DECLARATION OF HAROUT MESSRELIAN

I, Harout Messrelian, declare as follows:

1. I am an attorney duly licensed to practice before all the Courts of the State of California. I am the managing attorney of Messrelian Law Inc. and the attorney of record for Plaintiff SABINE ROSEMAN ("Plaintiff") in her lawsuit against WAGS AND WALKS and LESLEY BROG (hereinafter collectively "WAGS AND WALKS" or "Defendants").

2. I am experienced in handling employment law matters and specifically wage and hour representative and individual actions. My qualifications are as follows: I received my JD from Loyola Law School in 2010. I started my own law firm in 2011 – the Law Offices of Harout Messrelian. Since 2016, I have been the founder and principal attorney at Messrelian Law, Inc. Since 2011, I have filed and handled over 350 civil actions and/or claims involving representative actions under the Private Attorneys General Act ("PAGA") and/or wage and hour claims on behalf of my clients and have been appointed Class Counsel in three class action cases – *Zohrab Mekhitarian v. Triple Play Motors dba Bob Smith Toyota*, Los Angeles Superior Court Case No. 19STCV22411 (ADR Services, Inc., Case Number 20-2668-RWT), *Carina Camberos, on behalf of herself and others similarly situated, v. Great American Chicken Corp, Inc.*, Los Angeles Superior Court Case No. 21STCV32015, and *Robert Garcia, on behalf of himself and others similarly situated v. HD Supply Management Inc.*, San Bernardino Superior Court Case No. CIVSB2028067. I have a practice that encompasses cases in the Los Angeles Superior Courts, the Orange County Superior Courts, the Riverside County Superior Courts, the San Bernardino County Superior Courts, the Alameda County Superior Courts, Santa Clara County Superior Courts, San Mateo County Superior Courts, and the Monterey County Superior Courts.

3. Except as otherwise indicated, I have personal knowledge of all matters set forth herein and, if called as a witness, could and would competently testify thereto under oath.

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Factual and Procedural Background

4. Defendants are in the animal rescue and adoption business and operate a dog rescue and adoption organization in Los Angeles County, California. Plaintiff was classified as a non-exempt, hourly employee and worked for Defendants as a medical team member from approximately 2020 until approximately July 31, 2023.

5. Plaintiff complied with the procedures of Labor Code section 2699.3 for bringing suit under the Labor Code Private Attorneys General Act of 2004, Labor Code sections 2698, et seq. ("PAGA"). On February 1, 2024, Plaintiff on behalf of herself and Defendants' California non-exempt employees (hereafter collectively the "Aggrieved Employees") gave written notice by electronic service to the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency ("LWDA") and via certified mail to Defendants of their claims against Defendants. In her notice to the LWDA, Plaintiff asserted on behalf of herself and the Aggrieved Employees that Defendants (1) failed to compensate for all hours worked and to pay minimum wages (Labor Code sections 1194, 1194.2, 1197, 1197.1); (2) failed to pay overtime compensation (Labor Code section 510); (3) failed to provide rest breaks (Labor Code section 226.7); (4) failed to provide meal breaks (Labor Code sections 512, 226.7); (5) failed to timely pay wages due during employment (Labor Code section 204); (6) failed to provide accurate itemized wage statements (Labor Code section 226); (7) failed to keep accurate and complete payroll records (Labor Code section 1174/1174.5); (8) failed to pay wages at the end of employment (Labor Code section 203); (9) failed to reimbursement business expenses (Labor Code section 2800/2802); (10) failed to provide sick pay (Labor Code section 233/246) and (11) failed to provide Worker's Compensation coverage (Labor Code section 3700.5). Plaintiff filed her initial lawsuit on May 13, 2024, in the Superior Court for the State of California, County of Los Angeles, Case No. 24SMCV02258, with one cause of action for PAGA penalties based on the theories as outlined in the PAGA letter.

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1 6. Through informal discovery, Defendants produced records and represented that
2 it employed approximately 54 employees falling within Plaintiff's Aggrieved Employees
3 definition for the period from March 10, 2023 through December 2, 2025, and that there are
4 paychecks issued for a total of approximately 2,719 pay periods worked for that same time
5 period.

6 7. The Settlement Agreement covers PAGA Members, which are Aggrieved
7 Employees employed on or after March 10, 2023, through December 2, 2025.

8 8. Defendants deny any liability or wrongdoing of any kind whatsoever associated
9 with the lawsuit and the Representative PAGA Claim. It is the desire of the Parties to fully,
10 finally, and forever compromise, and discharge all claims known or unknown related to those
11 alleged in Plaintiff's lawsuit.

12 9. The parties attended a full-day mediation with experienced mediator Steven
13 Amundson on December 2, 2025, and settled the matter. Before agreeing to the terms of the
14 Settlement, the Parties engaged in informal discovery regarding Defendants' policies, practices,
15 operations, time and payroll information and other topics. Prior to negotiation, Defendants
16 produced Plaintiff's personnel file, time and payroll data for Plaintiff, and time records and
17 payroll records for 8 aggrieved employees falling within Plaintiff's Aggrieved Employees
18 definition and during the applicable PAGA period. Through extensive arm's length negotiations
19 and only after discovery and investigation were performed, the Parties agreed to settlement
20 terms. Attached as **Exhibit 1** is a true and accurate copy of "Joint Stipulation of Settlement and
21 Release of PAGA Action" (hereinafter "Settlement Agreement") along with the notice that will
22 be sent, with payment, to the PAGA Members covered by the Settlement Agreement. As
23 alluded to above, the Parties negotiated the PAGA claims through arms-length negotiation
24 during a private mediation, and only after sufficient discovery was completed, including data
25 being sent to Plaintiff's data expert for analysis/review.

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1 10. The Parties conducted investigation of the facts and law both before and after
2 the lawsuit was filed. Counsel for the Parties have further investigated the applicable law as
3 applied to the facts discovered regarding Plaintiff's claims, the defenses thereto, and the Labor
4 Code violations claimed by Plaintiff. Based on their own independent investigations and
5 evaluations, the Parties and their respective counsel are of the opinion that the Settlement for
6 the consideration and on the terms set forth in this Motion are fair, reasonable and adequate
7 and are in the best interests of Plaintiff, the PAGA Members, and Defendants in light of all
8 known facts and circumstances and the risks inherent in litigation, especially in this post-
9 pandemic era when most California businesses are still struggling to remain afloat, much less
10 prosper and make a large profit.

11 11. The Parties further recognize that the issues presented in the Action are likely
12 only to be resolved with extensive and costly pretrial and trial proceedings, and that further
13 litigation will cause inconvenience, distraction, disruption, delay, and expense disproportionate
14 to the maximum potential benefits, especially in light of the post-pandemic era and the
15 business climate.

16 12. Plaintiff alleges that the strongest claims are that Plaintiff and other PAGA
17 Members were not provided meal breaks and rest breaks under the law.

