. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to properly compensate Plaintiff and the other class members pursuant to California law in order to increase Defendants' profits.

45. California Labor Code section 218 states that nothing in Article 1 of the Labor Code shall limit the right of any wage claimant to “sue directly . . . for any wages or penalty due to him [or her] under this article.”

FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

(Violation of California Labor Code §§ 510 and 1198)

(Against QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1 through 100)

46. Plaintiff incorporates by reference the allegations contained in Paragraphs 1 through 45, and each and every part thereof with the same force and effect as though fully set forth herein.

47. California Labor Code section 1198 and the applicable IWC Wage Order provide that it is unlawful to employ persons without compensating them at a rate of pay either time-and-one-half or two-times that person's regular rate of pay, depending on the number of hours worked by the person on a daily or weekly basis.

48. Specifically, the applicable IWC Wage Order provides that Defendants are and were required to pay Plaintiff and the other class members employed by Defendants, who work(ed) more than eight (8) hours in a day or more than forty (40) hours in a workweek, at the rate of time-and-one-half for all hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours in a day or more than forty (40) hours in a workweek.

49. The applicable IWC Wage Order further provides that Defendants are and were required to pay Plaintiff and the other class members overtime compensation at a rate of two times their regular rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of twelve (12) hours in a day.

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1 50. California Labor Code section 510 codifies the right to overtime compensation
2 at one-and-one-half times the regular hourly rate for hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours
3 in a day or forty (40) hours in a week or for the first eight (8) hours worked on the seventh
4 day of work, and overtime compensation at twice the regular hourly rate for hours worked in
5 excess of twelve (12) hours in a day or in excess of eight (8) hours in a day on the seventh day
6 of work.

7 51. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Plaintiff and the other class
8 members worked in excess of eight (8) hours in a day, and/or in excess of forty (40) hours in
9 a week.

10 52. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants intentionally and
11 willfully failed to pay overtime wages owed to Plaintiff and the other class members.

12 53. Defendants' failure to pay Plaintiff and the other class members the unpaid
13 balance of overtime compensation, as required by California laws, violates the provisions of
14 California Labor Code sections 510 and 1198, and is therefore unlawful.

15 54. Pursuant to California Labor Code section 1194, Plaintiff and the other class
16 members are entitled to recover unpaid overtime compensation, as well as interest, costs, and
17 attorneys' fees.

18 **SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION**

19 **(Violation of California Labor Code §§ 226.7 and 512(a))**

20 **(Against QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1 through 100)**

21 55. Plaintiff incorporates by reference the allegations contained in paragraphs 1
22 through 54, and each and every part thereof with the same force and effect as though fully set
23 forth herein.

24 56. During the relevant time period set forth herein, the IWC Wage Order and
25 California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512(a) were applicable to Plaintiff's and the other
26 class members' employment by Defendants.

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1 57. During the relevant time period set forth herein, California Labor Code section
2 226.7 provides that no employer shall require an employee to work during any meal or rest
3 period mandated by an applicable order of the California IWC.

4 58. During the relevant time period set forth herein, the applicable IWC Wage Order
5 and California Labor Code section 512(a) provide that an employer may not require, cause or
6 permit an employee to work for a work period of more than five (5) hours per day without
7 providing the employee with a meal period of not less than thirty (30) minutes, except that if
8 the total work period per day of the employee is no more than six (6) hours, the meal period
9 may be waived by mutual consent of both the employer and employee.

10 59. During the relevant time period set forth herein, the applicable IWC Wage Order
11 and California Labor Code section 512(a) further provide that an employer may not require,
12 cause, or permit an employee to work for a work period of more than ten (10) hours per day
13 without providing the employee with a second uninterrupted meal period of not less than thirty
14 (30) minutes, except that if the total hours worked is no more than twelve (12) hours, the
15 second meal period may be waived by mutual consent of the employer and the employee only
16 if the first meal period was not waived.

17 60. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Plaintiff and the other class
18 members who were scheduled to work for a period of time no longer than six (6) hours, and
19 who did not waive their legally-mandated meal periods by mutual consent, were required to
20 work for periods longer than five (5) hours without an uninterrupted meal period of not less
21 than thirty (30) minutes and/or without a rest period.

22 61. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Plaintiff and the other class
23 members who were scheduled to work for a period of time no longer than twelve (12) hours,
24 and who did not waive their legally-mandated meal periods by mutual consent, were required
25 to work for periods longer than ten (10) hours without an uninterrupted meal period of not less
26 than thirty (30) minutes and/or without a rest period.

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62. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Plaintiff and the other class members who were scheduled to work for a period of time in excess of six (6) hours were required to work for periods longer than five (5) hours without an uninterrupted meal period of not less than thirty (30) minutes and/or without a rest period.

63. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Plaintiff and the other class members who were scheduled to work for a period of time in excess of twelve (12) hours were required to work for periods longer than ten (10) hours without an uninterrupted meal period of not less than thirty (30) minutes and/or without a rest period.

64. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants intentionally and willfully required Plaintiff and the other class members to work during meal periods and failed to compensate Plaintiff and the other class members the full meal period premium for work performed during meal periods.

65. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to pay Plaintiff and the other class members the full meal period premium due pursuant to California Labor Code section 226.7.

66. Defendants' conduct violates the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512(a).

67. Pursuant to the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor Code section 226.7(c), Plaintiff and the other class members are entitled to recover from Defendants one additional hour of pay at the employee's regular rate of compensation for each workday that the meal period was not provided.

THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION

(Violation of California Labor Code § 226.7)

(Against QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1 through 100)

68. Plaintiff incorporates by reference the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 67, and each and every part thereof with the same force and effect as though fully set forth herein.

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69. During the relevant time period set forth herein, the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor Code section 226.7 were applicable to Plaintiff's and the other class members' employment by Defendants.

70. During the relevant time period set forth herein, California Labor Code section 226.7 provides that no employer shall require an employee to work during any rest period mandated by an applicable order of the California IWC.

71. During the relevant time period set forth herein, the applicable IWC Wage Order provides that "[e]very employer shall authorize and permit all employees to take rest periods, which insofar as practicable shall be in the middle of each work period" and that the "rest period time shall be based on the total hours worked daily at the rate of ten (10) minutes net rest time per four (4) hours or major fraction thereof" unless the total daily work time is less than three and one-half (3 ½) hours.

72. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants required Plaintiff and the other class members to work four (4) or more hours without authorizing or permitting a ten (10) minute rest period per each four (4) hour period worked.

73. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants willfully required Plaintiff and the other class members to work during rest periods and failed to pay Plaintiff and the other class members the full rest period premium for work performed during rest periods.

74. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to pay Plaintiff and the other class members the full rest period premium due pursuant to California Labor Code section 226.7.

75. Defendants' conduct violates applicable IWC Wage Orders and California Labor Code section 226.7.

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1 76. Pursuant to the applicable IWC Wage Orders and California Labor Code section
2 226.7(c), Plaintiff and the other class members are entitled to recover from Defendants one
3 additional hour of pay at the employees' regular hourly rate of compensation for each workday
4 that the rest period was not provided.

5 **FOURTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

6 **(Violation of California Labor Code §§ 1194 and 1197)**

7 **(Against QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1 through 100)**

8 77. Plaintiff incorporates by reference the allegations contained in paragraphs 1
9 through 76 and each and every part thereof with the same force and effect as though fully set
10 forth herein.

11 78. During the relevant time period set forth herein, California Labor Code sections
12 1194 and 1197 provide that the minimum wage to be paid to employees, and the payment of
13 a lesser wage than the minimum so fixed, is unlawful.

14 79. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants failed to pay
15 minimum wages to Plaintiff and the other class members as required, pursuant to California
16 Labor Code sections 1194 and 1197.

17 80. Defendants' failure to pay Plaintiff and the other class members the minimum
18 wage as required violates California Labor Code sections 1194 and 1197. Pursuant to those
19 sections, Plaintiff and other class members are entitled to recover the unpaid balance of their
20 minimum wage compensation as well as interest, costs, and attorneys' fees, and liquidated
21 damages in an amount equal to the wages unlawfully unpaid and interest thereon.

22 81. Pursuant to California Labor Code section 1194.2, Plaintiff and the other class
23 members are entitled to recover liquidated damages in an amount equal to the wages
24 unlawfully unpaid and interest thereon.

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1 **FIFTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

2 **(Violation of California Labor Code §§ 201 and 202)**

3 **(Against QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1 through 100)**

4 82. Plaintiff incorporates by reference the allegations contained in paragraphs 1
5 through 81, and each and every part thereof with the same force and effect as though fully set
6 forth herein.

7 83. During the relevant time period set forth herein, California Labor Code sections
8 201 and 202 provide that if an employer discharges an employee, the wages earned and unpaid
9 at the time of discharge are due and payable immediately, and if an employee quits their
10 employment, their wages shall become due and payable not later than seventy-two (72) hours
11 thereafter, unless the employee has given seventy-two (72) hours' notice of their intention to
12 quit, in which case the employee is entitled to their wages at the time of quitting.

13 84. During the relevant time period set forth herein, Defendants intentionally and
14 willfully failed to pay class members who are no longer employed by Defendants their wages,
15 earned and unpaid, within seventy-two (72) hours of their leaving Defendants' employ.

