**COMPLAINT FOR ENFORCEMENT
ACTION UNDER THE PRIVATE
ATTORNEYS GENERAL ACT, CAL.
LABOR CODE §§ 2698 ET SEQ.**

1 Plaintiff TRIADA PALLIDOU (“Plaintiff”), individually, and on behalf of all similarly
2 aggrieved employees, alleges against Defendants TJB GEARYS, LLC dba GEARYS BEVERLY
3 HILLS, and DOES 1 through 25 (collectively, “Defendants”) as follows:

4 **INTRODUCTION**

5 1. This is an enforcement action under the California Labor Code Private Attorneys
6 General Act of 2004, California Labor Code sections 2698, *et seq.* (“PAGA”) to recover civil penalties
7 on behalf of Plaintiff, the State of California, and all individuals who worked for Defendants in the
8 State of California as hourly-paid and/or non-exempt employees at any time from one year prior to
9 Plaintiff’s submission of written notice of Defendants’ alleged violations of the California Labor Code
10 to the Labor & Workforce Development Agency (“LWDA”) through final judgment (“Aggrieved
11 Employees”).

12 2. Plaintiff alleges that Defendants hired Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees but failed to
13 properly pay them all wages owed for all time worked (including minimum wages, straight time
14 wages, and overtime wages), failed to provide them with all meal periods and rest periods and
15 associated premium wages to which they were entitled, failed to timely pay them all wages due during
16 their employment, failed to timely pay them all wages due upon termination of their employment,
17 failed to provide them with accurate itemized wage statements, failed to maintain accurate payroll
18 records, and failed to reimburse them for necessary business expenses.

19 3. As a result, Defendants violated, *inter alia*, California Labor Code sections 201, 202,
20 203, 204, 226(a), 226.7, 510, 512(a), 1174(d), 1194, 1197, 1197.1, 1198, 2800, and 2802, and the
21 applicable Industrial Welfare Commission (“IWC”) Wage Order. Through this action, Plaintiff seeks
22 to recover all available remedies under PAGA including but not limited to civil penalties and
23 attorneys’ fees and costs.

24 **JURISDICTION AND VENUE**

25 4. This Court has jurisdiction over this action pursuant to the California Constitution,
26 Article VI, section 10. The statutes under which this action is brought do not specify any other basis
27 for jurisdiction.

28 5. This Court has jurisdiction over all Defendants because, upon information and belief,

1 Defendants are either citizens of California, have sufficient minimum contacts in California, or
2 otherwise intentionally availed themselves of the California market to render the exercise of
3 jurisdiction over them by the California courts consistent with traditional notions of fair play and
4 substantial justice. Further, no federal question is at issue because the claims asserted herein are based
5 solely on California law.

6 6. Venue is proper in this Court because, upon information and belief, Defendants
7 maintain offices, have agents, employ individuals, and/or transact business in the State of California,
8 County of Los Angeles, including at 351 N. Beverly Hills Drive, Beverly Hills, CA 90210. Moreover,
9 many of the acts, events, and violations alleged herein relating to Plaintiff occurred in the State of
10 California, County of Los Angeles.

11 **THE PARTIES**

12 7. At all times mentioned herein, Plaintiff TRIADA PALLIDOU was and is a resident of
13 Los Angeles County in the State of California.

14 8. At all times herein mentioned, Defendant TJB GEARYS, LLC dba GEARYS
15 BEVERLY HILLS was and is an employer who does business in California, with locations throughout
16 the State of California, and whose employees are engaged throughout Los Angeles County and the
17 State of California, including at 351 N. Beverly Hills Drive, Beverly Hills, CA 90210.

18 9. Plaintiff is unaware of the true names or capacities of the Defendants sued herein under
19 the fictitious names DOES 1 through 25 but will seek leave of this Court to amend the complaint and
20 serve such fictitiously named Defendants once their names and capacities become known.

21 10. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and thereon alleges, that each and all of the acts and
22 omissions alleged herein were performed by, or are attributable to defendant(s) TJB GEARYS, LLC
23 dba GEARYS BEVERLY and/or DOES 1 through 25, each acting as the agent, employee, alter ego,
24 and/or joint venturer of, or working in concert with, each of the other co-Defendants and within the
25 course and scope of such agency, employment, joint venture, or concerted activity with legal authority
26 to act on the others' behalf. The acts of any and all Defendants represent and were in accordance with
27 Defendants' official policy.