18 13. Plaintiff contends that the civil penalty statutes applicable to the Action arise
19 from violations of the California Labor Code, including, but not limited to, Labor Code
20 sections 226.7, 512, 558, and 2699(f)(2). Under these civil penalty statutes, an employee who
21 suffers a Labor Code violation may be awarded a sum of money for each pay period in which
22 he or she was underpaid. However, under Labor Code section 2699(e)(2), the Court can reduce
23 an award of civil penalties if the award is unjust, arbitrary, oppressive, or confiscatory.

24 14. As it relates to Plaintiff's argument for meal break violations, Plaintiff's data
25 analysis revealed a shift violation rate of 59.1% for short, late, or no meal breaks for shifts that
26 were 5 hours or greater. The data revealed that 90.1% of the pay periods in the sample included
27 shifts that were 5 hours or greater. As such, we are dealing with alleged violations covering
28 2,450 pay periods [2,719 total pay periods x 90.1%]. When the 59.1% shift violation rate is

1 extrapolated, it translates to 100% of those pay periods having at least one meal period
2 violation. As such, the maximum exposure for meal period violations in the PAGA period,
3 which Plaintiff understands Defendants dispute, would be \$122,500, which is calculated as
4 follows: 2,450 pay periods x 100% equals 2,450 affected pay periods; 2,450 pay periods x
5 \$50/pay period (civil penalty) amounts to \$122,500 in exposure. The latter exposure
6 calculation also does not take into account the fact that there are risks to Plaintiff's meal period
7 claims. Defendants contend that, to establish a violation for missed meal periods, a plaintiff
8 must do more than show that a meal break was not taken. Determining by a review of
9 Defendants' time records the exact reasons why a meal period appears to be short or late or not
10 taken would be difficult and would be a challenge as Plaintiff would have issues with
11 manageability. In light of these risks, Plaintiff has applied a 35% discount to the meal period
12 exposure, resulting in an adjusted meal period exposure of \$79,625.

13 15. As it relates to Plaintiff's argument for rest break violations, Plaintiff's data
14 analysis revealed that 95% of the pay periods in the sample included shifts of 3.5 hours or
15 greater, which is the threshold that triggers the obligation to authorize and permit a rest break.
16 As such, Plaintiff is dealing with alleged rest break violations covering 2,583 pay periods
17 [2,719 total pay periods x 95%]. At a civil penalty of \$100/pay period, the maximum exposure
18 for rest break violations would be \$258,300 (2,583 pay periods x \$100/pay period). However,
19 there was no evidence on paper of rest period violations because rest periods were not tracked
20 by Defendants' timekeeping system – nor does the law require such tracking – as is common
21 for most businesses in California. In light of these significant proof risks, Plaintiff has applied
22 a 65% discount to the rest period exposure, resulting in an adjusted rest break exposure of
23 \$90,405. As such, the combined risk-adjusted exposure for meal period and rest break
24 violations in the PAGA period, which Plaintiff understands Defendants dispute, would be
25 \$170,030.

26 16. As it relates to Plaintiff's other claims, there would be substantial issues with
27 proof. As it relates to the minimum wage and rounding theory, the data showed that there was
28 no rounding because the hours were paid to the third decimal point, and as such the minimum

1 wage claim premised on rounding fails. As it relates to straight overtime issues, the average
2 number of hours worked per day based on the sample was 7.0 hours, and so overtime is not
3 implicated. As it relates to the regular rate of pay claim, there was only one bonus payment
4 seen in the sample, and Defendant argues that, in any event, the bonus was discretionary in
5 nature. There was similarly no evidence on paper relating to “off the clock” work violations.
6 There was also no evidence of sick pay violations or that Defendant failed to maintain
7 Worker’s Compensation coverage.

8 17. As it relates to Plaintiff’s claim of business expense reimbursement, Defendant
9 argues that personal cell phones were not required to conduct job duties and that most
10 employees did not work from home and did not need to use their home internet or computers.
11 Plaintiff’s other claims are derivative claims for violations of Labor Code sections 203, 204,
12 and 1174 for not being paid all wages owed every pay period or at the end of employment as
13 well as not receiving accurate, itemized wage statements, and these derivative claims are not
14 triggered by the meal and/or rest break violations.

15 18. Based on the above calculations, Plaintiff’s aggregate exposure for the strongest
16 disputed claims, which again Plaintiff understands Defendants dispute, would be \$170,030.
17 Assuming that Plaintiff’s calculations and analysis are accurate, the maximum exposure
18 presumes that the Court will not reduce the penalty award as unjust, arbitrary, oppressive, or
19 confiscatory. Based on the above analysis, a gross settlement in the amount of \$68,000.00 is a
20 very strong result, especially in light of the risk factors as discussed above.

21 19. Moreover, Plaintiff is aware of no California state courts awarding Plaintiff
22 multiple PAGA penalties for the same violation for the same pay period under different Labor
23 Code provisions. As such, one of the risks Plaintiff faces is that the Court would refuse to
24 “stack” civil penalties arising under the various Labor Code statutes. Furthermore, judges have
25 awarded extremely small sums to PAGA claimants in the past. Defendants also adamantly
26 dispute all of Plaintiff’s allegations in the operative Complaint.

27 20. PAGA states a court has discretion to award a lesser amount than the maximum
28 penalty. *See* Lab. Code § 2699(e)(2) (“...a court may award a lesser amount than the maximum

1 civil penalty amount specified by this part if, based on the facts and circumstances of the
2 particular case, to do otherwise would result in an award that is unjust, arbitrary and
3 oppressive, or confiscatory.”); *see also Thurman v. Bayshore Transit Management, Inc.*, 203
4 Cal. App. 4th 1112, 1135 (2012) (reducing PAGA award). There is a substantial risk that the
5 Court could reduce civil penalties to an insignificant amount if it is unpersuaded by Plaintiff’s
6 evidence of willful and intentional conduct. In *Carrington v. Starbucks*, the Court of Appeal
7 affirmed a trial court’s heavily discounted award of only \$5 per violation because it was within
8 the Court’s discretion to significantly reduce PAGA penalties even when there is a finding that
9 a violation of the California Labor Code occurred. *Carrington v. Starbucks*, 30 Cal. App. 5th
10 504 (2018). The plaintiff in *Carrington* had requested penalties in excess of \$70 million and
11 was successful in proving the PAGA claim during a bench trial. However, the trial court
12 reduced the total award after trial to only \$150,000 (30,000 violations x \$5) and stated that this
13 reduction was warranted because imposing the maximum penalty would be “unjust, arbitrary,
14 and oppressive”, based on Starbucks’s “good faith attempts” to comply with meal break
15 obligations and because the Court found the violations were minimal. Applying the same
16 formula here and assuming there was one violation during each pay period, the award of civil
17 penalties could not exceed \$13,595 in PAGA penalties (2,719 x \$5). As such, this Settlement is
18 a great result based solely on the risk the Court chooses to apply the *Carrington* formula.
19 Defendants have also provided defenses to the Labor Code claims underlying Plaintiff’s
20 allegations. Thus, the chance of Plaintiff recovering a higher amount than the Gross Settlement
21 Amount is uncertain.

