6. Failure to Furnish Accurate Wage Statements (California Labor Code § 226);
7. Failure to Pay Reporting Time Pay (IWC Wage Orders);
8. Failure to Reimburse for Business Expenditures and Losses (Violation of Labor Code § 2802);
9. Unfair Business Practices (Business and Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*); and
10. Civil Penalties Under the Private Attorneys General Act (California Labor Code §§ 2698, *et seq.*).

JURY TRIAL REQUESTED

1 Plaintiff Alexia Bailey (“Plaintiff”) brings this action individually and on behalf of the State
2 of California and on behalf of aggrieved employees pursuant to the California Private Attorneys
3 General Act (“PAGA”), and alleges the following:

4 **I. INTRODUCTION**

5 1. Plaintiff brings this action to remedy wage-and-hour violations by Defendant Funrise,
6 Inc. and Does 1 through 20 (collectively, “Defendants”). For at least four years prior to the filing
7 of this Complaint and through the present, Defendants have engaged in a uniform policy and
8 systematic scheme of wage abuse against Plaintiff in violation of applicable California laws,
9 including, without limitation, failing to provide meal and rest breaks, failing to pay minimum and
10 overtime wages, failing to provide accurate wage statements, and failing to pay all earned wages
11 upon separation of employment.

12 **II. THE PARTIES**

13 2. Defendant Funrise, Inc. (“Funrise”) is a global toy company that designs,
14 manufactures, and distributes a wide range of toys for children and is based in Sherman Oaks,
15 California. It conducted and continues to conduct substantial business in the State of California.
16 At all times mentioned herein, Defendant Funrise was and is an employer covered by the
17 California Labor Code and the California Industrial Welfare Commission Wage Order.

18 3. Plaintiff is unaware and ignorant of the true names and capacities of Defendants
19 sued herein as **Does 1 through 20**, inclusive, and for that reason sues said Defendants by such
20 fictitious names (the “Doe Defendants”).

21 4. Pursuant to Funrise, Inc.’s Statement of Information filed with the California
22 Secretary of State, Cristal Brandao is the Chief Executive Officer, Secretary, Chief Financial
23 Officer, and the Director of Funrise, Inc., and Cristal Brandao is therefore liable for the claims
24 alleged herein pursuant to California Labor Code § 558.1 because they are an “other person”
25 acting on behalf of Defendant Funrise, Inc., who violates or causes to be violated, certain
26 California Labor Code Sections herein.

27 5. At all times herein relevant, Defendants Funrise and the Doe Defendants, and each
28 of them, were the agents, partners, joint-venturers, joint employers, alter-egos, representatives,

servants, employees, successors-in-interest, co-conspirators and assigns, each of the other, and at times relevant hereto were acting with the course and cope of their authority as such agents, partners, joint-venturers, joint employers, alter-egos, representatives, servants, employees, successors-in-interest, co-conspirators and assigns, and all acts or omissions alleges herein were duly committed with the ratification, knowledge, permission, encouragement, authorization, and consent of each defendant designated herein. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges that the acts of each Defendant are legally attributable to the other Defendants.

6. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges that each of the Doe Defendants are legally responsible for the events and happenings referred to in this Complaint, and unlawfully caused the injuries and damages to Plaintiff as alleged in this Complaint. Plaintiff will file and serve an amendment to this Complaint alleging the true names and capacities of the Doe Defendants when such true names, capacities, and involvement is ascertained.

7. **Plaintiff Alexia Bailey** was employed by Defendants as an office coordinator from approximately October 8, 2025 to February 13, 2026 and was paid in whole or in part on an hourly basis. Plaintiff Alexia Bailey is an individual residing in the County of Los Angeles, California.

8. At all times relevant to this Complaint, Defendants exercised control over the wages, hours, and working conditions of Plaintiff; suffered and permitted Plaintiff to work; and otherwise engaged Plaintiff to work, so as to create an employer-employee relationship between Defendants and Plaintiff. At all relevant times, Defendants were “employers” of Plaintiff within the meaning of all applicable California state laws.