28 11. At all relevant times, Defendants were the employers of Plaintiff within the meaning

1 of all applicable state laws and statutes. Defendants directly or indirectly controlled or affected the
2 working conditions, wages, working hours, and conditions of employment of Plaintiff to make each
3 of said Defendants employers and employers liable under the statutory provisions set forth herein.

4 12. Defendants had the authority to hire and terminate Plaintiff and the Aggrieved
5 Employees, to set work rules and conditions governing their employment, and to supervise their
6 daily employment activities.

7 13. Defendants exercised sufficient authority over the terms and conditions of Plaintiff
8 and the Aggrieved Employees' employment for them to be their joint employers.

9 14. Defendants directly hired and paid wages and benefits to Plaintiff and the Aggrieved
10 Employees.

11 15. Defendants continue to employ hourly paid and/or non-exempt employees within the
12 State of California.

13 16. At all relevant times, Defendants, and each of them, ratified the acts and omissions
14 complained of herein. At all relevant times, Defendants, and each of them, aided and abetted the acts
15 and omissions of each and all the other Defendants in proximately causing the damages herein alleged.

16 17. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and thereon alleges, that each of said Defendants is
17 in some manner intentionally, negligently, or otherwise responsible for the acts, omissions,
18 occurrences, and transactions alleged herein.

19 **GENERAL ALLEGATIONS**

20 18. Plaintiff TRIADA PALLIDOU worked for Defendants from approximately October
21 2023 through approximately December 2023 as a Sales Associate. Defendants jointly and severally
22 employed TRIADA PALLIDOU at their location in Los Angeles, California. TRIADA PALLIDOU
23 performed various duties for Defendants including, among other things, handling Defendants' fine
24 jewelry sales.

25 19. Defendants hired Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees but failed to properly pay
26 them all overtime wages and minimum wages for all hours worked, failed to provide all meal and rest
27 breaks to which they were entitled, failed to timely pay all wages upon termination of employment,
28 failed to provide accurate wage statements, failed to keep accurate employment records, failed to

1 reimburse necessary business-related expenses, and failed to adhere to other related protections
2 afforded by the California Labor Code and applicable IWC Wage Order.

3 20. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and based thereon alleges, that Defendants knew or
4 should have known that Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees were entitled to the protections
5 afforded by the California Labor Code and the applicable IWC Wage Order, yet as set forth in detail
6 below, engaged in a systematic pattern and practice of violating the California Labor Code and the
7 applicable IWC Wage Order.

8 **PAGA ALLEGATIONS**

9 21. PAGA is and was applicable to Defendants' employment of Plaintiff and Aggrieved
10 Employees.

11 22. PAGA provides that any provision of law under the California Labor Code that
12 provides for a civil penalty, including unpaid wages and premium wages, to be assessed and collected
13 by the LWDA for violations of the California Labor Code may, as an alternative, be recovered through
14 a civil action brought by an aggrieved employee on behalf of himself or herself and other current or
15 former employees pursuant to procedures outlined in California Labor Code section 2699.3.

16 23. Pursuant to PAGA, a civil action may be brought by an "aggrieved employee," who is
17 any person employed by the alleged violator and against whom one or more of the alleged violations
18 was committed.

19 24. Plaintiff and the other hourly-paid, non-exempt employees are "Aggrieved Employees"
20 as defined by California Labor Code section 2699(c) because they are current or former employees of
21 Defendants against whom one of more of the alleged violations were committed.

22 25. Pursuant to California Labor Code sections 2699.3 and 2699.5, an aggrieved employee,
23 including Plaintiff, may pursue a civil action arising under PAGA after the following requirements
24 have been met:

- 25 (a) The aggrieved employee shall give written notice by certified mail (hereinafter
26 "Employee's Notice") to the LWDA and the employer of the specific provisions of the
27 California Labor Code alleged to have been violated, including the facts and theories to
28 support the alleged violations.

1 (b) The LWDA shall provide notice (“LWDA Response”) to the employer and the aggrieved
2 employee by certified mail that it does not intend to investigate the alleged violation within
3 sixty (60) calendar days of the postmark date of the Employee’s Notice. Upon receipt of
4 the LWDA Response, or if the LWDA Response is not provided within sixty-five (65)
5 calendar days of the postmark date of the Employee’s Notice, the aggrieved employee
6 may commence a civil action pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699 to recover
7 civil penalties in addition to any other penalties to which the employee may be entitled.