22 21. The Parties further recognize that the issues presented in the Action are likely
23 only to be resolved with extensive and costly pretrial and trial proceedings, and that further
24 litigation will cause inconvenience, distraction, disruption, delay, and expense disproportionate
25 to the maximum potential benefits to the PAGA Members and Plaintiff from continued
26 litigation.

27 22. The settlement of the Action involves monetary relief to all PAGA Members,
28 Plaintiff, her attorneys, and the State of California.

23. Furthermore, Plaintiff recognizes that continued litigation presents significant risks that support a significant downward departure from Plaintiff's estimated civil penalties amount. In view of the risks, the Settlement represents a fair, adequate, and reasonable compromise amount for these claims and is in the best interest of Plaintiff and PAGA Members and thus, warrants approval. *See Laguna v. Coverall N. Am., Inc.*, 762 F.3d 902 (9th Cir. 2014). The PAGA settlement and its terms are fair, just, reasonable, adequate, and equitable to Plaintiff, the aggrieved employees, and the State, especially in light of the current economic climate, and are the product of good faith, and informed arms-length negotiations between the Parties consistent with public policy and fully comply with applicable provisions of law.

24. The Total Settlement Fund will be distributed under terms pursuant to a payment plan. As such, the settlement of PAGA penalties in the gross sum of \$68,000.00, of which 75% of the net amount after attorney's fees [\$22,666.66], attorney costs [\$8,164.10], and settlement administrator fees [\$2,990.00], which is \$25,634.43 will be paid to the LWDA, and 25%, which equates to \$8,544.81, will be distributed to the PAGA Members, is reasonable and appropriate under the circumstances. With a total of 54 Aggrieved Employees, the average estimated individual PAGA payment for each Aggrieved Employee is approximately \$158.24 (25% of the estimated Net Settlement equating to \$8,544.81 as noted above) / 54 Aggrieved Employees). This is a great result given the uncertainties of litigation.

Attorneys' Fees and Costs

25. I represent Plaintiff on a straight contingency basis. My firm's request for \$22,666.66 [1/3] in attorney fees and \$8,164.10 in litigation costs is fair and reasonable. To date, I have investigated and prosecuted this matter vigorously, including drafting the initial PAGA notice as well as the original complaint; reviewing Defendants' informal data and document production; sending and receiving emails on the case with defense counsel; sending the PAGA data to Plaintiff's expert for review/analysis and reviewing the expert's findings/conclusions; preparing for mediation, including providing material and arguments to the mediator; engaging in a private mediation; and drafting this PAGA approval motion. I also expect to perform additional work on this case if the Court grants final approval of the

Settlement, including supervision of the Settlement Administrator's disbursement of the settlement funds to the Aggrieved Employees. "Empirical studies show that, regardless of whether the percentage method or the lodestar method is used, fee awards in class actions average around one-third of the recovery. *Chavez v. Netflix, Inc.*, 162 Cal. App. 4th 43, 47 fn. 11 (2008) (quoting *Shaw v. Toshiba America Information Systems, Inc.*, 91 F. Supp. 2d 942, 972 (E.D. Tex. 2000); see also *Lafitte v. Robert Half Int'l Inc.*, 1 Cal. 5th 480, 503 (Cal. Aug. 11, 2016) (holding that courts can use the percentage method for the calculation of attorneys' fees). This is also consistent with my experience in cases involving PAGA claims. This award is justified here because I achieved a strong result for the PAGA Members and the State while bearing the substantial burdens of contingency representation.

26. My previous experience in litigating wage and hour actions also supports the reasonableness of the fee request, as does the caliber of opposing counsel. My previous experience in similar matters was integral in evaluating the strengths and weaknesses of the case against Defendants and the reasonableness of the Settlement. Because it is reasonable to compensate me commensurate with my skill, reputation, and experience, attorney's fees of approximately 1/3 of the Gross Settlement Amount is reasonable. Likewise, the caliber and experience of opposing counsel in labor and employment litigation supports the fairness and reasonableness of the requested fee award.

27. The litigation costs expended to aid in the representation of the PAGA Members include the following: lawsuit filing fee of \$454.22; PAGA initial filing fees of \$75.00; service of lawsuit fee of \$120.00; expert data analysis fee of \$900.00; mediation fee of \$6,500; and miscellaneous filing fees of \$114.88 for a total of \$8,164.10. All of these costs are documented and reasonably incurred.

Settlement Administration Costs

28. With regard to the settlement administration costs provision, it is reasonable. Before agreeing to Apex Class Action LLC (“Apex”), the parties sought and reviewed bids from other reputable third-party administrators, including Phoenix and ILYM, and Apex’s bid was comparable. Apex’s bid has been attached as **Exhibit 2** to this declaration.

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I declare under the penalty of perjury of the laws of the State of California that the foregoing is true and correct to the best of my knowledge.

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EXHIBIT 1

PAGA SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT

This PAGA Settlement Agreement (“Agreement”) is made by and between Plaintiff Sabine Roseman (“Plaintiff”) and Defendant Wags & Walks (“Defendant”) on behalf of itself and all of its current and former owners, parents, subsidiaries, members, representatives, agents, insurers, officers, including but not limited to Lesley Brog, directors, employees, and any individual or entity that could be jointly liable with the Defendant. The Agreement refers to Plaintiff and Defendant collectively as “Parties,” or individually as “Party.”

1. DEFINITIONS.

- 1.1 “Action” means the Plaintiff’s lawsuit alleging wage and hour violations against Defendant captioned *Sabine Roseman v. Wags and Walks, Lesley Brog, et. al.*, Case No. 24SMCV02258 initiated on May 13, 2024, and pending in Superior Court of the State of California, County of Los Angeles.
- 1.2 “Administrator” means Apex Class Action LLC, the neutral entity the Parties have agreed to appoint to administer the Settlement.
- 1.3 “Administration Expenses Payment” means the amount the Administrator will be paid from the Gross Settlement Amount to reimburse its reasonable fees and expenses in accordance with the Administrator’s “not to exceed” bid submitted to the Court in connection with approval of this Settlement.
- 1.4 “Aggrieved Employee” means all current and former non-exempt hourly employees employed by Defendant in the State of California during the PAGA Period
- 1.5 “Aggrieved Employee Data” means Aggrieved Employee identifying information in Defendant’s possession including the Aggrieved Employee’s name, last-known mailing address, Social Security number, and number of PAGA Pay Periods.
- 1.6 “Aggrieved Employee Address Search” means the Administrator’s investigation and search for current Aggrieved Employee mailing addresses using all reasonably available sources, methods and means including, but not limited to, the National Change of Address database, skip traces, and direct contact by the Administrator with Aggrieved Employees.
- 1.7 “Court” means the Superior Court of California, County of Los Angeles.
- 1.8 “Defense Counsel” means Andrew L. Smith of Jackson Lewis, P.C., 725 South Figueroa Street, Suite 2800, Los Angeles, California 90017.
- 1.9 “Effective Date” means the date by when both of the following have occurred: (a) the Court enters a Judgment on its Order Approving the PAGA Settlement, (b) sixty-five days have passed since the Order Approving the PAGA Settlement, and (c) the Judgment is final. The Judgment is final as of the latest of the day the Court enters Judgment.

