1. Failure to Pay Minimum and Straight Time Wages (Cal. Lab. Code §§ 204, 1194, 1194.2, and 1197);
2. Failure to Pay Overtime Wages (Cal. Lab. Code §§ 1194 and 1198);
3. Failure to Provide Meal Periods (Cal. Lab. Code §§ 226.7, 512);
4. Failure to Authorize and Permit Rest Periods (Cal. Lab. Code §§ 226.7);
5. Failure to Timely Pay Final Wages at Termination (Cal. Lab. Code §§ 201-203);
6. Failure to Provide Accurate Itemized Wage Statements (Cal. Lab. Code § 226);
7. Failure to Indemnify Employees for Expenditures (Cal. Lab. Code § 2802);
8. Failure to Produce Requested Employment Records (Cal. Lab. Code §§ 226 and 1198.5);
9. Unfair Business Practices (Cal. Bus. & Prof. Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*); and
10. Civil Penalties Under PAGA (Cal. Lab. Code §§ 2699, *et seq.*).

**DEMAND FOR JURY TRIAL**

1 Plaintiff ALMA ISABEL ESTRADA (“Plaintiff”), based upon facts that either have  
2 evidentiary support or are likely to have evidentiary support after a reasonable opportunity for  
3 further investigation and discovery, alleges as follows:

4 **INTRODUCTION & PRELIMINARY STATEMENT**

5 1. Plaintiff brings this action against Defendant MOSAIC SUPPLY CHAIN  
6 SOLUTIONS and DOES 1 through 10 (hereinafter collectively referred to as “Defendants”) for  
7 California Labor Code violations and unfair business practices stemming from Defendants’ failure  
8 to pay for all hours worked (minimum, straight time, and overtime wages), failure to provide meal  
9 periods, failure to authorize and permit rest periods, failure to timely pay final wages, failure to  
10 furnish accurate wage statements, failure to indemnify employees for expenditures, and failure to  
11 produce requested employment records.

12 2. Plaintiff brings the First through Ninth Causes of Action individually and as a class  
13 action on behalf of herself and certain current and former employees of Defendants (hereinafter  
14 collectively referred to as the “Class” or “Class Members,” and defined more fully below). The  
15 Class consists of Plaintiff and all other persons who have been employed by any Defendant in  
16 California as an hourly-paid or non-exempt employee during the statute of limitations period  
17 applicable to the claims pleaded here.

18 3. Plaintiff brings the Tenth Cause of Action as a representative action under the  
19 California Private Attorneys General Act (“PAGA”) to recover civil penalties that are owed to  
20 Plaintiff, the State of California, and past and present non-exempt employees by Defendant in the  
21 State of California during the statute of limitations period for her PAGA claim (hereinafter referred  
22 to as the “Aggrieved Employees”).

23 4. Defendants own/owned and operate/operated an industry, business, and  
24 establishment within the State of California, including Santa Clara County. As such, and based  
25 upon all the facts and circumstances incident to Defendants’ business in California, Defendants are  
26 subject to the California Labor Code, Wage Orders issued by the Industrial Welfare Commission  
27 (“IWC”), and the California Business & Professions Code.

28 5. Despite these requirements, throughout the statutory period, Defendants maintained

1 a systematic, company-wide policy and practice of:

- 2 (a) Failing to pay employees for all hours worked, including all minimum,  
3 straight time, and overtime wages in compliance with the California Labor  
4 Code and IWC Wage Orders;
- 5 (b) Failing to provide employees with timely and duty-free meal periods in  
6 compliance with the California Labor Code and IWC Wage Orders, failing  
7 to maintain accurate records of all meal periods taken or missed, and failing  
8 to pay an additional hour's pay for each workday a meal period violation  
9 occurred;
- 10 (c) Failing to authorize and permit employees to take timely and duty-free rest  
11 periods in compliance with the California Labor Code and IWC Wage  
12 Orders, and failing to pay an additional hour's pay for each workday a rest  
13 period violation occurred;
- 14 (d) Willfully failing to pay employees all expenditures, minimum wages,  
15 straight time wages, overtime wages, meal period premium wages, and rest  
16 period premium wages due within the time period specified by California  
17 law when employment terminates;
- 18 (e) Failing to provide employees with accurate, itemized wage statements  
19 containing all the information required by the California Labor Code and  
20 IWC Wage Orders;
- 21 (f) Failing to indemnify employees for expenditures incurred in direct discharge  
22 of duties of employment; and,
- 23 (g) Failing to timely produce requested employment records as required by the  
24 California Labor Code and IWC Wage Order.

25 6. On information and belief, Defendants, and each of them were on actual and  
26 constructive notice of the improprieties alleged herein and intentionally refused to rectify their  
27 unlawful policies. Defendants' violations, as alleged above, during all relevant times herein were  
28 willful and deliberate.

7. At all relevant times, Defendants were and are legally responsible for all of the unlawful conduct, policies, practices, acts and omissions as described in each and all of the foregoing paragraphs as the employer of Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees. Further, Defendants are responsible for each of the unlawful acts or omissions complained of herein under the doctrine of “respondeat superior.”

## **THE PARTIES**

### **A. Plaintiff**

8. Plaintiff ALMA ISABEL ESTRADA is a California resident who worked for Defendants in Santa Clara County, California as an hourly-paid, non-exempt employee from approximately August 2023 to approximately January 2024.

9. Plaintiff reserves the right to seek leave to amend this complaint to add new Plaintiffs, if necessary, in order to establish suitable representative(s) pursuant to *La Sala v. American Savings and Loan Association* (1971) 5 Cal.3d 864, 872, and other applicable law.