8 26. On April 16, 2024, Plaintiff provided notice by electronic submission to the LWDA
9 and by certified mail to Defendants regarding the specific provisions of the California Labor Code
10 alleged to have been violated, including the facts and theories to support the alleged violations,
11 pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699.3. **A true and correct copy of the Employee’s Notice**
12 **is attached hereto as Exhibit A.**

13 27. Plaintiff did not receive a LWDA Response within sixty-five (65) calendar days of
14 providing the Employee’s Notice.

15 28. Therefore, the administrative prerequisites under California Labor Code section
16 2699.3(a) to recover civil penalties against Defendants, in addition to other remedies for violations of,
17 *inter alia*, California Labor Code sections 201, 202, 203, 204, 226(a), 226.7, 510, 512(a), 1174(d),
18 1194, 1197, 1197.1, 1198, 2800, and 2802 have been satisfied.

19 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**

20 **VIOLATION OF CALIFORNIA LABOR CODE §§ 2699, *ET SEQ.***

21 **(Against All Defendants)**

22 29. Plaintiff incorporates herein by specific reference, as though fully set forth, the
23 allegations in all preceding paragraphs.

24 30. Plaintiff brings this action on an individual basis and on a representative basis on behalf
25 of other Aggrieved Employees and the State of California, in Plaintiff’s capacity as a private attorney
26 general pursuant to the Private Attorneys General Act of 2004, California Labor Code § 2698, *et seq.*

27 31. PAGA expressly provides for a private right of action to recover civil penalties for
28 violations of the California Labor Code as follows: “*Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any*

1 *provision of this code that provides for a civil penalty to be assessed and collected by the Labor and*
2 *Workforce Development Agency or any of its departments, divisions, commissions, boards, agencies,*
3 *or employees, for a violation of this code, may, as an alternative, be recovered through a civil action*
4 *brought by an aggrieved employee on behalf of himself or herself and other current or former*
5 *employees pursuant to the procedures specified in Section 2699.3.” Cal. Lab. Code § 2699(a).*

6 32. Whenever the LWDA, or any of its departments, divisions, commissions, boards,
7 agencies, or employees has discretion to assess a civil penalty, a court in a civil action is authorized to
8 exercise the same discretion, subject to the same limitations and conditions, to assess a civil penalty.

9 33. Plaintiff and the other hourly-paid, non-exempt employees are “aggrieved employees”
10 as defined by California Labor Code section 2699(c) in that they are all current or former employees
11 of Defendants, and one or more of the alleged violations were committed against them.

12 34. Defendants’ conduct, as alleged herein, violates numerous sections of the California
13 Labor Code, including, but not limited to, the following:

- 14 (a) Violation of California Labor Code sections 510 and 1198 for failure to pay
15 overtime wages, as set forth more fully below;
- 16 (b) Violation of California Labor Code sections 1194, 1197, and 1197.1 for failure to
17 pay minimum wages, as set forth more fully below;
- 18 (c) Violation of California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512(a) for failure to provide
19 legally required meal periods, as set forth more fully below;
- 20 (d) Violation of California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512(a) for failure to pay
21 required meal period premiums, as set forth more fully below;
- 22 (e) Violation of California Labor Code section 226.7 for failure to provide legally
23 required rest periods, as set forth more fully below;
- 24 (f) Violation of California Labor Code section 226.7 for failure to pay required rest
25 period premiums, as set forth more fully below;
- 26 (g) Violation of California Labor Code section 204 for failure to timely pay wages to
27 Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees during employment, as set forth more fully
28 before;

- 1 (h) Violation of California Labor Code sections 201, 202, and 203 for failure to pay all
2 wages at time of discharge from employment, as set forth more fully below;
- 3 (i) Violation of California Labor Code section 226(a) for failure to provide accurate
4 wage statements to Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees, as set forth more fully
5 below;
- 6 (j) Violation of California Labor Code section 1174(d) for failure to keep complete
7 and accurate payroll records relating to Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees, as set
8 forth more fully below; and
- 9 (k) Violation of California Labor Code sections 2800 and 2802 for failure to reimburse
10 Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees for necessary business-related expenses, as set
11 forth more fully below.