- 1.10 "Gross Settlement Amount" means \$68,000.00 which is the total amount Defendant agrees to pay under the Settlement. The Gross Settlement Amount will be used to pay Individual PAGA Payments, the LWDA PAGA Payment, PAGA Counsel Fees Payment, PAGA Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, and the Administrator's Expenses Payment.
- 1.11 "Individual PAGA Payment" means the Aggrieved Employee's pro rata share of 25% of the PAGA Penalties calculated according to the number of Pay Periods the Aggrieved Employee worked during the PAGA Period.
- 1.12 "Judgment" means the judgment entered by the Court based upon the Final Approval.
- 1.13 "LWDA" means the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency, the agency entitled, under Labor Code section 2699, subd. (i).
- 1.14 "LWDA PAGA Payment" means the 75% of the PAGA Penalties paid to the LWDA under Labor Code section 2699, subd. (i).
- 1.15 "Net Settlement Amount" means the Gross Settlement Amount, less the following payments in the amounts approved by the Court: (a) Individual PAGA Payments, (b) the LWDA PAGA Payment, (c) PAGA Counsel Fees Payment, (d) PAGA Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, and (e) the Administration Expenses Payment. The remainder is to be paid to Aggrieved Employees as Individual PAGA Payments.
- 1.16 "PAGA Counsel" means Harout Messrelian of Messrelian Law Inc., 101 N. Brand Blvd., Suite 1450, Glendale, CA 91203, the attorney representing the Plaintiff in the Action.
- 1.17 "PAGA Counsel Fees Payment" and "PAGA Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment" mean the amounts allocated to PAGA Counsel for reimbursement of reasonable attorneys' fees and expenses, respectively, incurred to prosecute the Action.
- 1.18 "PAGA Pay Period" means any Pay Period during which an Aggrieved Employees worked for Defendant for at least one day during the PAGA Period.
- 1.19 "PAGA Period" means the period from March 10 , 2023, through December 2, 2025.
- 1.20 "PAGA" means the Private Attorneys General Act (Labor Code §§ 2698, *et seq.*).
- 1.21 "PAGA Notice" means Plaintiff's letter to Defendant and the LWDA dated February 1, 2024 providing notice pursuant to Labor Code section 2699.3, subd.(a).
- 1.22 "PAGA Penalties" means the total amount of PAGA civil penalties to be paid from the Gross Settlement Amount, allocated 25% to the Aggrieved Employees (\$8,460.83) and the 75% to LWDA (\$25,382.51) in settlement of PAGA claims.
- 1.23 "Plaintiff" means Sabine Roseman, the named plaintiff in the Action.

- 1.23 "Approval Order" means the proposed Court Order Granting Approval of PAGA Settlement.
- 1.24 "Released PAGA Claims" means the claims being released by the Plaintiff and PAGA Counsel and as described in Paragraph 5 below.
- 1.25 "Released Parties" means: Defendant and its past, present, and future owners, officers, including but not limited to Lesley Brog, directors, employees, board members, shareholders, attorneys, insurers, reinsurers, customers, partners, investors, members, representatives, predecessors, parent companies, subsidiaries, affiliates, divisions, successors, agents and principals, and their heirs, estates, executors, administrators, servants, insurers, attorneys, assigns, and any individual or entity that could be jointly liable with Defendant, and each of them.
- 1.26 "Settlement" means the disposition of the Action effected by this Agreement and the Judgment.
- 1.27 "Defendant" means named defendant Wags & Walks.

2. RECITALS

- 2.1 On February 1, 2024, Plaintiff provided written notice to the LWDA and Defendant asserting claims for civil penalties pursuant to PAGA stemming from alleged violations of California Labor Code sections 201, 202, 203, 204, 210, 218.5, 218.6, 226, 226.3, 226.7, 233, 246, 510, 512, 558, 558.1, 1171, 1173, 1174, 1174.5, 1185, 1194, 1194.2, 1197, 1198, 2698, 2699 *et seq.*, 2802, and 3700.5; provisions of the Industrial Welfare Commission (IWC) Wage Order(s); and California Business & Professions Code section 17200 *et seq.*
- 2.2 On May 13, 2024, Plaintiff commenced this Action by filing a Complaint for: failure to compensate for all hours worked; failure to pay minimum wage; failure to pay overtime; failure to provide accurate itemized wage statements; failure to pay wages when employment ends; failure to pay wages owed every pay period; failure to give rest breaks; failure to give meal breaks; California Private Attorneys General Act ("PAGA"); failure to reimburse business expenses; retaliation in violation of Labor Code Section 1102.5; wrongful termination; and violation of California Business and Professions Code Section 17200. Defendant denies the allegations in the Operative Complaint, denies any failure to comply with the laws identified in the Operative Complaint and denies any and all liability for the causes of action and claim alleged.
- 2.3 Pursuant to Labor Code section 2699.3, subd.(a), Plaintiff gave timely written notice to Defendant and the LWDA by sending the PAGA Notice.
- 2.4 On December 2, 2025, the Parties participated in an all-day mediation presided over by Steven Amundson which led to this Agreement to settle the Action.
- 2.5 Prior to mediation Plaintiff obtained, through informal discovery including, but not limited to, the employment policies, procedures, and practices implicated by the PAGA

representative claims; a sampling of timekeeping records, payroll records, and wage statements relating to Plaintiff and non-exempt employees on whose behalf the PAGA claims are asserted in the Action; and summaries of data pertaining to the number of employees allegedly affected by the PAGA claims, inclusive of implicated pay periods.

- 2.6 The Parties, PAGA Counsel, and Defense Counsel represent that they are not aware of any other pending matter or action asserting claims that will be extinguished or affected by the Settlement except for the individual settlement.

3. MONETARY TERMS.

- 3.1 Gross Settlement Amount. Except as otherwise provided by Paragraph 9 below, Defendant promises to pay \$68,000.00 and no more as the Gross Settlement Amount. Defendant has no obligation to pay the Gross Settlement Amount prior to the deadline stated in Paragraph 6.1 of this Agreement. The Administrator will disburse the entire Gross Settlement Amount without asking or requiring Aggrieved Employees to submit any claim as a condition of payment. None of the Gross Settlement Amount will revert to Defendant.

- 3.2 Payments from the Gross Settlement Amount. The Administrator will make and deduct the following payments from the Gross Settlement Amount, in the amounts specified by the Court in the Final Approval:

3.2.1 To PAGA Counsel: A PAGA Counsel Fees Payment of not more than 1/3 which is currently estimated to be \$22,666.66 and PAGA Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment of not more than \$8,500. Defendant will not oppose requests for Court approval of these payments provided that they do not exceed these amounts. Plaintiff and/or PAGA Counsel will file an application or motion for PAGA Counsel Fees Payment and PAGA Litigation Expenses Payment. If the Court approves a PAGA Counsel Fees Payment and/or a PAGA Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment less than the amounts requested, the Administrator will allocate the remainder to the Net Settlement Amount. Released Parties shall have no liability to PAGA Counsel or any other Plaintiff's Counsel arising from any claim to any portion any PAGA Counsel Fee Payment and/or PAGA Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment. The Administrator will pay the PAGA Counsel Fees Payment and PAGA Counsel Expenses Payment using one or more IRS 1099 Forms. PAGA Counsel assumes full responsibility and liability for taxes owed on the PAGA Counsel Fees Payment and the PAGA Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment and holds Defendant harmless, and indemnifies Defendant, from any dispute or controversy regarding any division or sharing of any of these Payments.