16 85. Defendants' failure to pay class members who are no longer employed by
17 Defendants their wages, earned and unpaid, within seventy-two (72) hours of their leaving
18 Defendants' employ, is in violation of California Labor Code sections 201 and 202.

19 86. California Labor Code section 203 provides that if an employer willfully fails to
20 pay wages owed, in accordance with sections 201 and 202, then the wages of the employee
21 shall continue as a penalty from the due date thereof at the same rate until paid or until an
22 action is commenced; but the wages shall not continue for more than thirty (30) days.

23 87. Class members are entitled to recover from Defendants the statutory penalty
24 wages for each day they were not paid, up to the thirty (30) day maximum as provided by
25 Labor Code section 203.

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91. As a result of Defendants' violation of California Labor Code section 226(a), Plaintiff and the other class members have suffered injury and damage to their statutorily protected rights.

92. More specifically, Plaintiff and the other class members have been injured by Defendants' intentional and willful violation of California Labor Code section 226(a) because they were denied both their legal right to receive, and their protected interest in receiving, accurate and itemized wage statements pursuant to California Labor Code section 226(a).

93. Plaintiff and the other class members are entitled to recover from Defendants the greater of their actual damages caused by Defendants' failure to comply with California Labor Code section 226(a), or an aggregate penalty not exceeding four thousand dollars per employee.

94. Plaintiff and the other class members are also entitled to injunctive relief to ensure compliance with this section, pursuant to California Labor Code section 226(h).

SEVENTH CAUSE OF ACTION

(Violation of California Labor Code §§ 2800 and 2802)

(Against QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1 through 100)

95. Plaintiff incorporates by reference the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 94, and each and every part thereof with the same force and effect as though fully set forth herein.

96. Pursuant to California Labor Code sections 2800 and 2802, an employer must reimburse its employee for all necessary expenditures incurred by the employee in direct consequence of the discharge of their job duties or in direct consequence of their obedience to the directions of the employer.

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1 97. Defendants have intentionally and willfully failed to reimburse Plaintiff and the
2 other class members for all necessary business-related expenses and costs. Plaintiff and the
3 other class members are entitled to recover from Defendants their business-related expenses and
4 costs incurred during the course and scope of their employment, plus interest accrued from the
5 date on which the employee incurred the necessary expenditures at the same rate as judgments
6 in civil actions in the State of California.

7 **EIGHTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

8 **(Violation of Labor Code §§ 2698, *et seq.* (“PAGA”))**

9 **(Against QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1 through 100)**

10 98. Plaintiff incorporates by reference the allegations contained in paragraphs 1
11 through 97, and each and every part thereof with the same force and effect as though fully set
12 forth herein.

13 99. The Private Attorneys General Act of 2004 (“PAGA”) expressly establishes that
14 any provision of the California Labor Code which provides for a civil penalty to be assessed and
15 collected by the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency (“LWDA”), or any of
16 its departments, divisions, commissions, boards, agencies or employees for a violation of the
17 California Labor Code, may be recovered through a civil action brought by an aggrieved
18 employee on behalf of themselves, and other current or former employees.

19 100. On November 4, 2025, Plaintiff provided written notice to the LWDA and
20 Defendants of the specific provisions of the Labor Code he contends were violated, and the
21 theories supporting his contentions. Attached hereto as **Exhibit 1** and incorporated by reference
22 is a copy of the written notice to the LWDA. Plaintiff believes that on or about January 8, 2026,
23 the sixty-five (65) days’ notice period expired as to all Defendants, and the LWDA did not take
24 any action to investigate or prosecute this matter. Therefore, Plaintiff exhausted his
25 administrative remedies.

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1 101. Plaintiff and the other non-exempt employees are “aggrieved employees” as
2 defined by California Labor Code section 2699(c) in that they all are or were non-exempt
3 employees of Defendants employed in California at any time during the period from May 19,
4 2024, to the present, and one or more of the alleged violations was committed against them.

5 **Failure to Pay Minimum and Overtime Wages**

6 102. At all times relevant herein, Defendants were required to compensate their non-
7 exempt employees minimum wages for all hours worked and overtime wages for all hours
8 worked in excess of eight (8) hours in a day or forty (40) hours in a workweek, pursuant to the
9 mandate of Labor Code sections 510, 1194, 1197, and 1198.

10 103. As a policy and practice, Defendants failed to compensate Plaintiff and the other
11 aggrieved current and former employees for all hours worked, resulting in a failure to pay all
12 minimum wages and overtime wages, where applicable.