### **B. Defendants**

10. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based upon that information and belief alleges, that Defendant MOSAIC SUPPLY CHAIN SOLUTIONS is, and at all times herein mentioned, was:

- (a) A business entity qualified to do business and actually conducting business in numerous counties throughout the State of California, including in Santa Clara County; and,
- (b) The former employer of Plaintiff and the current and/or former employer of the putative Class, and Aggrieved Employees because Defendant MOSAIC SUPPLY CHAIN SOLUTIONS suffered and permitted Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees to work, and/or controlled their wages, hours, or working conditions.

11. Plaintiff does not know the true names or capacities of the persons or entities sued herein as Does 1-10, inclusive, and therefore sues said Defendants by such fictitious names. Each of the Doe Defendants was in some manner legally responsible for the damages suffered by

1 Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees as alleged herein. Plaintiff will amend this  
2 complaint to set forth the true names and capacities of these Defendants when they have been  
3 ascertained, together with appropriate charging allegations, as may be necessary.

4 12. At all times mentioned herein, the Defendants named as Does 1-10, inclusive, and  
5 each of them, were residents of, doing business in, availed themselves of the jurisdiction of, and/or  
6 injured a significant number of the Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees in the State  
7 of California.

8 13. Plaintiff is informed and believes and thereon alleges that at all relevant times each  
9 Defendant, directly or indirectly, or through agents or other persons, employed Plaintiff and the  
10 other employees described in the class definitions below, and exercised control over their wages,  
11 hours, and working conditions. Plaintiff is informed and believes and thereon alleges that, at all  
12 relevant times, each Defendant was the principal, agent, partner, joint venturer, officer, director,  
13 controlling shareholder, subsidiary, affiliate, parent corporation, successor in interest and/or  
14 predecessor in interest of some or all of the other Defendants, and was engaged with some or all  
15 of the other Defendants in a joint enterprise for profit, and bore such other relationships to some  
16 or all of the other Defendants so as to be liable for their conduct with respect to the matters alleged  
17 below. Plaintiff is informed and believes and thereon alleges that each Defendant acted pursuant  
18 to and within the scope of the relationships alleged above, that each Defendant knew or should  
19 have known about, and authorized, ratified, adopted, approved, controlled, aided and abetted the  
20 conduct of all other Defendants.

21 **ALLEGATIONS COMMON TO ALL CAUSES OF ACTION**

22 14. Plaintiff worked for Defendants in California as an hourly-paid, non-exempt  
23 employee. During Plaintiff's employment for Defendants, Defendants paid Plaintiff an hourly  
24 wage and classified her as non-exempt from overtime. Defendants typically scheduled Plaintiff to  
25 work at least five days in a workweek and at least eight hours per day, but Plaintiff regularly  
26 worked more than eight hours in a workday and more than forty (40) hours in a workweek.

27 15. Throughout Plaintiff's employment, Defendants failed to pay for all hours worked  
28 (including minimum, straight time, and overtime wages), failed to provide Plaintiff with legally

1 compliant meal periods, failed to authorize and permit Plaintiff to take rest periods, failed to timely  
2 pay all final wages to Plaintiff when Defendants terminated her employment, failed to furnish  
3 accurate wage statements to Plaintiff, failed to indemnify Plaintiff for expenditures, and failed to  
4 produce requested employment records. As discussed below, Plaintiff's experience working for  
5 Defendants was typical and illustrative.

6 16. Throughout the statutory period, Defendants maintained a policy and practice of not  
7 paying Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees for all hours worked, including  
8 minimum, straight time, and overtime wages. Defendants required Plaintiff, the Class, and the  
9 Aggrieved Employees to work "off-the-clock", uncompensated, by, for example, requiring  
10 Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees to continue working during unpaid meal  
11 periods. Some of this unpaid work should have been paid at the overtime rate. In failing to pay  
12 for all hours worked, Defendants also failed to maintain accurate records of the hours Plaintiff, the  
13 Class, and the Aggrieved Employees worked.

14 17. Throughout the statutory period, Defendants wrongfully failed to provide Plaintiff,  
15 the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees with legally compliant meal periods. Defendants  
16 regularly, but not always, required Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees to work in  
17 excess of five consecutive hours a day without providing a 30-minute, uninterrupted, and duty-free  
18 meal period for every five hours of work, or without compensating Plaintiff, the Class, and the  
19 Aggrieved Employees for meal periods that were not provided by the end of the fifth hour of work  
20 or tenth hour of work. Instead, Defendants continued to assert control over Plaintiff, the Class,  
21 and the Aggrieved Employees by requiring, pressuring, or encouraging them to perform work tasks  
22 which could not be completed without working in lieu of taking mandatory meal periods, or by  
23 denying Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees permission to take a meal period.  
24 Accordingly, Defendants' policy and practice was not to provide meal periods to Plaintiff, the  
25 Class, and the Aggrieved Employees in compliance with California law.

26 18. Throughout the statutory period, Defendants have wrongfully failed to authorize  
27 and permit Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees to take legally compliant rest periods.  
28 Defendants regularly required Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees to work in excess

1 of four consecutive hours a day without Defendants authorizing and permitting them to take a 10-  
2 minute, uninterrupted, duty-free rest period for every four hours of work (or major fraction of four  
3 hours), or without compensating Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees for rest periods  
4 that were not authorized or permitted. Instead, Defendants continued to assert control over  
5 Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees by requiring, pressuring, or encouraging them  
6 to perform work tasks which could not be completed without working in lieu of taking mandatory  
7 rest periods, or by denying Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees permission to take a  
8 rest period. Accordingly, Defendants' policy and practice was to not authorize and permit Plaintiff,  
9 the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees to take rest periods in compliance with California law.