III. JURISDICTION AND VENUE

9. The monetary damages and restitution sought by Plaintiff exceed the minimal jurisdiction limits of the Superior Court and will be established according to proof at trial.

10. This Court has jurisdiction over this action under the California Constitution, Article VI, Section 10, which grants the Superior Court original jurisdiction in all causes except those given by statute to other courts. The statutes under which this action is brought do not specifically grant jurisdiction to any other court, and the issues are based solely on California statutes and law,

1 including the California Labor Code, California Industrial Welfare Commission (“IWC”) Wage
2 Orders, California Code of Civil Procedure, California Civil Code, and the California Business
3 and Professions Code.

4 11. The California Superior Court has jurisdiction over Defendants, because they are
5 citizens of California, have sufficient minimum contacts in California, and otherwise intentionally
6 avail themselves to the California market, including establishing its principal place of business and
7 transacting business in California.

8 12. Venue is proper in this Court, because the Defendants own and operate their
9 company and otherwise transacts business in the County of Los Angeles. And during all relevant
10 time periods, Plaintiff was employed by Defendants in the County of Los Angeles.

11 **IV. FACTUAL BACKGROUND**

12 13. At all relevant times set forth in this Complaint, Defendants employed Plaintiff as an
13 hourly, non-exempt employee.

14 14. Plaintiff was covered under one or more IWC Wage Orders, California Labor
15 Code provisions relating to wage-and-hour laws, and other applicable wage orders, regulations, and
16 statutes, which imposed an obligation on the part of Defendants, among other things, to provide
17 uninterrupted meal and rest periods, to pay overtime wages, to pay wages for all hours worked, to
18 pay all wages due at separation of employment, and to provide accurate wage statements.

19 15. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges that Defendants
20 engaged in a uniform policy and systematic scheme of wage abuse against Plaintiff, including,
21 without limitation, depriving Plaintiff of uninterrupted thirty-minute meal periods for work periods
22 of at least five hours; depriving Plaintiff of ten-minute rest periods for work periods of four hours
23 or major fractions; failing to compensate Plaintiff for all hours worked, including overtime wages;
24 failing to provide timely, accurate itemized wage statements; and failing to pay, within the time
25 constraints imposed by applicable laws, all earned compensation at separation of employment.

26 16. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges that Defendants failed
27 to provide Plaintiff the required meal periods or payment of one additional hour of pay at
28 Plaintiff’s regular rate of pay when a meal break was missed during the relevant time period. This

1 was a result of Defendants' uniform policy and practice of failing to relieve Plaintiff from his job
2 duties. As a result of Defendants' demanding deadlines, Plaintiff was required to perform work as
3 ordered by Defendants for more than five hours during a shift without receiving a meal break.
4 Specifically, Defendants regularly and systematically schedule Plaintiff's meal breaks after his fifth
5 hour of work. Defendants had no policy, procedure, or practice for Plaintiff to report missed meal
6 periods or recover lost wages, and Defendants had no policy, procedure, or practice to provide
7 one hour of additional wages for each workday that the meal break was not provided.

8 17. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges that Defendants failed
9 to provide Plaintiff rest periods of at least ten minutes per four hours worked, or major fraction
10 thereof, and failed to pay Plaintiff one hour of additional wages at Plaintiff's regular rate of pay
11 when a rest break was not provided during the relevant time period. Defendants had no policy,
12 procedure, or practice for Plaintiff to report missed rest breaks or recover lost wages, and
13 Defendants had no policy, procedure, or practice to provide one hour of additional wages for each
14 workday that the rest break was not provided.

15 18. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges that Defendants failed
16 to provide Plaintiff wages, including overtime wages, for all hours worked, meaning the time during
17 which Plaintiff was subject to the control of Defendants, including all the time he was suffered or
18 permitted to work. This was a result of Defendants' uniform policy and practice of requiring
19 Plaintiff to work off-the-clock without paying him for all the time he was under Defendants'
20 control. Plaintiff was entitled to receive compensation for all hours worked, and he did not receive
21 compensation for all hours worked. Plaintiff worked over eight hours in a day, and/or forty hours
22 in a week during his employment with Defendants and Defendants failed to pay overtime wages to
23 Plaintiff for all hours worked more than eight hours in a day and/or forty hours per week.