12 35. Pursuant to PAGA, and in particular California Labor Code sections 2699(a), 2699.3,
13 and 2699.5, Plaintiff, acting in the public interest as a private attorney general, seeks assessment and
14 collection of civil penalties for Plaintiff, all Aggrieved Employees, and the State of California against
15 Defendants for violations of California Labor Code sections set forth herein, including penalties under
16 California Labor Code sections 2699, 558, 210, 1197.1, 226, 226.3, 1174.5, and 1197.1, penalties
17 under the applicable IWC Wage Order, and any and all additional penalties and remedies as provided
18 by the California Labor Code and/or other statutes.

19 36. Pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699(i), civil penalties recovered by the
20 Aggrieved Employees shall be distributed as follows: seventy-five percent (75%) to the LWDA for
21 the enforcement of labor laws and education of employers and employees about their rights and
22 responsibilities and twenty-five (25%) to the Aggrieved Employees.

23 37. Plaintiff retained counsel to file this court action, and to assess and collect the civil
24 penalties owed by Defendants. Plaintiff therefore seeks an award of reasonable attorneys' fees and
25 costs pursuant to California Labor Code sections 210, 218.5, and 2699(g)(1), and any other applicable
26 statute.

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1 510 and/or the applicable IWC Wage Order; (b) when Defendants intentionally, willfully, and/or
2 negligently mischaracterized overtime as straight time or double time as time-and-a-half; (c) when
3 Defendants assigned more work than could reasonably be completed in a workday or workweek to
4 Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees, but refused to authorize the overtime necessary for them to
5 complete the assigned work; and (d) when Defendants failed to include all required wages, including
6 earned commissions, and renumeration when calculating the overtime rate.

7 45. Defendants' failure to pay Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees proper overtime
8 compensation, as required by California law, violates the provisions of California Labor Code section
9 510, and is therefore unlawful.

10 **Failure to Provide Meal Periods**

11 46. California Labor Code section 226.7 provides that no employer shall require an
12 employee to work during any meal period mandated by an applicable IWC Order.

13 47. California Labor Code section 512(a) provides that an employer may not require, cause,
14 or permit an employee to work for a period of more than five (5) hours per day without providing the
15 employee with a meal period of not less than thirty (30) minutes, except that if the total work period
16 per day of the employee is not more than six (6) hours, the meal period may be waived by mutual
17 consent of both the employer and the employee.

18 48. California Labor Code section 512(a) further provides that an employer may not
19 employ an employee for a work period of more than ten (10) hours per day without providing the
20 employee with a second meal period of not less than thirty (30) minutes, except that if the total hours
21 worked is no more than twelve (12) hours, the second meal period may be waived by mutual consent
22 of the employer and the employee only if the first meal period was not waived.

23 49. The applicable IWC Wage Order sets forth the same requirements for meal breaks.

24 50. Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees who were scheduled to work for no longer than six
25 (6) hours, and who did not waive their legally mandated meal periods by mutual consent, were required
26 to work for periods longer than five (5) hours without a meal period of not less than thirty (30) minutes.

27 51. Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees who were scheduled to work for more than six
28 (6) hours were required to work for periods longer than five (5) hours without an uninterrupted meal

1 period of not less than thirty (30) minutes.

2 52. Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees, who were scheduled to work for more than ten
3 (10) hours but no longer than twelve (12) hours, and who did not waive their legally mandated meal
4 periods by mutual consent, were required to work in excess of ten (10) hours without receiving a
5 second uninterrupted meal period of not less than thirty (30) minutes.

6 53. Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees, who were scheduled to work for more than
7 twelve (12) hours, were required to work for periods longer than ten (10) hours without a second
8 uninterrupted meal period of not less than thirty (30) minutes.

9 54. Moreover, when meal breaks were provided, they were often interrupted, cut short,
10 and/or Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees were not relieved of all duties as required by law.

11 55. Such conduct violates California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512(a) and the
12 applicable IWC Wage Order.

13 **Failure to Pay Compliant Meal Break Premiums**

14 56. California Labor Code section 226.7 provides: “[i]f an employer fails to provide an
15 employee a [meal] period in accordance with a state law, including, but not limited to, an applicable
16 statute or applicable regulation, standard, or order of the Industrial Welfare Commission... the
17 employer shall pay the employee one additional hour of pay at the employee’s regular rate of
18 compensation for each workday that the [meal] period is not provided.”