3.2.2 To the Administrator: An Administrator Expenses Payment not to exceed \$2,990.00 except for a showing of good cause and as approved by the Court. To the extent the Administration Expenses are less or the Court approves payment

less than \$2,990.00, the Administrator will retain the remainder in the Net Settlement Amount.

3.2.3 To the LWDA and Aggrieved Employees: PAGA Penalties in the amount of \$33,843.34 to be paid from the Gross Settlement Amount, with 75% (\$25,382.51) allocated to the LWDA PAGA Payment and 25% (\$8,460.83) allocated to the Individual PAGA Payments.

3.2.3.1. The Administrator will calculate each Individual PAGA Payment by (a) dividing the amount of the Aggrieved Employees' 25% share of PAGA Penalties (\$8,460.83) by the total number of PAGA Period Pay Periods worked by all Aggrieved Employees during the PAGA Period and (b) multiplying the result by each Aggrieved Employee's PAGA Period Pay Periods. Aggrieved Employees assume full responsibility and liability for any taxes owed on their Individual PAGA Payment

3.2.3.2. If the Court approves PAGA Penalties of less than the amount requested, the Administrator will allocate the remainder to the Net Settlement Amount. The Administrator will report the Individual PAGA Payments on IRS 1099 Forms.

4. SETTLEMENT FUNDING AND PAYMENTS.

4.1 Aggrieved Employee Pay Periods. Based on a review of its records, Defendant estimates there are 54 Aggrieved Employees who worked a total of 2,719 pay periods during the PAGA Period. If the number of pay periods during the PAGA Period is more than 10% greater than this figure (i.e., if there are 2,991 or more pay periods) Defendant shall increase the gross settlement amount by the percentage increase in the number of pay periods above 10%. Alternatively, Defendant may choose to cut back the release period to the date on which the number of pay periods is 2,991 pay periods, instead of the PAGA Period.

4.2 Aggrieved Employee Data. Within 20 days of the Court issuing the Approval Order, Defendant will simultaneously deliver the Aggrieved Employee Data to the Administrator in the form of a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet. To protect Aggrieved Employees' privacy rights, the Administrator must maintain the Aggrieved Employee Data in confidence, use the Aggrieved Employee Data only for purposes of this Settlement and for no other purpose, and restrict access to the Aggrieved Employee Data to Administrator employees who need access to the Aggrieved Employee Data to effect and perform under this Agreement. Defendant has a continuing duty to immediately notify PAGA Counsel if it discovers that the Aggrieved Employee Data omitted employee identifying information and to provide corrected or updated Aggrieved Employee Data as soon as reasonably feasible. Without any extension of the deadline by which Defendant must send the Aggrieved Employee Data to the Administrator, the Parties and their counsel will expeditiously use best efforts, in good faith, to reconstruct or otherwise resolve any issues related to missing or omitted Aggrieved Employee Data.

- 4.3 Funding of Gross Settlement Amount. Defendant shall fully fund the Gross Settlement Amount by transmitting the funds to the Administrator no later than 20 days after the Effective Date.
- 4.4 Payments from the Gross Settlement Amount. Within 14 days after Defendant funds the Gross Settlement Amount, the Administrator will mail checks for all Individual PAGA Payments, the LWDA PAGA Payment, the Administration Expenses Payment, the PAGA Counsel Fees Payment and Litigation Expenses Payment under cover letter, substantially in the form attached hereto as "Exhibit A".
- 4.5 The Administrator will issue checks for the Individual PAGA Payments and send them to the Aggrieved Employees via First Class U.S. Mail, postage prepaid. The face of each check shall prominently state the date (not less than 180 days after the date of mailing) when the check will be voided. The Administrator will cancel all checks not cashed by the void date. Before mailing any checks, the Settlement Administrator must update the recipients' mailing addresses using the National Change of Address Database.
- 4.6 The Administrator must conduct an Aggrieved Employee Address Search for all Aggrieved Employees whose checks are returned undelivered without USPS forwarding address. Within 7 days of receiving a returned check the Administrator must re-mail checks to the USPS forwarding address provided or to an address ascertained through the Aggrieved Employee Address Search. The Administrator need not take further steps to deliver checks to Aggrieved Employees whose re-mailed checks are returned as undelivered. The Administrator shall promptly send a replacement check to any Aggrieved Employee whose original check was lost or misplaced, as requested by the Aggrieved Employee prior to the void date.
- 4.7 For any Aggrieved Employee whose Individual PAGA Payment check is uncashed and cancelled after the void date, the Administrator shall transmit the funds represented by such checks to the California Controller's Unclaimed Property Fund in the name of the Aggrieved Employee.
- 4.8 The payment of Individual PAGA Payments shall not obligate Defendant to confer any additional benefits or make any additional payments to the Aggrieved Employees (such as 401(k) contributions or bonuses) beyond those specified in this Agreement.
5. **RELEASES OF CLAIMS.** Effective on the date when Defendant fully funds the entire Gross Settlement Amount, Plaintiff and PAGA Counsel will release claims against all Released Parties as follows:
- 5.1 Plaintiff's Release. Plaintiff and her respective former and present spouses, representatives, agents, attorneys (including PAGA Counsel), heirs, administrators, successors, and assigns generally, release and discharge Released Parties from all claims, transactions, or occurrences that occurred during the PAGA Period, including, but not limited to: (a) all claims that were, or reasonably could have been, alleged, based on the facts contained in the Operative Complaint and the PAGA Notice ("Plaintiff's Release"). Plaintiff's Release does not extend to any claims or actions to enforce this Agreement, or to any claims for vested

benefits, unemployment benefits, disability benefits, social security benefits, workers' compensation benefits that arose at any time, or based on occurrences outside the PAGA Period. Plaintiff acknowledges that Plaintiff may discover facts or law different from, or in addition to, the facts or law that Plaintiff now knows or believes to be true but agrees, nonetheless, that Plaintiff's Release shall be and remain effective in all respects, notwithstanding such different or additional facts or Plaintiff's discovery of them.

5.2 5.1.1 Release by Aggrieved Employees: All Aggrieved Employees are deemed to release, on behalf of themselves and their respective former and present representatives, agents, attorneys, heirs, administrators, successors, and assigns, the Released Parties from all claims for PAGA penalties that were alleged, or reasonably could have been alleged, based on the PAGA Period facts stated in the Operative Complaint and the PAGA Notice.

5.3 Release by PAGA Counsel: PAGA Counsel release on behalf of their present and former attorneys, employees, agents, successors and assigns the Released Parties from all claims for PAGA Fees incurred in connection with the Operative Complaint and the PAGA Period facts stated in the Operative Complaint and the PAGA Notice.