24 19. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges that Defendants have
25 unlawfully failed to provide timely, accurate, itemized wage statements to Plaintiff.

26 20. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges that Defendants have
27 failed to pay all compensation due and owing to Plaintiff upon separation.
28

V. PAGA REPRESENTATIVE ACTION ALLEGATIONS

21. At all relevant times, PAGA was applicable to Plaintiff and his employment with Defendants. PAGA provides for a civil penalty to be assessed and collected by the Labor and Workforce Development Agency (“LWDA”) for violations of the California Labor Code. As an alternative, these civil penalties may be recovered through a civil action brought by an aggrieved employee on behalf of himself and other current or former employees.

22. Plaintiff and other employees of Defendants are “aggrieved employees” as defined by PAGA, because they are all current or former employees of Defendants, and one or more of the alleged violations were committed against them.

23. On or about February 18, 2026, Plaintiff gave written notice of Defendants’ violations of various provisions of the California Labor Code and the applicable IWC Wage Order to (a) the LWDA by filing with the LWDA through the LWDA website and (b) to Defendants by certified mail.

24. The LWDA did not provide notice of its intention to investigate Defendants’ violations within 65 calendar days of the February 18, 2026 Notice.

25. In doing so, Plaintiff has satisfied the administrative prerequisites under PAGA to recover civil penalties against Defendants, in addition to the other remedies, for violations of California Labor Code §§ 201-203, 226.7, 227.3, 510, 512, 551, 552, 1194 *et seq.*, 1197, 1198, and 2802 and the applicable IWC Wage Order.

VI. CAUSES OF ACTION

FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

Failure to Pay Minimum Wage

(Violation of Labor Code §§ 558, 1194 *et seq.*, 1197, 1197.1, 1198, IWC Wage Order)
(By Plaintiff Against Each Defendant)

26. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges the paragraphs set forth above as though set forth fully herein.

27. California Labor Code § 204, the IWC Wage Orders, and other applicable laws and regulations, provide that an employer must timely pay its employees for all hours worked.

28. California Labor Code § 1197 further provides, “The minimum wage for employees

1 fixed by the commission or by any applicable state or local law, is the minimum wage to be paid to
2 employees, and the payment of a lower wage than the minimum so fixed is unlawful.”

3 29. California Labor Code § 1194 establishes an employee’s right to recover unpaid
4 wages, including interest, and the cost of suit. California Labor Code § 1198 further provides that
5 the employment of an employee for longer than those fixed by the IWC Wage Orders is unlawful.

6 30. Defendants maintained and enforced policies and practices of refusing to pay
7 Plaintiff for all hours worked. Defendants required Plaintiff to work without compensating him for
8 all hours worked as required by the California Labor Code and the applicable IWC Wage Order.

9 31. Defendants thus required Plaintiff to work under conditions prohibited by order of
10 the IWC, in violation of those orders.

11 32. Defendants deprived Plaintiff of his rightfully earned minimum wage compensation,
12 as a direct and proximate result of Defendants’ failure to pay said compensation. Under California
13 Labor Code § 1194, Plaintiff is entitled to recover such amounts, plus interest thereon, reasonable
14 attorneys’ fees, and costs. In addition, under California Labor Code § 1194.2, Plaintiff is entitled
15 to recover liquidated damages in an amount equal to the minimum wages unlawfully unpaid, and
16 interest thereon. Plaintiff is further entitled to attorneys’ fees pursuant to California Code of Civil
17 Procedure § 1021.5, and pursuant to Labor Code § 2699(g)(1).

18 33. Furthermore, California Labor Code § 1197.1 provides for a civil penalty to be
19 assessed against any employer or other person acting on behalf of an employer who fails to pay a
20 wage less than the minimum fixed by law.

21 34. At all times relevant herein, Defendants’ routine and systematic practice of failing to
22 pay Plaintiff a fixed sum of \$50.00 per day resulted in a failure to pay employee wages at the
23 minimum fixed by law.