10 19. Throughout the statutory period, Defendants willfully failed and refused to timely  
11 pay Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees all final wages due at their termination of  
12 employment. In addition, Plaintiff's final paychecks did not include payment for all expenditures,  
13 minimum wages, straight time wages, overtime wages, meal period premium wages, and rest  
14 period premium wages owed to him by Defendants at the conclusion of her employment. On  
15 information and belief, Defendants' failure to timely pay Plaintiff's final wages when her  
16 employment terminated was not a single, isolated incident, but was instead consistent with  
17 Defendants' policy and practice that applied to Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees.

18 20. Throughout the statutory period, Defendants failed to furnish Plaintiff, the Class,  
19 and the Aggrieved Employees with accurate, itemized wage statements showing all applicable  
20 hourly rates, all overtime hourly rates, and all gross and net wages earned (including correct hours  
21 worked, correct wages for meal periods that were not provided in accordance with California law,  
22 and correct wages for rest periods that were not authorized and permitted to take in accordance  
23 with California law). As a result of these violations of California Labor Code § 226(a), the  
24 Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees suffered injury because, among other things:

- 25 (a) the violations led them to believe that they were not entitled to be paid  
26 minimum, straight time, overtime, meal period premium, and rest period  
27 premium wages, even though they were entitled;
- 28 (b) the violations led them to believe that they had been paid the minimum,

straight time, overtime, meal period premium, and rest period premium wages, even though they had not been;

(c) the violations led them to believe they were not entitled to be paid minimum, straight time, overtime, meal period premium, and rest period premium wages at the correct California rate even though they were entitled;

(d) the violations led them to believe they had been paid minimum, straight time, overtime, meal period premium, and rest period premium wages at the correct California rate even though they had not been;

(e) the violations hindered them from determining the amounts of minimum, straight time, overtime, meal period premium, and rest period premium wages owed to them;

(f) in connection with their employment before and during this action, and in connection with prosecuting this action, the violations caused them to have to perform mathematical computations to determine the amounts of wages owed to them, computations they would not have to make if the wage statements contained the required accurate information;

(g) by understating the wages truly due to them, the violations caused them to lose entitlement and/or accrual of the full amount of Social Security, disability, unemployment, and other governmental benefits;

(h) the wage statements inaccurately understated the wages, hours, and wage rates to which Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees were entitled, and Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees were paid less than the wages and wage rates to which they were entitled.

Thus, Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees are owed the amounts provided for in California Labor Code § 226(e) and injunctive relief under California Labor Code § 226(h).

21. Throughout the statutory period, Defendants have wrongfully required Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees to pay expenses that they incurred in direct discharge of their duties for Defendants. Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees regularly paid out-of-

1 pocket for necessary employment-related expenses, including, without limitation, for work attire.

2 22. Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees incurred substantial expenses as  
3 a direct result of performing their job duties for Defendants, but Defendants failed to indemnify  
4 Plaintiff, the Class, and the Aggrieved Employees for these employment-related expenses.

5 23. On February 12, 2024, Plaintiff sent requests through her counsel to Defendants for  
6 her personnel file, pay records, wage statements, timekeeping records, and other employment-  
7 related documents pursuant to Labor Code section 226 and 1198.5. However, Defendants failed to  
8 timely produce all the requested employment records, in violation of Labor Code sections 226 and  
9 1198.5. Defendants have not produced all of the requested employment records for Plaintiff as of  
10 the date of this Complaint.

11  
12 **CLASS ACTION ALLEGATIONS**

13 24. Plaintiff brings certain claims individually, as well as on behalf of each and all other  
14 persons similarly situated, and thus, seeks class certification under California Code of Civil  
15 Procedure § 382.

16 25. All claims alleged herein arise under California law for which Plaintiff seeks relief  
17 authorized by California law.

18 26. The proposed Class consists of and is defined as:

19 All persons who worked for any Defendant in California as an hourly-paid or  
20 non-exempt employee at any time during the period beginning four years and 178  
21 days before the filing of the initial complaint in this action and ending when  
notice to the Class is sent.<sup>1</sup>

22 27. At all material times, Plaintiff was a member of the Class.

23 28. Plaintiff undertook this concerted activity to improve the wages and working  
24 conditions of all Class Members.

25 29. There is a well-defined community of interest in the litigation and the Class is  
26 readily ascertainable:

27 <sup>1</sup> In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Judicial Council of California adopted Emergency Rule 9(a)  
28 (California Rules of Court), whereby “statutes of limitations and repose for civil causes of action that exceed 180  
days are tolled from April 6, 2020 to October 1, 2020.”

- 1 (a) Numerosity: The members of the Class (and each subclass, if any) are so  
2 numerous that joinder of all members would be unfeasible and impractical.  
3 The membership of the entire Class is unknown to Plaintiff at this time;  
4 however, the Class is estimated to be greater than forty (40) individuals and  
5 the identity of such membership is readily ascertainable by inspection of  
6 Defendants' records.
- 7 (b) Typicality: Plaintiff is qualified to, and will, fairly and adequately protect  
8 the interests of each Class Member with whom there is a shared, well-  
9 defined community of interest, and Plaintiff's claims (or defenses, if any)  
10 are typical of all Class Members' claims as demonstrated herein.
- 11 (c) Adequacy: Plaintiff is qualified to, and will, fairly and adequately protect  
12 the interests of each Class Member with whom there is a shared, well-  
13 defined community of interest and typicality of claims, as demonstrated  
14 herein. Plaintiff has no conflicts with or interests antagonistic to any Class  
15 Member. Plaintiff's attorneys, the proposed class counsel, are versed in the  
16 rules governing class action discovery, certification, and settlement.  
17 Plaintiff has incurred, and throughout the duration of this action, will  
18 continue to incur costs and attorneys' fees that have been, are, and will be  
19 necessarily expended for the prosecution of this action for the substantial  
20 benefit of each class member.
- 21 (d) Superiority: A Class Action is superior to other available methods for the  
22 fair and efficient adjudication of the controversy, including consideration of:  
23 1) The interests of the members of the Class in individually controlling  
24 the prosecution or defense of separate actions;  
25 2) The extent and nature of any litigation concerning the controversy  
26 already commenced by or against members of the Class;  
27 3) The desirability or undesirability of concentrating the litigation of the  
28 claims in the particular forum; and,

4) The difficulties likely to be encountered in the management of a class action.