6. **MOTION OR APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL OF SETTLEMENT.** The Parties agree to jointly prepare and file an application or motion for approval of this Settlement.

6.1 Plaintiff's Responsibilities. Plaintiff will prepare all documents necessary for obtaining approval of this Settlement under Labor Code Section 2699, subd. (f)(2)) including: (i) a draft proposed Order Granting Approval of PAGA Settlement; (ii) a signed declaration from the Administrator attaching its "not to exceed" bid for administering the Settlement and attesting to its willingness to serve; competency; operative procedures for protecting the security of Aggrieved Employee Data; amounts of insurance coverage for any data breach, defalcation of funds or other misfeasance; all facts relevant to any actual or potential conflicts of interest with Aggrieved Employees or the LWDA; and the nature and extent of any financial relationship with Plaintiff, PAGA Counsel or Defense Counsel; (iii) a signed declaration from PAGA Counsel firm attesting to its timely transmission to the LWDA of all necessary PAGA documents (initial notice of violations (Labor Code section 2699.3, subd. (a)), Operative Complaint (Labor Code section 2699, subd. (l)(1)), this Agreement (Labor Code section 2699, subd. (l)(2)); and (iv) all facts relevant to any actual or potential conflict of interest with Aggrieved Employees and/or the Administrator. In their Declarations, Plaintiff and PAGA Counsel shall aver that they are not aware of any other pending matter or action asserting claims that will be extinguished or adversely affected by the Settlement.

6.2 Responsibilities of PAGA Counsel. PAGA Counsel and Defense Counsel are jointly responsible for expeditiously finalizing and filing the application or motion for approval of this Settlement no later than 30 days after the full execution of this Agreement and, if necessary, obtaining a prompt hearing date for the motion and appearing in Court to advocate in favor of the motion. PAGA Counsel is responsible for delivering the Court's Preliminary Approval to the Administrator.

6.3 Duty to Cooperate. If the Parties disagree on any aspect of the proposed application or motion for approval of this Settlement and/or the supporting declarations and documents, PAGA

Counsel and Defense Counsel will expeditiously work together on behalf of the Parties by meeting in person or by telephone, and in good faith, to resolve the disagreement. If the Court does not grant the motion for approval of this Settlement or conditions its approval on any material change to this Agreement, PAGA Counsel and Defense Counsel will expeditiously work together on behalf of the Parties by meeting in person or by telephone, and in good faith, to modify the Agreement and otherwise satisfy the Court's concerns.

7. SETTLEMENT ADMINISTRATION.

7.1 Selection of Administrator. The Parties have jointly selected Apex Class Action, LLC to serve as the Administrator and verified that, as a condition of appointment, Apex Class Action, LLC agrees to be bound by this Agreement and to perform, as a fiduciary, all duties specified in this Agreement in exchange for payment of Administration Expenses. The Parties and their Counsel represent that they have no interest or relationship, financial or otherwise, with the Administrator other than a professional relationship arising out of prior experiences administering settlements.

7.2 Employer Identification Number. The Administrator shall have and use its own Employer Identification Number for purposes of calculating payroll tax withholdings and providing reports state and federal tax authorities.

7.3 Qualified Settlement Fund. The Administrator shall establish a settlement fund that meets the requirements of a Qualified Settlement Fund ("QSF") under US Treasury Regulation section 468B-1.

7.4 Administrator Duties. The Administrator has a duty to perform or observe all tasks to be performed or observed by the Administrator contained in this Agreement or otherwise.

8. **AGGRIEVED EMPLOYEE SIZE ESTIMATES.** Based on its records, Defendant estimates that, as of the date of this Settlement Agreement, there are 54 Aggrieved Employees who worked 2,719 Pay Periods during the PAGA Period.

9. **CONTINUING JURISDICTION OF THE COURT.** The Parties agree that, after entry of Judgment, the Court will retain jurisdiction over the Parties, Action, and the Settlement solely for purposes of (i) enforcing this Agreement and/or Judgment, (ii) addressing settlement administration matters, and (iii) addressing such post-Judgment matters as are permitted by law.

9.1 Waiver of Right to Appeal. Provided the Judgment is consistent with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, specifically including the PAGA Counsel Fees Payment and PAGA Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, the Parties, their respective counsel waive all rights to appeal from the Judgment, including all rights to post-judgment and appellate proceedings, the right to file motions to vacate judgment, motions for new trial, extraordinary writs, and appeals. The waiver of appeal does not include any waiver of the right to oppose such motions, writs or appeals. If another party appeals the Judgment, the Parties' obligations to perform under this Agreement will be suspended until such time as the appeal is finally resolved and the Judgment becomes final, except as to matters that do not affect the amount of the Net Settlement Amount.

10. ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS.

- 10.1 No Admission of Liability or Representative Manageability for Other Purposes. This Agreement represents a compromise and settlement of highly disputed claims. Nothing in this Agreement is intended or should be construed as an admission by Defendant that any of the allegations in the Operative Complaint have merit or that Defendant has any liability for any claims asserted; nor should it be intended or construed as an admission by Plaintiff that Defendant's defenses in the Action have merit. The Parties agree that representative treatment is for purposes of this Settlement only. If, for any reason the Court does not approve this Settlement, Defendant reserves all available defenses to the claims in the Action, and Plaintiff reserves the right to contest Defendant's defenses. The Settlement, this Agreement and Parties' willingness to settle the Action will have no bearing on, and will not be admissible in connection with, any litigation (except for proceedings to enforce or effectuate the Settlement and this Agreement).
- 10.2 Integrated Agreement. Upon execution by all Parties and their counsel, this Agreement together with its attached exhibits shall constitute the entire agreement between the Parties relating to the Settlement, excluding the Individual Settlement Agreement, superseding any and all oral representations, warranties, covenants, or inducements made to or by any Party.
- 10.3 Attorney Authorization. PAGA Counsel and Defense Counsel separately warrant and represent that they are authorized by Plaintiff and Defendant, respectively, to take all appropriate action required or permitted to be taken by such Parties pursuant to this Agreement to effectuate its terms, and to execute any other documents reasonably required to effectuate the terms of this Agreement including any amendments to this Agreement.
- 10.4 Cooperation. The Parties and their counsel will cooperate with each other and use their best efforts, in good faith, to implement the Settlement by, among other things modifying the Settlement Agreement, submitting supplemental evidence and supplementing points and authorities as requested by the Court. In the event the Parties are unable to agree upon the form or content of any document necessary to implement the Settlement, or on any modification of the Agreement that may become necessary to implement the Settlement, the Parties will seek the assistance of a mediator and/or the Court for resolution.
- 10.5 No Prior Assignments. The Parties separately represent and warrant that they have not directly or indirectly assigned, transferred, encumbered, or purported to assign, transfer, or encumber to any person or entity and portion of any liability, claim, demand, action, cause of action, or right released and discharged by the Party in this Settlement.
- 10.6 No Tax Advice. Neither Plaintiff, PAGA Counsel, Defendant nor Defense Counsel are providing any advice regarding taxes or taxability, nor shall anything in this Settlement be relied upon as such within the meaning of United States Treasury Department Circular 230 (31 CFR Part 10, as amended) or otherwise.
- 10.7 Modification of Agreement. This Agreement, and all parts of it, may be amended, modified, changed, or waived only by an express written instrument signed by all Parties or their representatives, and approved by the Court.