24 35. As a result of Defendants’ failure to pay minimum wage, Plaintiff is entitled to
25 recover a penalty of \$100.00 for the initial violation for each underpaid employee for each pay
26 period for which each employee was underpaid and \$250 for each subsequent violation for each
27 underpaid employee for each pay period for which each employee was underpaid.

SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION

Failure to Pay Overtime Wages

(Violation of Labor Code §§ 510, 558, 1194 et seq., 1197.1, 1198, IWC Wage Order)

(By Plaintiff Against Each Defendant)

36. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges the paragraphs set forth above as though set forth fully herein.

37. California Labor Code § 204, the IWC Wage Orders, and other applicable laws and regulations, provide that an employer must timely pay its employees for all hours worked.

38. California Labor Code § 510 further provides that employees in California shall be employed more than eight hours per workday unless they receive additional compensation beyond their regular wages in amounts specified by law.

39. California Labor Code § 1194 establishes an employee's right to recover unpaid wages, including overtime compensation and interest, and the cost of suit. California Labor Code § 1198 further provides that the employment of an employee for longer than those fixed by the IWC Wage Orders is unlawful.

40. Defendants maintained and enforced policies and practices of refusing to pay Plaintiff for all hours worked. Defendants employed Plaintiff for more than eight hours per day and more than 40 hours per workweek during the operative timeframe, but Defendants failed to pay Plaintiff the correct applicable overtime rate for the number of overtime hours he worked as required by the California Labor Code and the applicable IWC Wage Order.

41. Defendants thus required Plaintiff to work under conditions prohibited by order of the IWC, in violation of those orders.

42. Defendants deprived Plaintiff of his rightfully earned minimum wage compensation, including overtime compensation, as a direct and proximate result of Defendants' failure to pay said compensation. Under California Labor Code § 1194, Plaintiff is entitled to recover such amounts, plus interest thereon, reasonable attorneys' fees, and costs.

43. Defendants owe Plaintiff overtime wages, has failed and refused, and continues to fail and refuse, to pay the overtime wages owed. Additionally, Defendants did not include all the required compensation in calculating the overtime rate of Plaintiff.

44. Defendants' failure to pay Plaintiff such premium overtime compensation and their miscalculation of the regular rate of pay violates the provisions of California Labor Code § 510 and § 1198, and the applicable IWC Wage Order and is therefore unlawful. Pursuant to California Labor Code § 1194, Plaintiff is entitled to recover unpaid overtime compensation, as well as interest, costs, and attorneys' fees. In addition, under California Labor Code § 1194.2, Plaintiff is entitled to recover liquidated damages in an amount equal to the minimum wages unlawfully unpaid, and interest thereon. Plaintiff is further entitled to attorneys' fees pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5, and pursuant to Labor Code § 2699(g)(1).

45. Pursuant to Labor Code § 558, Plaintiff is entitled to recover a penalty of \$50.00 for the initial failure to compensate employees at the statutory overtime rate for any work in excess of eight hours in one day or any work in excess of 40 hours in any workweek and/or failure to compensate employees at the statutory double time rates for any work in excess of twelve hours in one day or any work in excess of 8 hours on the seventh day of a workweek in addition to any underpaid wages; and \$100.00 for each subsequent failure to compensate employees at the statutory overtime rate for any work in excess of eight hours in one day or any work in excess of 40 hours in any workweek and/or failure to compensate employees at the statutory double time rates for any work in excess of twelve hours in one day or any work in excess of 8 hours on the seventh day of a workweek in addition to any underpaid wages.

46. As a proximate result of Defendants' failure to pay overtime and/or double-time wages as alleged above, Plaintiff is entitled to recover from Defendants penalties pursuant to section 558 in an amount as may be established according to proof at trial.

THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION

Failure to Provide Meal Periods

(Violation of Labor Code §§ 226.7, 512, IWC Wage Order)

(By Plaintiff Against Each Defendant)

47. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges the paragraphs set forth above as though set forth fully herein.

48. Plaintiff regularly worked greater than five hours and on occasion greater than ten hours per day. Pursuant to California Labor Code § 512, an employer may not employ someone

1 for a shift of more than five hours without providing him or her with a meal period of not less than
2 thirty minutes or for more than ten hours without providing him or her with a second meal period
3 of not less than thirty minutes.