(e) Public Policy Considerations: The public policy of the State of California is to resolve the California Labor Code claims of many employees through a class action. Indeed, current employees are often afraid to assert their rights out of fear of direct or indirect retaliation. Former employees are also fearful of bringing actions because they believe their former employers might damage their future endeavors through negative references and/or other means. Class actions provide the class members who are not named in the complaint with a type of anonymity that allows for the vindication of their rights at the same time as their privacy is protected.

30. There are common questions of law and fact as to the Class (and each subclass, if any) that predominate over questions affecting only individual members, including without limitation, whether, as alleged herein, Defendants have:

- (a) Failed to pay Class Members for all hours worked, including minimum, straight time, and overtime wages;
- (b) Failed to provide meal periods and pay meal period premium wages to Class Members;
- (c) Failed to authorize and permit rest periods and pay rest period premium wages to Class Members;
- (d) Failed to provide Class Members with timely final wages;
- (e) Failed to provide Class Members with accurate wage statements;
- (f) Failed to indemnify Class Members for expenditures;
- (g) Failed to produce requested employment records to Class Members; and,
- (h) Violated California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200 *et. seq.* as a result of their illegal conduct as described above.

31. This Court should permit this action to be maintained as a class action pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure § 382 because:

- (a) The questions of law and fact common to the Class predominate over any question affecting only individual members;
- (b) A class action is superior to any other available method for the fair and efficient adjudication of the claims of the members of the Class;
- (c) The members of the Class are so numerous that it is impractical to bring all members of the class before the Court;
- (d) Plaintiff, and the other members of the Class, will not be able to obtain effective and economic legal redress unless the action is maintained as a class action;
- (e) There is a community of interest in obtaining appropriate legal and equitable relief for the statutory violations, and in obtaining adequate compensation for the damages and injuries for which Defendants are responsible in an amount sufficient to adequately compensate the members of the Class for the injuries sustained;
- (f) Without class certification, the prosecution of separate actions by individual members of the class would create a risk of:
  - 1) Inconsistent or varying adjudications with respect to individual members of the Class which would establish incompatible standards of conduct for Defendants; and/or,
  - 2) Adjudications with respect to the individual members which would, as a practical matter, be dispositive of the interests of other members not parties to the adjudications, or would substantially impair or impede their ability to protect their interests, including but not limited to the potential for exhausting the funds available from those parties who are, or may be, responsible Defendants; and,
- (g) Defendants have acted or refused to act on grounds generally applicable to the Class, thereby making final injunctive relief appropriate with respect to the class as a whole.

32. Plaintiff contemplates the eventual issuance of notice to the proposed members of the Class that would set forth the subject and nature of the instant action. The Defendants' own business records may be utilized for assistance in the preparation and issuance of the contemplated notices. To the extent that any further notices may be required, Plaintiff contemplates the use of additional techniques and forms commonly used in class actions, such as published notice, e-mail notice, website notice, first-class mail, or combinations thereof, or by other methods suitable to the Class and deemed necessary and/or appropriate by the Court.

**FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**

**(Against All Defendants for Failure to Pay Minimum and  
Straight Time Wages for All Hours Worked)**

33. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

34. "Hours worked" is the time during which an employee is subject to the control of an employer, and includes all the time the employee is suffered or permitted to work, whether or not required to do so.

35. At all relevant times herein mentioned, Defendants knowingly failed to pay to Plaintiff and the Class compensation for all hours they worked. By their failure to pay compensation for each hour worked as alleged above, Defendants willfully violated the provisions of California Labor Code § 1194, and any additional applicable Wage Orders, which require such compensation to non-exempt employees.

36. Accordingly, Plaintiff and the Class are entitled to recover minimum and straight time wages for all non-overtime hours worked for Defendants.

37. By and through the conduct described above, Plaintiff and the Class have been deprived of their rights to be paid wages earned by virtue of their employment with Defendants.

38. By virtue of the Defendants' unlawful failure to pay additional compensation to Plaintiff and the Class for their non-overtime hours worked without pay, Plaintiff and the Class suffered, and will continue to suffer, damages in amounts which are presently unknown to Plaintiff and the Class and which will be ascertained according to proof at trial.

39. By failing to keep adequate time records required by California Labor Code § 1174(d), Defendants have made it difficult to calculate the full extent of minimum wage compensation due Plaintiff and the Class.

40. Pursuant to California Labor Code § 1194.2, Plaintiff and the Class are entitled to recover liquidated damages (double damages) for Defendants' failure to pay minimum wages.

41. California Labor Code § 204 requires employers to provide employees with all wages due and payable twice a month. Throughout the statute of limitations period applicable to this cause of action, Plaintiff and the Class were entitled to be paid twice a month at rates required by law, including minimum and straight time wages. However, during all such times, Defendants systematically failed and refused to pay Plaintiff and the Class all such wages due and failed to pay those wages twice a month.

42. Plaintiff and the Class are also entitled to seek recovery of all unpaid minimum and straight time wages, interest, and reasonable attorneys' fees and costs pursuant to California Labor Code §§ 218.5, 218.6, and 1194(a).

## **SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION**

### **(Against All Defendants for Failure to Pay Overtime Wages)**

43. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

44. California Labor Code § 510 provides that employees in California shall not be employed more than eight hours in any workday or forty (40) hours in a workweek unless they receive additional compensation beyond their regular wages in amounts specified by law.