13 **Failure to Provide Meal Periods and Rest Breaks**

14 104. At all times relevant herein, Defendants were required to authorize and permit
15 their non-exempt employees to take a 10-minute rest break for every four (4) hours worked or
16 major fraction thereof and were further required to provide their non-exempt employees with
17 a 30-minute meal period for every five (5) hours worked, pursuant to the mandates of Labor
18 Code sections 226.7 and 512(a).

19 105. As a policy and practice, Defendants failed to provide Plaintiff and the other
20 aggrieved current and former employees with legally mandated meal periods and rest breaks
21 and failed to pay proper compensation for this failure.

22 **Failure to Timely Pay Wages During Employment**

23 106. At all times relevant herein, Defendants were required to pay their employees
24 within a specified time period pursuant to the mandate of Labor Code section 204.

25 107. As a policy and practice, Defendants failed to pay Plaintiff and the other aggrieved
26 current and former employees all wages due and owing within the required time period.

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1 **Failure to Timely Pay Wages Upon Termination**

2 108. At all times relevant herein, Defendants were required to pay their employees all
3 wages owed in a timely fashion at the end of employment pursuant to the mandates of Labor
4 Code sections 201 and 202.

5 109. As a policy and practice, as a result of Defendants' Labor Code violations
6 alleged above, Defendants failed to pay aggrieved former employees their final wages,
7 pursuant to the mandates of Labor Code sections 201 and 202. Accordingly, Defendants owe
8 waiting time penalties pursuant to Labor Code section 203.

9 **Failure to Provide Complete and Accurate Wage Statements**

10 110. At all times relevant herein, Defendants were required to keep *accurate* records
11 regarding their California employees, pursuant to the mandates of Labor Code sections 226
12 and 1174.

13 111. As a result of Defendants' various Labor Code violations, Defendants failed to
14 keep accurate records regarding Plaintiff and the other aggrieved current and former employees.
15 For example, Defendants failed in their affirmative obligation to keep accurate records regarding
16 Plaintiff and the other aggrieved current and former employees' gross wages earned, total hours
17 worked, all deductions, net wages earned, and all applicable hourly rates and the number of
18 hours worked at each hourly rate.

19 **Failure to Reimburse Business Expenses**

20 112. At all times relevant herein, Defendants were required to reimburse their
21 employees for any and all necessary expenditures or losses incurred by the employees in direct
22 consequences of the discharge of their duties, pursuant to the mandates of Labor Code sections
23 2800 and 2802.

24 113. As a policy and practice, Defendants regularly failed to reimburse Plaintiff and
25 the other aggrieved current and former employees for all business expenses incurred and owed
26 to them within the required time period.

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Penalties

114. Pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699, Plaintiff, individually, and on behalf of other current and former aggrieved employees, requests and is entitled to recover from Defendants, and each of them, civil penalties, interest, attorneys' fees and costs pursuant, including but not limited to:

- a. Penalties under California Labor Code section 2699 in the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each aggrieved employee per pay period for the initial violation, and two hundred dollars (\$200) for each aggrieved employee per pay period for each subsequent violation;
- b. Penalties under California Code of Regulations Title 8 section 11040 in the amount of fifty dollars (\$50) for each aggrieved employee per pay period for the initial violation, and one hundred dollars (\$100) for each aggrieved employee per pay period for each subsequent violation;
- c. Penalties under California Labor Code section 210 in addition to, and entirely independent and apart from, any other penalty provided in the California Labor Code in the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each aggrieved employee per pay period for the initial violation, and two hundred dollars (\$200) for each aggrieved employee per pay period for each subsequent violation;
- d. Penalties under Labor Code section 1197.1 in the amount of a hundred dollars (\$100) for each aggrieved employee per pay period for the initial violation, and two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for each aggrieved employee per pay period for each subsequent violation;
- e. Any and all additional penalties as provided by the Labor Code and/or other statutes; and
- f. Attorneys' fees and costs pursuant to Labor Code sections 218.5, 1194, and 2699, and any other applicable statute.

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1 **NINTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

2 **(Violation of California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*)**

3 **(Against QX LOGISTIX LLC and DOES 1 through 100)**

4 115. Plaintiff incorporates by reference the allegations contained in paragraphs 1
5 through 114, and each and every part thereof with the same force and effect as though fully
6 set forth herein.

7 116. Defendants' conduct, as alleged herein, has been, and continues to be unfair,
8 unlawful and harmful to Plaintiff, the other class members, to the general public, and
9 Defendants' competitors. Accordingly, Plaintiff seeks to enforce important rights affecting
10 the public interest within the meaning of Code of Civil Procedure section 1021.5.