4 49. Despite the requirements of the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor
5 Code §§ 512 and 226.7, Defendants have had a policy and practice of not providing Plaintiff with
6 timely, uninterrupted first meal periods, and was similarly not provided with a second meal period
7 to the extent such should have been provided.

8 50. Defendants failed to provide Plaintiff with all required meal breaks of not less than
9 30 minutes pursuant to the applicable IWC Wage Order.

10 51. Pursuant to California Labor Code § 226.7, Plaintiff is entitled to recover one hour
11 of premium pay for each day in which a lawful meal period was not provided. Plaintiff is further
12 entitled to attorneys' fees pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5, and pursuant to Labor
13 Code section 2699(g)(1), Plaintiff is entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys' fees and costs
14 relating to his claims for civil penalties.

15 52. Additionally, as a proximate result of Defendants' failure to provide meal breaks,
16 Plaintiff is entitled to recover from Defendants penalties pursuant to California Labor Code § 558
17 in an amount as may be established according to proof at trial.

18 **FOURTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

19 **Failure to Provide Rest Periods**

20 (Violation of Labor Code §§ 226.7, IWC Wage Order)

21 (By Plaintiff Against Each Defendant)

22 53. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges the paragraphs set forth above as
23 though set forth fully herein.

24 54. Pursuant to the applicable IWC Wage Order, "[e]very employer shall authorize and
25 permit all employees to take rest periods, which insofar as practicable shall be in the middle of
26 each work period. . . . [The] authorized rest period time shall be based on the total hours worked
27 daily at the rate of ten (10) minutes net rest time per four (4) hours worked or major fraction
28 thereof. . . . Authorized rest period time shall be counted as hours worked, for which there shall
be no deduction from wages." California Labor Code § 226.7(a) prohibits an employer from

1 requiring any employee to work during any rest period mandated by an applicable order of the
2 IWC. Under these laws, Defendants were required to authorize and permit Plaintiff to take rest
3 periods, based upon the total hours worked at a rate of ten minutes net rest per four hours, or
4 major fraction thereof, with no deduction from wages.

5 55. Despite these requirements of the applicable IWC Wage Order, Defendants have
6 had a policy and practice of failing to authorize and provide Plaintiff with ten-minute rest periods
7 for every four hours worked, or major fraction thereof.

8 56. Pursuant to Labor Code § 226.7, Plaintiff is entitled to recover one hour of
9 premium pay for each day in which a rest period was not provided. Plaintiff is further entitled to
10 attorneys' fees pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5, and pursuant to California
11 Labor Code § 2699(g)(1), Plaintiff is entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys' fees and costs
12 relating to his claims for civil penalties.

13 57. Additionally, as a proximate result of Defendants' failure to provide rest breaks,
14 Plaintiff is entitled to recover from Defendants penalties pursuant to California Labor Code § 558
15 in an amount as may be established according to proof at trial.

16 **FIFTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

17 **Failure to Pay Wages When Due and Waiting Time Penalties**
18 **(Violation of Labor Code §§ 200-203, IWC Wage Order)**
(By Plaintiff Against Each Defendant)

19 58. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges paragraphs set forth above as
20 though set forth fully herein.

21 59. Sections 201 and 202 of the California Labor Code requires that Defendants pay
22 employees all wages due immediately if Defendants discharge an employee, and within 72 hours if
23 an employee quits his or her employment. Section 203 of the California Labor Code provides that
24 if an employer willfully fails to timely pay such wages the employer must, as a sanction and amount
25 owed, continue to pay that employee's wages until the back wages are paid in full or an action is
26 commenced. The sanction and amount owed cannot exceed 30 days of wages.

27 60. Plaintiff is informed and believes that Plaintiff was terminated from his employment
28 with Defendants and has not received all forms of wages earned, including, but not limited to,

1 compensation for non-provided meal and rest periods. In addition, Plaintiff resigned but
2 Defendants have not unconditionally paid his earned wages upon separation of employment within
3 the time frame mandated by California Labor Code §§ 201 and 202. Defendants' conduct in this
4 regard has been willful.