45. California Labor Code §§ 1194 and 1198 provide that employees in California shall not be employed more than eight hours in any workday unless they receive additional compensation beyond their regular wages in amounts specified by law. Additionally, California Labor Code § 1198 states that the employment of an employee for longer hours than those fixed by the IWC is unlawful.

46. At all times relevant hereto, Plaintiff and the Class have worked more than eight hours in a workday and/or more than forty (40) hours in a workweek, as employees of Defendants.

### THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION

**(Against All Defendants for Failure to Provide Meal Periods)**

52. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

53. Under California law, Defendants have an affirmative obligation to relieve the Plaintiff and the Class of all duty in order to take their first daily meal periods no later than the start of Plaintiff's and the Class' sixth hour of work in a workday, and to take their second meal periods no later than the start of the eleventh hour of work in the workday. California Labor Code

§ 512, and Section 11 of the applicable Wage Orders require that an employer provide unpaid meal periods of at least thirty (30) minutes for each five-hour period worked. It is a violation of California Labor Code § 226.7 for an employer to require any employee to work during any meal period mandated under any Wage Order.

54. Despite these legal requirements, Defendants regularly failed to provide Plaintiff and the Class with both meal periods as required by California law. By their failure to permit and authorize Plaintiff and the Class to take all meal periods as alleged above (or due to the fact that Defendants made it impossible or impracticable to take these uninterrupted meal periods), Defendants willfully violated the provisions of California Labor Code § 226.7 and the applicable Wage Orders.

55. Under California law, Plaintiff and the Class are entitled to be paid one hour of additional wages for each workday he or she was not provided with all required meal period(s), plus interest thereon.

#### **FOURTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

##### **(Against All Defendants for Failure to Authorize and Permit Rest Periods)**

56. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

57. Defendants are required by California law to authorize and permit breaks of ten uninterrupted minutes for each four hours of work or major fraction of four hours (i.e. more than two hours). California Labor Code § 512, the applicable Wage Orders require that the employer permit and authorize all employees to take paid rest periods of ten minutes each for each 4-hour period worked. Thus, for example, if an employee's work time is six hours and ten minutes, the employee is entitled to two rest breaks. Each failure to authorize rest breaks as so required is itself a violation of California's rest break laws. It is a violation of California Labor Code § 226.7 for an employer to require any employee to work during any rest period mandated under any Wage Order.

58. Despite these legal requirements, Defendants failed to authorize Plaintiff and the Class to take rest breaks, regardless of whether employees worked more than four hours in a

workday. By their failure to permit and authorize Plaintiff and the Class to take rest periods as alleged above (or due to the fact that Defendants made it impossible or impracticable to take these uninterrupted rest periods), Defendants willfully violated the provisions of California Labor Code § 226.7 and the applicable Wage Orders.

59. Under California law, Plaintiff and the Class are entitled to be paid one hour of premium wages rate for each workday he or she was not provided with all required rest break(s), plus interest thereon.

### **FIFTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

#### **(Against All Defendants for Failure to Pay Wages of Discharged Employees – Waiting Time Penalties)**

60. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

61. At all times herein set forth, California Labor Code §§ 201 and 202 provide that if an employer discharges an employee, the wages earned and unpaid at the time of discharge are due and payable immediately, and that if an employee voluntarily leaves his or her employment, his or her wages shall become due and payable not later than seventy-two (72) hours thereafter, unless the employee has given seventy-two (72) hours previous notice of his or her intention to quit, in which case the employee is entitled to his or her wages at the time of quitting.

62. Within the applicable statute of limitations, the employment of many other members of the Class ended, i.e. was terminated by quitting or discharge, and the employment of others will be. However, during the relevant time period, Defendants failed, and continue to fail to pay terminated Class Members, without abatement, all wages required to be paid by California Labor Code §§ 201 and 202 either at the time of discharge, or within seventy-two (72) hours of their leaving Defendants' employ.

63. Defendants' failure to pay those Class members who are no longer employed by Defendants their wages earned and unpaid at the time of discharge, or within seventy-two (72) hours of their leaving Defendants' employ, is in violation of California Labor Code §§ 201 and 202.

64. California Labor Code § 203 provides that if an employer willfully fails to pay wages owed, in accordance with §§ 201 and 202, then the wages of the employee shall continue as a penalty wage from the due date, and at the same rate until paid or until an action is commenced; but the wages shall not continue for more than thirty (30) days.

65. The Class is entitled to recover from Defendants their additionally accruing wages for each day they were not paid, at their regular hourly rate of pay, up to thirty (30) days maximum pursuant to California Labor Code § 203.

66. Pursuant to California Labor Code §§ 218.5, 218.6 and 1194, the Class is also entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys' fees, interest, expenses, and costs incurred in this action.

#### **SIXTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

##### **(Against All Defendants for Failure to Provide and Maintain**

##### **Accurate and Compliant Wage Records)**

67. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

68. At all material times set forth herein, California Labor Code § 226(a) provides that every employer shall furnish each of his or her employees an accurate itemized wage statement in writing showing nine pieces of information, including: (1) gross wages earned, (2) total hours worked by the employee, (3) the number of piece-rate units earned and any applicable piece rate if the employee is paid on a piece-rate basis, (4) all deductions, provided that all deductions made on written orders of the employee may be aggregated and shown as one item, (5) net wages earned, (6) the inclusive dates of the period for which the employee is paid, (7) the name of the employee and the last four digits of his or her social security number or an employee identification number other than a social security number, (8) the name and address of the legal entity that is the employer, and (9) all applicable hourly rates in effect during the pay period and the corresponding number of hours worked at each hourly rate by the employee.

69. Defendants have intentionally and willfully failed to provide employees with complete and accurate wage statements. The deficiencies include, among other things, the failure

1 to correctly identify the gross wages earned by Plaintiff and the Class, the failure to list the true  
2 “total hours worked by the employee,” and the failure to list the true net wages earned.