11 117. Defendants' activities as alleged herein are violations of California law, and
12 constitute unlawful business acts and practices in violation of California Business &
13 Professions Code sections 17200, *et seq.*

14 118. A violation of California Business & Professions Code sections 17200, *et seq.*
15 may be predicated on the violation of any state or federal law. In this instant case, Defendants'
16 policy and practice of requiring Plaintiff and the other class members to work overtime hours
17 without paying them proper compensation violate California Labor Code sections 510 and
18 1198. Additionally, Defendants' policy and practice of requiring Plaintiff and the other class
19 members to work through their meal and rest periods without paying them proper
20 compensation violate California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512(a). Moreover,
21 Defendants' policy and practice of failing to timely pay wages to class members violate
22 California Labor Code sections 201 and 202. Defendants also violated California Labor Code
23 sections 226(a), 1194, 1197, 2800 and 2802.

24 119. As a result of the herein described violations of California law, Defendants
25 unlawfully gained an unfair advantage over other businesses.

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1 120. Plaintiff and the other class members have been personally injured by
2 Defendants' unlawful business acts and practices as alleged herein, including but not
3 necessarily limited to the loss of money and/or property.

4 121. Pursuant to California Business & Professions Code sections 17200, *et seq.*,
5 Plaintiff and the other class members are entitled to restitution of the wages withheld and
6 retained by Defendants during a period that commences four years prior to the filing of this
7 Complaint; an award of attorneys' fees pursuant to California Code of Civil procedure section
8 1021.5 and other applicable laws; and an award of costs.

9 **DEMAND FOR JURY TRIAL**

10 Plaintiff, individually, and on behalf of other members of the general public similarly
11 situated, requests a trial by jury.

12 **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

13 WHEREFORE, Plaintiff, individually and on behalf of all other members of the
14 general public similarly situated, prays for relief and judgment against Defendants, jointly and
15 severally, as follows:

16 **Class Certification**

- 17 1. That this action be certified as a class action;
18 2. That Plaintiff be appointed as representative of the Class;
19 3. That counsel for Plaintiff be appointed as Class Counsel; and
20 4. That Defendants provide to Class Counsel immediately the names and most
21 current contact information (address, e-mail and telephone numbers) of all class members.

22 **As to the First Cause of Action**

- 23 5. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated California
24 Labor Code sections 510 and 1198 and applicable IWC Wage Orders by willfully failing to
25 pay all overtime wages due to Plaintiff and the other class members;

- 26 6. For general unpaid wages at overtime wage rates and such general and special
27 damages as may be appropriate;

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1 7. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid overtime compensation commencing
2 from the date such amounts were due;

3 8. For reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of suit incurred herein pursuant to
4 California Labor Code section 1194; and

5 9. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

6 **As to the Second Cause of Action**

7 10. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated California
8 Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512(a) and applicable IWC Wage Orders by willfully failing
9 to provide all meal periods (including second meal periods) to Plaintiff and the other class
10 members;

11 11. That the Court make an award to Plaintiff and the other class members of one
12 (1) hour of pay at each employee's regular rate of compensation for each workday that a meal
13 period was not provided;

14 12. For all actual, consequential, and incidental losses and damages, according to
15 proof;

16 13. For premium wages pursuant to California Labor Code section 226.7(c);

17 14. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid wages from the date such amounts were
18 due;

19 15. For reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of suit incurred herein; and

20 16. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

21 **As to the Third Cause of Action**

22 17. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated California
23 Labor Code section 226.7 and applicable IWC Wage Orders by willfully failing to provide all
24 rest periods to Plaintiff and the other class members;

25 18. That the Court make an award to Plaintiff and the other class members of one
26 (1) hour of pay at each employee's regular rate of compensation for each workday that a rest
27 period was not provided;

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1 19. For all actual, consequential, and incidental losses and damages, according to
2 proof;

3 20. For premium wages pursuant to California Labor Code section 226.7(c);

4 21. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid wages from the date such amounts were
5 due; and

6 22. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

7 **As to the Fourth Cause of Action**

8 23. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated California
9 Labor Code sections 1194 and 1197 by willfully failing to pay minimum wages to Plaintiff
10 and the other class members;

11 24. For general unpaid wages and such general and special damages as may be
12 appropriate;

13 25. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid compensation from the date such
14 amounts were due;

15 26. For reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of suit incurred herein pursuant to
16 California Labor Code section 1194(a);

17 27. For liquidated damages pursuant to California Labor Code section 1194.2; and

18 28. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

19 **As to the Fifth Cause of Action**

20 29. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated California
21 Labor Code sections 201, 202, and 203 by willfully failing to pay all compensation owed at
22 the time of termination of the employment of class members no longer employed by
23 Defendants;

24 30. For all actual, consequential, and incidental losses and damages, according to
25 proof;

26 31. For statutory wage penalties pursuant to California Labor Code section 203 for
27 the class members who have left Defendants' employ;