5 61. Defendants willfully refused and continues to refuse to pay Plaintiff all wages
6 earned in a timely manner as required by California Labor Code § 203. As a consequence of
7 Defendants' willful conduct in not paying all earned wages, Plaintiff is entitled to 30 days of wages
8 under California Labor Code § 203 for failure to pay legal wages.

9 **SIXTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

10 **Failure to Furnish Accurate Wage Statements**

11 (Violation of California Labor Code §§ 226 & 226.3, IWC Wage Order)

12 (By Plaintiff Against Each Defendant)

13 62. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges paragraphs set forth above as
14 though set forth fully herein.

15 63. California Labor Code § 226(a) and the applicable IWC Wage Order require
16 employers semimonthly or at the time of each payment of wages to furnish each employee with a
17 statement itemizing, among other things, all applicable hourly rates. Labor Code § 226(b) provides
18 that if an employer knowingly and intentionally fails to provide a statement itemizing, among other
19 things, all applicable hourly rates, then the employee is entitled to recover the greater of all actual
20 damages or fifty dollars for the initial violation and one hundred dollars for each subsequent
21 violation, up to four thousand dollars.

22 64. Defendants knowingly and intentionally failed to furnish Plaintiff with timely,
23 itemized statements as required by California Labor Code § 226(a) and the applicable IWC Wage
24 Order. As a result, Defendants are liable to Plaintiff for the amounts provided by Labor Code §
25 226(b) and for penalties, and attorneys' fees.

26 **SEVENTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

27 **Failure to Pay Reporting Time Pay**

28 (Violation of IWC Wage Order)

(By Plaintiff Against Each Defendant)

65. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-allege paragraphs set forth above as

1 though set forth fully herein.

2 66. The applicable California IWC Wage Order mandates that “[e]ach workday that
3 an employee is required to report to the work site and does report, but is not put to work or is
4 furnished less than half of his/her usual or scheduled day’s work, the employer shall pay him/her
5 for half of the usual or scheduled day’s work but in no event for less than two (2) hours nor more
6 than four (4) hours at the employee’s regular rate of pay”

7 67. Defendants have had a policy and practice of not paying reporting time pay in
8 whole or in part when Plaintiff reported and report to work as scheduled, but was sent home for
9 lack of work. By their failure to provide reporting time pay, Defendants have violated the
10 provisions of the applicable section of California IWC Wage Order.

11 68. As a result of Defendants’ unlawful acts, Plaintiff has been deprived of wages in
12 amounts to be determined at trial, and is entitled to recover such amounts plus interest thereon,
13 penalties, attorneys’ fees, and costs.

14 **EIGHTH CAUSE OF ACTION**
15 **Failure to Reimburse for Business Expenditures and Losses**
16 (Violation of Labor Code § 2802)
(By Plaintiff Against Each Defendant)

17 69. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges paragraphs set forth above as
18 though set forth fully herein.

19 70. Pursuant to California Labor Code § 2802(a), “[a]n employer shall indemnify his or
20 her employee for all necessary expenditures or losses incurred by the employee in direct
21 consequence of the discharge of his or her duties, or of his or her obedience to the directions of
22 the employer, even though unlawful, unless the employee, at the time of obeying the directions,
23 believed them to be unlawful.”

24 71. As a pattern and practice, Defendants regularly failed to reimburse and indemnify
25 Plaintiff for business expenses, including without limitation, non-slip shoes, shirts, slacks, and hat.

26 72. Pursuant to California Labor Code § 2802, Plaintiff is entitled to recover
27 unreimbursed business expenses. As a proximate result of these violations, Plaintiff has been
28 damaged in an amount according to proof at time of trial. Pursuant to California Labor Code §

2802(c), Plaintiff is also entitled to recover interest, costs, and attorneys' fees. Plaintiff is further entitled to attorneys' fees and costs pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5, and pursuant to Labor Code §§ 218.5, 2802, and 2699(g)(1).