10.8 Agreement Binding on Successors. This Agreement will be binding upon, and inure to the benefit of, the successors of each of the Parties.

10.9 Applicable Law. All terms and conditions of this Agreement and its exhibits will be governed by and interpreted according to the internal laws of the state of California, without regard to conflict of law principles.

10.10 Cooperation in Drafting. The Parties have cooperated in the drafting and preparation of this Agreement. This Agreement will not be construed against any Party on the basis that the Party was the drafter or participated in the drafting.

10.11 Confidentiality. To the extent permitted by law, all agreements made, and orders entered during Action and in this Agreement relating to the confidentiality of information shall survive the execution of this Agreement.

10.12 Use and Return of Aggrieved Employee Data. Information provided to PAGA Counsel pursuant to Cal. Evid. Code §1152, and all copies and summaries of the PAGA Data provided to PAGA Counsel by Defendant in connection with the mediation, other settlement negotiations, or in connection with the Settlement, may be used only with respect to this Settlement, and no other purpose, and may not be used in any way that violates any existing contractual agreement, statute, or rule of court. Not later than 90 days after the Administrator discharges its obligation to pay out of all Settlement funds, Plaintiff shall destroy all paper and electronic versions of Aggrieved Employee Data received from Defendant unless, prior to the Administrator's payment of all Settlement Funds, Defendant makes a written request to PAGA Counsel for the return, rather than the destructions, of Aggrieved Employee Data.

10.13 Headings. The descriptive heading of any section or paragraph of this Agreement is inserted for convenience of reference only and does not constitute a part of this Agreement.

10.14 Calendar Days. Unless otherwise noted, all reference to "days" in this Agreement shall be to calendar days. In the event any date or deadline set forth in this Agreement falls on a weekend or federal legal holiday, such date or deadline shall be on the first business day thereafter.

10.15 Notice. All notices, demands or other communications between the Parties in connection with this Agreement will be in writing and deemed to have been duly given as of the third business day after sent by email addressed as follows:

Enclosed, please find a check made payable to you. This is your payment from the settlement of the lawsuit titled *Sabine Roseman v. Wags and Walks, Lesley Brog, et al.* (the "Action").

The Action against Wags & Walks and Lesley Brog includes a claim pursuant to the California Labor Code Private Attorneys General Act of 2004, California Labor Code § 2698, *et seq.* ("PAGA"). The Action was brought by Plaintiff Sabine Roseman ("Plaintiff"), a former employee of Wags & Walks, on behalf of the State of California and other alleged aggrieved employees. You have been identified as one of the employees on whose behalf the case was brought.

Plaintiff claimed that Wags & Walks and Lesley Brog owed civil penalties under PAGA for alleged violations of the California Labor Code. The parties have reached a settlement of Plaintiff's claims, and on <<DATE>>, the Court approved the parties' PAGA settlement, including the amount of civil penalties to be paid under the settlement. A portion of the civil penalty settlement amount goes to the State of California's Labor and Workforce Development Agency. Another portion of the civil penalty settlement amount goes to employees of Wags & Walks who were allegedly affected by the alleged violations of the Labor Code. In agreeing to this settlement, Wags & Walks and Lesley Brog do not admit that it is liable in any way to current or former employees for any violations of the California Labor Code or any penalties. The Court has not decided the merits of Plaintiff's claims.

Pursuant to the settlement, enclosed is a check for your share of a portion of the civil penalties. This check will remain valid for 180 days from the date of issuance. If you do not cash your check within 180 days of issuance, the funds will be deposited by the Settlement Administrator with the California State Controller to be deposited in the Unclaimed Property Fund in your name. If you are still employed by Wags & Walks, your decision to cash the check will not affect your employment.

While you were not a party to the Action, you and the State of California have been bound by the settlement entered in this matter and approved by the Court, including the release contained in the settlement. The release pertains to civil penalties under PAGA only. The release includes all claims under the PAGA that were alleged in the Action, including claims for civil penalties under the PAGA based on Wags & Walks and Lesley Brog's alleged violations of California Labor Code sections 201, 202, 203, 204, 210, 226, 226.3, 226.7, 233, 246, 510, 512, 558, 558.1, 1171, 1173, 1174, 1174.5, 1185, 1194, 1194.2, 1197, 1198, 2698, 2699 *et seq.*, 2802, and 3700.5; provisions of

the Industrial Welfare Commission (IWC) Wage Order(s); and California Business & Professions Code section 17200 *et seq.* during the time period of March 10, 2023 through December 2, 2025 (the “PAGA Period”).

Terms & Conditions

The following Terms and Conditions govern the provision of all services to be provided by Apex Class Action and its affiliates ("Apex") to the Client. These terms and conditions are binding and shall apply to all services provided by Apex in relation to any related services or products.

1. **Services:** Apex commits to providing the Client with the administrative services detailed in the attached Proposal (the "Services").

2. **Payment Terms:** As compensation for the legal services to be provided, the Client agrees to pay Apex all fees detailed in the Proposal. The fees quoted in the Proposal (and any subsequent proposals for additional services) are estimates based on the information provided to Apex by the Client. Apex makes no representation that the estimated fees in the Proposal or any subsequent proposals for additional services shall equal the actual fees charged by Apex to the Client, which fees (including individual line items) may be greater or less than estimated. If additional services are requested on an hourly basis and are not specifically detailed in the Proposal, Apex will prepare estimates for such services subject to approval by the Client. In the performance of such additional services, Apex will charge standard hourly fees which shall apply.

3. **Incurred Expenses:** In relation to the provision of services outlined in this agreement, the Client agrees to reimburse Apex for all reasonable out-of-pocket expenses incurred. Such expenses may include, but are not limited to, costs associated with postage, media production or publication, banking fees, brokerage fees, messenger and delivery service expenses, travel expenses, filing fees, office supplies, meals, staff overtime expenses, and other related costs and expenses. If not otherwise specified in writing, fees for print notice and certain expenses, such as media publication and postage, must be paid immediately upon invoicing and, in certain cases, at least ten (10) days prior to the date on which such expenses will be incurred.

4. **Invoicing:** Apex shall present invoices for its fees and expenses on a monthly basis, except as provided in Section 3. The Client agrees to pay each invoice within 30 days of receipt. In the event of non-payment within 90 days of the billing date, an additional service charge of 1.5% per month may apply. Apex reserves the right to increase its prices, charges, and rates annually, subject to reasonable adjustments. If any price increases exceed 10%, Apex shall give thirty (30) days' notice to the Client. In the event of any unpaid invoices beyond 120 days of the due date, Apex reserves the right to withhold services and reports until payment is received, subject to notice to the Client. It is important to note that Apex's failure to provide services and reports in such instances shall not constitute a default under this agreement.

5. **Case Duration:** The duration of these Terms and Conditions, except for the data storage obligations stated in Section 13, shall be in effect until 30 days following the completion of the Services as described in the Proposal. The parties may extend these Terms and Conditions in writing for a mutually agreed-upon period beyond this initial 30-day period.