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32. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid compensation from the date such amounts were due; and

33. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

As to the Sixth Cause of Action

34. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated the record keeping provisions of California Labor Code section 226(a) and applicable IWC Wage Orders as to Plaintiff and the other class members, and willfully failed to provide accurate itemized wage statements thereto;

35. For actual, consequential and incidental losses and damages, according to proof;

36. For statutory penalties pursuant to California Labor Code section 226(e);

37. For injunctive relief to ensure compliance with this section, pursuant to California Labor Code section 226(h); and

38. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

As to the Seventh Cause of Action

39. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated California Labor Code sections 2800 and 2802 by willfully failing to reimburse Plaintiff and the other class members for all necessary business-related expenses as required by California Labor Code sections 2800 and 2802;

40. For actual, consequential and incidental losses and damages, according to proof;

41. For the imposition of civil penalties and/or statutory penalties;

42. For punitive damages and/or exemplary damages according to proof at trial;

43. For reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of suit incurred herein; and

44. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

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46. For civil penalties pursuant to Labor Code sections 2699 *et seq.*, for Defendants' violations of Labor Code sections 201, 202, 203, 204, 210, 218.5, 221, 226(a), 226.3, 226.7, 246, 432.5, 510, 512(a), 551, 552, 558, 1174(d), 1194, 1197, 1197.1, 1198, 2800 and 2802;

48. For such other and further relief that the court may deem just and proper.

49. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated California Business and Professions Code sections 17200, *et seq.* by failing to provide Plaintiff and the other class members all overtime compensation due to them, failing to provide all meal and rest periods to Plaintiff and the other class members, failing to pay at least minimum wages to Plaintiff and the other class members, and failing to pay class members' wages timely as required by California Labor Code sections 201 and 202.

51. For the appointment of a receiver to receive, manage and distribute any and all funds disgorged from Defendants and determined to have been wrongfully acquired by Defendants as a result of violation of California Business and Professions Code sections 17200, *et seq.*;

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1 53. For injunctive relief to ensure compliance with this section, pursuant to
2 California Business and Professions Code sections 17200, *et seq.*; and

3 54. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

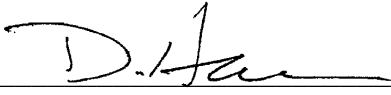

Dear California Labor & Workforce Development Agency:

We have been retained to represent Manolsa Charles against QX Logistix LLC (including any and all affiliates, managers, members, subsidiaries, and parents, and their shareholders, officers, directors, and employees), any individual, owner, officer or managing agent acting on behalf of an “Employer” pursuant to California Labor Code section 558.1, and DOES 1-20¹ for violations of California wage-and-hour laws (hereinafter collectively referred to as “QX Logistix”).

Manolsa Charles is pursuing his California Labor Code sections 2698, *et seq.*, the Private Attorneys General Act of 2004 (“PAGA”) claim on a representative basis. Therefore, Manolsa Charles may seek penalties for violations of the Labor Code on behalf of the State of California and aggrieved employees, which are recoverable under PAGA. This letter is sent in compliance with the reporting requirements of California Labor Code section 2699.3.

QX Logistix is a Delaware limited liability company located at 5685 Alcoa Avenue Vernon, CA 90058.

QX Logistix employed Manolsa Charles as an hourly-paid non-exempt Driver within one year of the date of this letter (until in or around October of 2025) in the State of California. QX Logistix directly controlled the wages, hours and/or working conditions of Manolsa Charles’ and other aggrieved employees’ employment, including direction, retention, scheduling, supervision, and termination.

The “aggrieved employees” that Manolsa Charles may seek penalties on behalf of are all current and former hourly-paid or non-exempt employees (whether hired directly or through a staffing agency) of QX Logistix within the State of California.

QX Logistix failed to properly pay its hourly-paid or non-exempt employees for all hours worked, failed to properly compensate minimum and overtime wages, failed to properly provide legally mandated meal and rest breaks or pay premium wages in lieu thereof, failed to issue compliant wage statements, and failed to reimburse for all necessary business-related costs and expenses, thus resulting in Labor Code violations as stated below.

QX Logistix has violated and/or continues to violate, among other provisions of the California Labor Code and applicable wage law, California Labor Code sections 201, 202, 203, 204, 210, 218.5, 221, 226(a), 226.3, 226.7, 246, 432.5, 510, 512(a), 551, 552, 558, 1174(d), 1194, 1197, 1197.1, 1198, 2800 and 2802, and the IWC Wage Orders.