3 70. As a result of Defendants’ violation of California Labor Code § 226(a), Plaintiff and  
4 the Class have suffered injury and damage to their statutorily protected rights.

5 71. Specifically, Plaintiff and the members of the Class have been injured by  
6 Defendants’ intentional violation of California Labor Code § 226(a) because they were denied both  
7 their legal right to receive, and their protected interest in receiving, accurate, itemized wage  
8 statements under California Labor Code § 226(a).

9 72. Calculation of the true wage entitlement for Plaintiff and the Class is difficult and  
10 time consuming. As a result of this unlawful burden, Plaintiff and the Class were also injured as  
11 a result of having to bring this action to attempt to obtain correct wage information following  
12 Defendants’ refusal to comply with many of the mandates of California’s Labor Code and related  
13 laws and regulations.

14 73. Plaintiff and the Class are entitled to recover from Defendants the greater of their  
15 actual damages caused by Defendants’ failure to comply with California Labor Code § 226(a), or  
16 an aggregate penalty not exceeding four thousand dollars (\$4,000) per employee.

17 74. Plaintiff and the Class are also entitled to injunctive relief, as well as an award of  
18 attorney’s fees and costs to ensure compliance with this section, pursuant to California Labor Code  
19 § 226(h).

## 20 **SEVENTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

### 21 **(Against All Defendants for Failure to Indemnify Employees for Expenditures)**

22 75. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs  
23 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

24 76. As set forth above, Plaintiff and the Class were required to incur substantial  
25 necessary expenditures and losses in direct consequence of the discharge of their duties or of their  
26 obedience to directions of Defendants.

27 77. Defendants violated California Labor Code § 2802, by failing to pay and indemnify  
28 Plaintiff and the Class for necessary expenditures and losses incurred in direct consequence of the

1 discharge of their duties or of their obedience to directions of Defendants.

2 78. As a result, Plaintiff and the Class were damaged at least in the amounts of the  
3 expenses they paid, or which were deducted by Defendants from their wages.

4 79. Plaintiff and the Class are entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, expenses, and costs  
5 of suit pursuant to California Labor Code § 2802(c) and interest pursuant to California Labor Code  
6 § 2802(b).

7 **EIGHTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

8 **(Against All Defendants for Failure to Produce Requested Employment Records)**

9 80. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs  
10 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

11 81. Pursuant to California Labor Code § 226, current and former employees have the  
12 right to inspect or receive a copy of their records pertaining to their employment, upon reasonable  
13 request to their employer. Under this statute, an employer that receives a request to inspect or  
14 receive a copy of records pertaining to a current or former employee must comply with the request  
15 as soon as practicable, but no later than twenty-one (21) calendar days from the date of the request.

16 82. Pursuant to California Labor Code § 1198.5(a), every current and former employee,  
17 or his or her representative, has the right to inspect and receive a copy of the personnel records that  
18 the employer maintains relating to the employee's performance or to any grievance concerning the  
19 employee. Under this statute, upon written request from a current or former employee or his or  
20 her representative, an employer must make the contents of those personnel records available for  
21 inspection or provide a copy of the personnel records to the current or former employee, or his or  
22 her representative, not later than thirty (30) calendar days from the date the employer receives the  
23 written request, subject to some limited exceptions. Failure to comply with these requests allows  
24 for a civil penalty of seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750), pursuant to Labor Code §§ 1198.5(k) and  
25 226(f).

26 83. As set forth above, Plaintiff and the Class are current and former employees of  
27 Defendants.

28 84. As set forth above, Plaintiff sent written requests through her counsel to Defendants

1 for her payroll records, timecards, and personnel records. However, Plaintiff has not received any  
2 of her requested records as of the date of this Complaint.

3 85. Defendants violated California Labor Code §§ 226 and 1198.5 by failing to timely  
4 produce the required records requested by Plaintiff.

5 86. On information and belief, Defendants' failure to provide Plaintiff with her  
6 requested employment records is not an isolated incident but was instead consistent with  
7 Defendants' policy and practice that applied to Plaintiff and the Class.

8 87. Pursuant to California Labor Code §§ 226 and 1198.5, Plaintiff and the Class are  
9 entitled to a penalty of seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750) from Defendants, injunctive relief in the  
10 form of compliance with sections 226 and 1198.5, and attorneys' fees and costs.

11 **NINTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

12 **(Against All Defendants for Violation of California**

13 **Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*)**

14 88. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs  
15 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

16 89. Defendants, and each of them, are "persons" as defined under California Business  
17 & Professions Code § 17201.

18 90. Defendants' conduct, as alleged herein, has been, and continues to be, unfair,  
19 unlawful, and harmful to Plaintiff, other Class members, and to the general public. Plaintiff seeks  
20 to enforce important rights affecting the public interest within the meaning of Code of Civil  
21 Procedure § 1021.5.