NINTH CAUSE OF ACTION

Unfair Competition

(Violation of California Business and Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*)

(By Plaintiff Against Each Defendant)

73. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges paragraphs set forth above as though set forth fully herein.

74. A violation of California Business and Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*, may be predicated on the violation of any state or federal law. Defendants' policies, activities, and actions as alleged herein, are violations of California law and constitute unlawful business acts and practices in violation of California Business and Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.* Defendants have engaged and continue to engage in unfair and unlawful business practices in California by practicing, employing, and utilizing the employment practices outlined above, including failing to pay reporting time pay, and failing to provide meal and rest breaks in violation of the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor Code.

75. Plaintiff has also been personally aggrieved by Defendants' unlawful and unfair business acts and practices alleged herein by the loss of money and/or property.

76. Defendants' conduct, as alleged in this Complaint, has been, and continues to be, unfair, unlawful, and harmful to Plaintiff, Defendant's competitors, and the public. Plaintiff seeks to enforce important rights affecting the public interest within the meaning of the California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5.

77. Pursuant to California Business and Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*, Plaintiff is entitled to restitution of the wages withheld and retained by Defendants; an award of attorneys' fees pursuant to California Labor Code § 1194; and California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5; interest; and an award of costs.

TENTH CAUSE OF ACTION

Private Attorney General Act

(California Labor Code §§ 2698, *et seq.* [PAGA])

(By Plaintiff and Other Aggrieved Employees Against Defendants)

1 78. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-allege paragraphs set forth above as
2 though set forth fully herein.

3 79. PAGA authorizes an aggrieved employee, on behalf of himself or other current or
4 former employees, to bring a civil action to recover civil penalties against his or her employer
5 pursuant to the procedures specified in California Labor Code § 2699.3. Plaintiff is an aggrieved
6 employee within the meaning of PAGA, and pursuant to PAGA, Plaintiff is entitled to recover civil
7 penalties on behalf of himself and other similarly aggrieved persons who are, or were employed, by
8 Defendants and against whom one or more of the alleged violations were committed. If the
9 employee prevails as private attorney general, the employer may be subject to civil penalties, of
10 which the aggrieved employee is entitled to 35 percent.

11 80. Plaintiff has complied with the procedures for bringing suit under PAGA.
12 Specifically, on or about February 18, 2026, Plaintiff gave written notice of Defendants' violations
13 – including the facts and theories to support the violations – of various provisions of the California
14 Labor Code and the applicable IWC Wage Order to (a) the LWDA by filing with the LWDA
15 through the LWDA website and (b) to Defendants by certified mail.

16 81. Pursuant to California Labor Code § 2699.3, the LWDA must give written notice
17 by certified mail to the parties that it intends to investigate the alleged violations of the California
18 Labor Code within 60 days of the date of the complainant's written notice and more than 65 days
19 have passed since the notice and the LWDA did not provide the parties notice that it intended to
20 investigate his claims.

21 82. During the applicable time period preceding the filing of Plaintiff's notice to the
22 LWDA, Defendants violated California Labor Code §§ 201-203, 226, 226.7, 512(a), 1194, 1198,
23 and 2802, and the applicable IWC Wage Order provisions, as alleged in more detail above.

24 83. Pursuant to California Labor Code §§ 2699(a) and (f), and 2699.5, and 2699(g)(1),
25 Plaintiff and similarly aggrieved employees are entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys' fees
26 and costs. To that end, Plaintiff seeks all relief entitled under PAGA for any penalties assessed
27 against Defendants as a result of Defendants' California Labor Code violations, plus attorneys' fees
28 and costs.

VII. PRAYER FOR RELIEF

Wherefore, Plaintiff prays for an award and judgment against Defendants jointly and severally, as follows:

1. For compensatory damages;
2. For general damages;
3. For applicable penalties;
4. For injunctive relief on applicable causes of action;
5. For an award of interest, including prejudgment interest, at the legal rate;
6. For an award of attorneys' fees on the applicable causes of action;
7. For costs of suit incurred; and
8. For such other and further relief as the Court deems appropriate.

DEMAND FOR JURY TRIAL

Plaintiff hereby demands a jury trial in this matter on all matters triable to a jury.