¹ Manolsa Charles does not know the true names or capacities, whether individual, partner or corporate, of DOES 1 through 20, inclusive, and for that reason, said DOES are designated under such fictitious names. Manolsa Charles will amend this notice when the true names and capacities are known. Manolsa Charles is informed and believes that each DOE was responsible in some way for the matters alleged herein and proximately caused Manolsa Charles and other current and former aggrieved employees to be subject to the illegal employment practices, wrongs and injuries complained of herein.

California Labor Code sections 510, 1194, and 1198 require employers to pay time-and-a-half or double-time overtime wages and make it unlawful to work employees for hours longer than eight hours in one day and/or over forty hours in one week without paying the premium overtime rates. During the relevant time period, Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees routinely worked in excess of 8 hours in a day and 40 hours in a week. QX Logistix failed to compensate Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees for all hours worked and performing off-the-clock work, including pre- and post-shift, and during meal breaks. QX Logistix also failed to include non-discretionary bonuses into Manolsa Charles's and other aggrieved employees' regular rate of pay for purposes of overtime compensation. Therefore, Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees were entitled to receive certain wages for overtime compensation, but they were not paid for all overtime hours worked.

California Labor Code section 246 requires that employers provide employees with paid sick leave of not less than one hour per every 30 hours worked. California Labor Code section 246(l) also requires that paid sick leave be paid at a non-exempt employee's regular rate of pay for the workweek in which the employee uses paid sick time or at a rate calculated by dividing the employee's total wages, not including overtime premium pay, by the employee's total hours worked in the full pay periods of the prior 90 days of employment. During the relevant time period, QX Logistix failed to pay Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees paid sick leave that complied with California Labor Code section 246, by, for example, failing to pay paid sick leave at a non-exempt employee's regular rate of pay or at a rate calculated by dividing the employee's total wages, not including overtime premium pay, by the employee's total hours worked in the full pay periods of the prior 90 days of employment.

California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512(a) require employers to pay an employee one additional hour of pay at the employee's regular rate for each workday that a meal or rest break is not provided. During the relevant time period, QX Logistix routinely required Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees to work through, interrupt, cut short, and/or delay their meal and rest breaks to comply with QX Logistix's policies and expectations and fulfill orders. QX Logistix failed to provide coverage to Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees so they may be relieved of all work duties and take legally mandated meal and rest breaks. Lastly, QX Logistix failed to authorize and permit Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees to take the requisite number of meal and rest breaks, including second meal breaks and third rest breaks, when working shifts exceeding 10 hours in length. Despite these facts, QX Logistix failed to compensate Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees all the premium wages they were owed, including failing to pay premium wages at aggrieved employees' regular rate of pay.

California Labor Code section 551 states "[e]very person employed in any occupation of labor is entitled to one day's rest therefrom in seven." Section 552 further states "[n]o employer of labor shall cause his employees to work more than six days in seven." QX Logistix required Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees to work seven days in a row or more without one day's rest.

California Labor Code section 432.5 states "[n]o employer, or agent, manager, superintendent, or officer thereof, shall require any employee or applicant for employment to agree, in writing, to any term or condition which is known by such employer, or agent, manager, superintendent, or officer thereof to be prohibited by law." QX Logistix required Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees to execute arbitration agreements as a condition of employment despite knowing that such agreements are prohibited under Labor Code section 432.6.

California Labor Code section 201 requires that if an employer discharges an employee, the wages earned and unpaid at the time of discharge are due and payable immediately. California Labor Code section 202 requires that if an employee not having a written contract for a definite period quits their employment, their wages shall become due and payable not later than 72 hours thereafter, unless the employee has given 72 hours' previous notice of their intention to quit, in which case the employee is entitled to their wages at the time of quitting. California Labor Code section 203 provides that if an employer willfully fails to pay, without abatement or reduction, in accordance with Labor Code sections 201, 201.3, 201.5, 201.6, 201.8, 201.9, 202, and 205.5, any wages of an employee who is discharged or who quits, the wages of the employee shall continue as a penalty from the due date thereof at the same rate until paid or until an action therefor is commenced; but the wages shall not continue for more than 30 days. During the relevant time period, QX Logistix failed to pay Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees all wages, including for uncompensated off-the-clock work, unpaid overtime premiums and premium wages for failing to provide legally mandated meal and rest breaks, due to them within any time period specified by California Labor Code sections 201 and 202 and therefore is liable under California Labor Code section 203.

California Labor Code section 204 requires that all wages earned by any person in any employment between the 1st and the 15th days, inclusive, of any calendar month, other than those wages due upon termination of an employee, are due and payable between the 16th and the 26th day of the month during which the labor was performed, and that all wages earned by any person in any employment between the 16th and the last day, inclusive, of any calendar month, other than those wages due upon termination of an employee, are due and payable between the 1st and the 10th day of the following month. California Labor Code section 204 also requires that all wages earned for labor in excess of the normal work period shall be paid no later than the payday for the next regular payroll period. During the relevant time period, QX Logistix failed to pay Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees all wages due to them, including for uncompensated off-the-clock work, unpaid overtime premiums and premium wages for failing to provide legally mandated meal and rest breaks within any time period specified by California Labor Code section 204, and is therefore liable under California Labor Code section 210.