6. **Termination of Services:** Either party may terminate the Services by providing thirty (30) days written notice to the other party. Alternatively, termination may occur immediately upon written notice for Cause, as defined below. Cause means (i) Apex's gross negligence or willful misconduct that causes serious and material harm to the Client; (ii) the Client's failure to pay Apex invoices for more than one hundred twenty (120) days from the date of the invoice; or (iii) the accrual of invoices or unpaid services where Apex reasonably believes it will not be paid. Termination of the Services shall not relieve the Client of its obligation to pay Apex for services rendered prior to the termination.

7. **Independent Contractor:** As an independent contractor, Apex will provide services under the terms of this agreement. It is agreed that neither Apex nor any of its employees will be considered an employee of the Client. Consequently, Apex and its employees will not be eligible for any benefits provided by the Client to its employees. The Client will not make any tax deductions from the payments due to Apex for state or federal tax purposes. Apex will be solely responsible for paying all taxes and other payments due on payments received from the Client under this agreement.

8. Apex warrants that the Services outlined in the Proposal will be performed in accordance with the standards generally adhered to by professionals providing similar services. It is acknowledged that the Services may entail the likelihood of some human and machine errors, omissions, delays, and losses that may result in damage. However, Apex shall not be held liable for such errors, omissions, delays, or losses unless they are caused by its gross negligence or willful misconduct. In the event of any breach of this warranty by Apex, the Client's sole remedy will be limited to Apex's rerunning, at its expense, any inaccurate output provided that such inaccuracies occurred solely as a result of Apex's gross negligence or willful misconduct under this agreement.

9. **Limitation of Liability:** The Client acknowledges that Apex shall not be held liable for any consequential, special, or incidental damages incurred by the Client in relation to the performance of Services, whether the claim is based on breach of warranty, contract, tort (including negligence), strict liability, or any other grounds. Under no circumstances shall Apex's liability to the Client, for any Losses (including court costs and reasonable attorney's fees), arising out of or in connection with these Terms and Conditions, exceed the total amount charged or chargeable to the Client for the specific service(s) that caused the Losses.

10. **Indemnification:** The Client agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Apex from any losses, suits, actions, judgments, fines, costs, liabilities, or claims arising from any action or proceeding relating to the Services provided by Apex, regardless of whether or not it results in liability (collectively referred to as "Indemnified Claims"). However, this indemnification provision shall not apply to the extent that such Indemnified Claims are caused by Apex's willful misconduct, gross negligence, or breach of these Terms and Conditions. This provision shall survive termination of the Services.

11. **Confidentiality:** Apex will uphold strict confidentiality between Apex and the Client and applies to all non-public records, documents, systems, procedures, processes, software, and other information received by either party in connection with the performance of services under these terms. Both Apex and the Client agree to keep confidential all such non-public information, including any material marked or identified as confidential or proprietary. Any such confidential information shall not be disclosed, provided, disseminated, or otherwise made available to any third party, except as required to fulfill the parties' obligations under these terms. The parties acknowledge that in the event of any request to disclose any confidential information in connection with a legal or administrative proceeding, or otherwise to comply with a legal requirement, prompt notice of such request must be given to the other party to enable that party to seek an appropriate protective order or other remedy or to waive compliance with the relevant provisions of these terms. If the Client seeks a protective order or another remedy, Apex, at the Client's expense, will cooperate with and assist the Client in such efforts. If the Client fails to obtain a protective order or waives compliance with the relevant provisions of these terms, Apex will disclose only that portion of the confidential information that it determines it is required to disclose. This confidentiality provision shall survive termination of the services provided. Both parties acknowledge and agree that any breach of this confidentiality may cause irreparable harm to the non-breaching party and that injunctive relief may be necessary to prevent any actual or threatened breach. The terms set forth between the parties supersede all prior negotiations, understandings, and agreements between the parties concerning confidentiality. These terms may only be amended in writing and signed by both parties.

12. **Ownership of the programs, system data, and materials provided by Apex to the Client during the course of providing services herein shall solely belong to Apex. It is acknowledged that fees and expenses paid by the Client do not confer any rights in such property. It is also understood that the said property is made available to the Client solely for the purpose of using it during and in connection with the services provided by Apex.**

13. Upon the completion of the administration and unless retention instructions are ordered by the court, Apex will notify the client that it will destroy and/or return all confidential information and property within 90 days upon the client's written request. Alternatively, the material may be stored for one year at a monthly fee of \$1.50 per storage box for paper documents and \$0.01 per image for electronic copies over a period of three years, which compensates Apex for its electronic and hard-copy storage costs. Apex will not be liable for any damages, liability, or expenses incurred in connection with any delay in delivery of, or damage to disks, magnetic tapes, or any input data provided by the client or its representatives unless Apex has agreed in writing to assume such responsibility.

14. **COMPLETE AGREEMENT.** These Terms and Conditions, along with the attached Proposal, represent the complete agreement and understanding between the parties and override any prior agreements (whether written or oral) between Apex and the Client regarding the subject matter. Any modification to these Terms and Conditions may only be made in writing and must be signed by both Apex and the Client. The headings in this document are included for convenience only and do not alter or restrict any provisions in these Terms and Conditions. They may not be used in the interpretation of these Terms and Conditions.

15. This provision outlines the requirements for providing notice or other communication under this agreement. All such communications must be in writing and can be delivered either by personal delivery or through U.S. Mail with prepaid postage or overnight courier. Once delivered personally or sent through the mail, the notice will be considered given after five (5) days from the deposit date in the U.S. Mail. Alternatively, if sent through an overnight courier, the notice will be considered given one business day after delivery to the such courier. It's important to note that the notice must be provided to a responsible officer or principal of the Client or Apex, depending on the case.

16. **Force Majeure:** In the event of any failure or delay in performance due to circumstances beyond Apex's control, including but not limited to strikes, lockouts, fires, floods, acts of God or public enemy, riots, civil disorders, insurrections, war or war conditions, or interference by civil or military authorities, Apex shall not be held liable for any resulting loss or damage. The time for performance under this agreement shall be extended for a period equal to the duration of the disabling cause and a reasonable time thereafter. This provision shall constitute a force majeure clause and shall be construed accordingly.

17. The applicable state and federal laws shall govern the interpretation and enforcement of these Terms and Conditions. No choice of law or conflict of laws provisions shall affect this governing law provision.

18. **Severability:** This applies to all clauses and covenants contained within these Terms and Conditions. In the event that any clause or covenant is deemed invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall remain valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permissible by law. The validity, legality, and enforceability of the remaining provisions shall in no way be affected or impaired by the invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability of any provision deemed so.

19. **Nonwaiver:** This applies to these Terms and Conditions. This means that any failure by one party to enforce a provision of these terms on one or more occasions shall not be construed as a waiver of that provision. In other words, any failure to enforce a provision does not give up the right to enforce it in the future. All provisions of these Terms and Conditions remain in full force and effect, regardless of any prior failure to enforce them.