22 91. Defendants' activities, as alleged herein, are violations of California law, and  
23 constitute unlawful business acts and practices in violation of California Business & Professions  
24 Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*

25 92. A violation of California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.* may be  
26 predicated on the violation of any state or federal law. All of the acts described herein as violations  
27 of, among other things, the California Labor Code, are unlawful and in violation of public policy;  
28 and in addition are immoral, unethical, oppressive, fraudulent and unscrupulous, and thereby

1 constitute unfair, unlawful and/or fraudulent business practices in violation of California Business  
2 & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*

3 **Failure to Pay Minimum and Straight Time Wages**

4 93. Defendants' failure to pay minimum and straight time wages, and other benefits in  
5 violation of the California Labor Code constitutes unlawful and/or unfair activity prohibited by  
6 California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*

7 **Failure to Pay Overtime Wages**

8 94. Defendants' failure to pay overtime compensation and other benefits in violation of  
9 California Labor Code §§ 510, 1194, and 1198 constitutes unlawful and/or unfair activity  
10 prohibited by California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*

11 **Failure to Provide Meal Periods**

12 95. Defendants' failure to provide meal periods in accordance with California Labor  
13 Code §§ 226.7 and 512, and the IWC Wage Orders, as alleged above, constitutes unlawful and/or  
14 unfair activity prohibited by California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*

15 **Failure to Authorize and Permit Rest Periods**

16 96. Defendants' failure to authorize and permit rest periods in accordance with  
17 California Labor Code § 226.7 and the IWC Wage Orders, as alleged above, constitutes unlawful  
18 and/or unfair activity prohibited by Business and Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*

19 **Failure to Indemnify Business Expenses**

20 97. Defendants' failure to reimburse expenses incurred in accordance with California  
21 Labor Code § 2802, as alleged above, constitutes unlawful and/or unfair activity prohibited by  
22 California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200 *et seq.*

23 98. By and through their unfair, unlawful and/or fraudulent business practices described  
24 herein, the Defendants, have obtained valuable property, money and services from Plaintiff, and  
25 all persons similarly situated, and has deprived Plaintiff, and all persons similarly situated, of  
26 valuable rights and benefits guaranteed by law, all to their detriment.

27 99. Plaintiff and the Class Members suffered monetary injury as a direct result of  
28 Defendants' wrongful conduct.

1           100. Plaintiff, individually, and on behalf of members of the putative Class, is entitled  
2 to, and does, seek such relief as may be necessary to disgorge money and/or property which the  
3 Defendants have wrongfully acquired, or of which Plaintiff and the Class have been deprived, by  
4 means of the above-described unfair, unlawful and/or fraudulent business practices. Plaintiff and  
5 the Class are not obligated to establish individual knowledge of the wrongful practices of  
6 Defendants in order to recover restitution.

7           101. Plaintiff, individually, and on behalf of members of the putative class, is further  
8 entitled to, and does, seek a declaration that the above-described business practices are unfair,  
9 unlawful and/or fraudulent, and injunctive relief restraining the Defendants, and each of them,  
10 from engaging in any of the above-described unfair, unlawful and/or fraudulent business practices  
11 in the future.

12           102. Plaintiff, individually, and on behalf of members of the putative class, has no plain,  
13 speedy, and/or adequate remedy at law to redress the injuries which the Class Members suffered  
14 as a consequence of the Defendants' unfair, unlawful and/or fraudulent business practices. As a  
15 result of the unfair, unlawful and/or fraudulent business practices described above, Plaintiff,  
16 individually, and on behalf of members of the putative Class, has suffered and will continue to  
17 suffer irreparable harm unless the Defendants, and each of them, are restrained from continuing to  
18 engage in said unfair, unlawful and/or fraudulent business practices.

19           103. Plaintiff also alleges that if Defendants are not enjoined from the conduct set forth  
20 herein above, they will continue to avoid paying the appropriate taxes, insurance and other  
21 withholdings.

22           104. Pursuant to California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*, Plaintiff and  
23 putative Class Members are entitled to restitution of the wages withheld and retained by  
24 Defendants during a period that commences four years and 178 days prior to the filing of this  
25 complaint; a permanent injunction requiring Defendants to pay all outstanding wages due to  
26 Plaintiff and Class Members; an award of attorneys' fees pursuant to California Code of Civil  
27 Procedure § 1021.5 and other applicable laws; and an award of costs.

28       ///

**TENTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

**(Against all Defendants for Civil Penalties Under the  
Private Attorneys General Act of 2004, Cal. Lab. Code §§ 2698 et seq.)**

105. Plaintiff incorporates by reference and re-alleges as if fully stated herein paragraphs 1 through 23 in this Complaint.

106. At all times herein mentioned, Defendants were subject to the Labor Code of the State of California and the applicable Industrial Welfare Commission Orders.

107. California Labor Code § 2699(a) specifically provides for a private right of action to recover penalties for violations of the Labor Code: “Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any provision of this code that provides for a civil penalty to be assessed and collected by the Labor and Workforce Development Agency or any of its departments, divisions, commissions, boards, agencies, or employees, for a violation of this code, may, as an alternative, be recovered through a civil action brought by an aggrieved employee on behalf of himself or herself and other current or former employees pursuant to the procedures specified in Section 2699.3.”

108. Plaintiff has exhausted her administrative remedies pursuant to California Labor Code § 2699.3. She gave written notice by online filing to the LWDA and by certified mail to Defendant of the specific provisions of the Labor Code that Defendant violated against Plaintiff and current and former aggrieved employees, including the facts and theories to support the violations. Plaintiff also paid the filing fee.

109. The LWDA has not indicated that it intends to investigate Defendant’s Labor Code violations discussed in the notice. Accordingly, Plaintiff may commence a civil action to recover penalties under Labor Code § 2699 pursuant to § 2699.3 for the violations of the Labor Code described in this Complaint. These penalties include, but are not limited to, penalties under California Labor Code §§ 210, 226.3, 1174.5, 1197.1, and 2699.

110. Based on the conduct described in this Complaint, Plaintiff is entitled to an award of civil penalties on behalf of himself, the State of California, and similarly Aggrieved Employees of Defendants. The exact amount of the applicable penalties, in all, is in an amount to be shown according to proof at trial. These penalties are in addition to all other remedies permitted by law.

111. In addition, Plaintiff seeks an award of reasonable attorney's fees and costs pursuant to California Labor Code § 2699(g)(1), which states, "Any employee who prevails in any action shall be entitled to an award of reasonable attorney's fees and costs."

**PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

Plaintiff, individually, and on behalf of all others similarly situated only with respect to the class claims, prays for relief and judgment against Defendants, jointly and severally, as follows:

**Class Certification**

1. That this action be certified as a class action with respect to the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, and Ninth Causes of Action;
2. That Plaintiff be appointed as the representative of the Class; and,
3. That counsel for Plaintiff be appointed as Class Counsel.

**As to the First Cause of Action**

4. That the Court declare, adjudge, and decree that Defendants violated California Labor Code §§ 204 and 1194 and applicable IWC Wage Orders by willfully failing to pay all minimum and straight time wages due;
5. For unpaid wages as may be appropriate;
6. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid compensation commencing from the date such amounts were due;
7. For liquidated damages;
8. For reasonable attorneys' fees and for costs of suit incurred herein pursuant to California Labor Code § 1194(a); and,
9. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

**As to the Second Cause of Action**

10. That the Court declare, adjudge, and decree that Defendants violated California Labor Code §§ 510 and 1198 and applicable IWC Wage Orders by willfully failing to pay all overtime wages due;
11. For unpaid wages at overtime wage rates as may be appropriate;
12. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid overtime compensation commencing from

the date such amounts were due;

13. For reasonable attorneys' fees and for costs of suit incurred herein pursuant to California Labor Code § 1194(a); and,

14. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

As to the Third Cause of Action

15. That the Court declare, adjudge, and decree that Defendants violated California Labor Code §§ 226.7 and 512, and the IWC Wage Orders;

16. For unpaid meal period premium wages as may be appropriate;

17. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid compensation commencing from the date such amounts were due;

18. For reasonable attorneys' fees under California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5, and for costs of suit incurred herein; and,

19. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

As to the Fourth Cause of Action

20. That the Court declare, adjudge, and decree that Defendants violated California Labor Code §§ 226.7 and 512, and the IWC Wage Orders;

21. For unpaid rest period premium wages as may be appropriate;

22. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid compensation commencing from the date such amounts were due;

23. For reasonable attorneys' fees under California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5, and for costs of suit incurred herein; and,

24. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

As to the Fifth Cause of Action

25. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated California Labor Code §§ 201, 202, and 203 by willfully failing to pay all compensation owed at the time of termination of the employment;

26. For statutory wage penalties pursuant to California Labor Code § 203 for former employees who have left Defendants' employ;

27. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid wages from the date such amounts were due;

28. For reasonable attorneys' fees and for costs of suit incurred herein; and,

29. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

As to the Sixth Cause of Action

30. That the Court declare, adjudge, and decree that Defendants violated the record keeping provisions of California Labor Code § 226(a) and applicable IWC Wage Orders, and willfully failed to provide accurate itemized wage statements thereto;

31. For all actual damages, according to proof;

32. For statutory penalties pursuant to California Labor Code § 226(e);

33. For injunctive relief to ensure compliance with this section, pursuant to California Labor Code § 226(h);

34. For reasonable attorneys' fees and for costs of suit incurred herein; and,

35. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

As to the Seventh Cause of Action

36. That the Court declare, adjudge, and decree that Defendants violated California Labor Code § 2802 by willfully failing to indemnify employees for expenditures;

37. For unpaid wages or unreimbursed business expenses as may be appropriate;

38. For pre-judgment interest on any unpaid compensation commencing from the date such amounts were due;

39. For reasonable attorneys' fees and for costs of suit incurred herein; and,

40. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

As to the Eighth Cause of Action

41. That the Court declare, adjudge, and decree that Defendants violated the records producing provisions of California Labor Code §§ 226 and 1198.5 and applicable IWC Wage Orders, and willfully failed to produce the required and requested documents thereto;

42. For all actual damages, according to proof;

43. For statutory penalties pursuant to the California Labor Code §§ 226 and 1198.5;

44. For injunctive relief to ensure compliance with this section, pursuant to California Labor Code § 226(h);

45. For reasonable attorneys' fees and for costs of suit incurred herein; and,

46. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

As to the Ninth Cause of Action

47. That the Court declare, adjudge, and decree that Defendants violated California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.* by failing to pay for all hours worked (minimum, straight time, and overtime wages), failing to provide meal periods, failing to authorize and permit rest periods, and failing to indemnify employees for expenditures;

48. For restitution of unpaid wages to Plaintiff and all Class Members and prejudgment interest from the day such amounts were due and payable;

49. For the appointment of a receiver to receive, manage and distribute any and all funds disgorged from Defendants and determined to have been wrongfully acquired by Defendants as a result of violations of California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200 *et seq.*;

50. For reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of suit incurred herein pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5;

51. For injunctive relief to ensure compliance with this section, pursuant to California Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*; and,

52. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

As to the Tenth Cause of Action

53. That the Court declare, adjudge and decree that Defendants violated the California Labor Code by failing to pay wages for all hours worked (including minimum, straight time, and overtime wages), failing to provide meal periods and pay the correct amount of meal period premium wages, failing to authorize and permit rest periods and pay the correct amount of rest period premium wages, failing to pay all final wages to terminated employees, failing to furnish accurate wage statements, and failing to reimburse employees for all necessary business expenses.

54. For all actual, consequential, and incidental losses and damages, according to proof;

55. For all civil penalties pursuant to California Labor Code §§ 2699, *et seq.*, and all

other applicable Labor Code provisions;

56. For reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of suit incurred herein pursuant to California Labor Code § 2699; and

57. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable and appropriate.

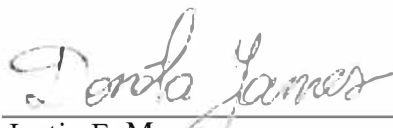

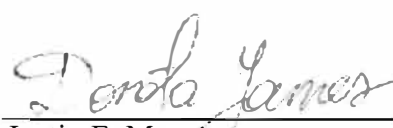