California Labor Code section 226 requires employers to make, keep and provide complete and accurate itemized wage statements to their employees. During the relevant time period, QX Logistix did not provide Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees with complete and accurate itemized wage statements. The wage statements they received from QX Logistix were in violation of California Labor Code section 226(a). The violations include, but are not limited to, the failure to include (1) gross wages earned by Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees, (2) total hours worked by Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees, (3) the number of piece-rate units earned and any applicable piece rate by aggrieved employees, (4) all deductions for Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees, (5) net wages earned by Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees, (6) the inclusive dates of the period for which aggrieved employees are paid, (7) the name of the aggrieved employee and only the last four digits of their social security number or an employee identification number other than a social security number, (8) the name and address of the legal entity that is the employer and (9) all applicable hourly rates in effect during the pay period and the corresponding number of hours worked at each hourly rate by aggrieved employees.

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California Labor Code section 558 allows recovery of penalties. Pursuant to the code, (a) Any employer or other person acting on behalf of an employer who violates, or causes to be violated, a section of this chapter or any provision regulating hours and days of work in any order of the Industrial Welfare Commission shall be subject to a civil penalty as follows: (1) For any initial violation, fifty dollars (\$50) for each underpaid employee for each pay period for which the employee was underpaid in addition to an amount sufficient to recover underpaid wages. (2) For each subsequent violation, one hundred dollars (\$100) for each underpaid employee for each pay period for which the employee was underpaid in addition to an amount sufficient to recover underpaid wages. (3) Wages recovered pursuant to this section shall be paid to the affected employee. Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees have been denied their wages and premium wages and, therefore, are entitled to penalties.

California Labor Code section 1174(d) requires an employer to keep, at a central location in the state or at the plants or establishments at which employees are employed, payroll records showing the hours worked daily by and the wages paid to, and the number of piece-rate units earned by and any applicable piece rate paid to, employees employed at the respective plants or establishments. These records shall be kept with rules established for this purpose by the commission, but in any case, shall be kept on file for not less than three years. During the relevant time period, QX Logistix failed to keep accurate and complete payroll records showing the hours worked daily and the wages paid to Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees.

California Labor Code sections 1194, 1197 and 1197.1 provide the minimum wage to be paid to employees, and the payment of a lesser wage than the minimum so fixed is unlawful. During the relevant time period, QX Logistix did not provide Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees with the minimum wages to which they were entitled despite constructive and actual knowledge of off-the-clock work, including pre- and post-shift, and during meal breaks.

California Labor Code sections 2800 and 2802 require an employer to reimburse its employee for all necessary expenditures incurred by the employee in direct consequence of the discharge of their job duties or in direct consequence of their obedience to the directions of the employer. During their employment, Manolsa Charles and other aggrieved employees incurred necessary business-related expenses and costs that were not fully reimbursed by QX Logistix, including for using their personal cellular phones and vehicles for work-related purposes.

We believe that Manolsa Charles and other current and former California-based hourly-paid or non-exempt employees are entitled to penalties as allowed under California Labor Code sections 2698, *et seq.* for violations of Labor Code sections 201, 202, 203, 204, 210, 218.5, 221, 226(a), 226.3, 226.7, 246, 432.5, 510, 512(a), 551, 552, 558, 1174(d), 1194, 1197, 1197.1, 1198, 2800 and 2802, and the IWC Wage Orders.

California Labor Code section 2699.3 requires that a claimant send a certified letter to the employer in question and the California Labor & Workforce Development Agency setting forth the claims, and the basis for the claims, thereby giving the California Labor & Workforce Development Agency an opportunity to investigate the claims and/or take any action it deems appropriate.

The purpose of this letter is to satisfy the requirement created by California Labor Code section 2699 prior to seeking penalties allowed by law for the aforementioned statutory violations. We look forward to determining whether the California Labor & Workforce Development Agency intends to take any action in reference to these claims. We kindly request that you respond to this notice according to the time frame contemplated by the California Labor Code.

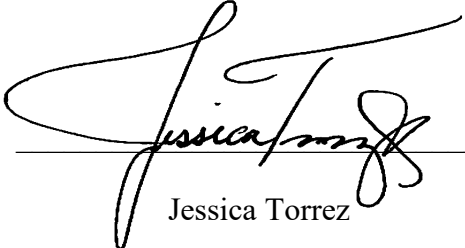