19 57. The applicable IWC Wage Order provides: “[i]f an employer fails to provide an
20 employee a meal period in accordance with the applicable provisions of this Order, the employer shall
21 pay the employee one (1) hour of pay at the employee’s regular rate of compensation for each workday
22 that the meal period is not provided.”

23 58. Defendants failed to pay Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees meal period premiums
24 due in violation of California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512 on each day when a complete, timely,
25 and uninterrupted meal period of at least thirty (30) minutes was not provided.

26 59. Moreover, if and when meal break premiums were provided, Defendants failed to
27 incorporate all nondiscretionary payments for work performed by Plaintiff and the Aggrieved
28 Employees in the regular rate of compensation for purposes of such premiums.

1 60. Defendants' conduct violates the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor
2 Code section 226.7.

3 **Failure to Provide Rest Periods**

4 61. California Labor Code section 226.7 provides that no employer shall require an
5 employee to work during any rest period mandated by an applicable IWC Wage Order.

6 62. The applicable IWC Wage Order provides that "[e]very employer shall authorize and
7 permit all employees to take rest periods, which insofar as practicable shall be in the middle of each
8 work period" and that the "rest period time shall be based on the total hours worked daily at the rate
9 of ten (10) minutes net rest time per four (4) hours or major fraction thereof" unless the total daily
10 work time is less than three and one-half (3½) hours.

11 63. Defendants required Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees to work four (4) or more
12 hours without authorizing or permitting a timely ten (10) minute uninterrupted rest period during
13 which time they were relieved of their duties per each four (4) hour period, or major fraction thereof
14 worked.

15 64. Defendants' conduct therefore violates the applicable IWC Wage Order and California
16 Labor Code section 226.7.

17 **Failure to Pay Rest Break Premiums**

18 65. California Labor Code section 226.7 provides: "[i]f an employer fails to provide an
19 employee a [rest] period in accordance with a state law, including, but not limited to, an applicable
20 statute or applicable regulation, standard, or order of the Industrial Welfare Commission, the employer
21 shall pay the employee one additional hour of pay at the employee's regular rate of compensation for
22 each workday that the [rest] period is not provided."

23 66. The applicable IWC Wage Order provides: "[i]f an employer fails to provide an
24 employee a rest period in accordance with the applicable provisions of this Order, the employer shall
25 pay the employee one (1) hour of pay at the employee's regular rate of compensation for each workday
26 that the rest period is not provided."

27 67. Defendants failed to pay Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees required rest break
28 premiums due when compliant rest periods were not provided.

1 68. Moreover, if and when rest break premiums were provided, Defendants failed to
2 incorporate all nondiscretionary payments for work performed by Plaintiff and the Aggrieved
3 Employees in the regular rate of compensation for purposes of such premiums.

4 69. Defendants' conduct violates the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor
5 Code section 226.7.

6 **Failure to Timely Pay Wages During Employment**

7 70. California Labor Code section 204 provides that all wages earned by any person in any
8 employment between the 1st and 15th days, inclusive, of any calendar month, other than those wages
9 due upon termination of an employee, are due and payable between the 16th and the 26th day of the
10 month during which the labor was performed. It further provides all wages earned by any person in
11 any employment between the 16th and the last day, inclusive, of any calendar month, other than those
12 wages due upon termination of an employee, are due and payable between the 1st and the 10th day of
13 the following month.

14 71. California Labor Code section 204 provides that all wages earned for labor in excess
15 of the normal work period shall be paid no later than the payday for the next regular payroll period.

16 72. During the relevant time period, Defendants intentionally and willfully failed to pay
17 Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees all wages due to them, within any time period permissible
18 under California Labor Code section 204, including wages for overtime compensation, minimum wage
19 compensation, commissions, meal period premiums, and rest period premiums.

20 73. Such conduct violates California Labor Code section 204.

21 **Failure to Timely Pay Wages Upon Termination**

22 74. Pursuant to California Labor Code sections 201, 202, and 203, Defendants are required
23 to timely pay all earned and unpaid wages to an employee who is discharged.

24 75. California Labor Code section 201 mandates that if an employer discharges an
25 employee, the employee's wages accrued and unpaid at the time of discharge are due and payable
26 immediately.

27 76. California Labor Code section 202 mandates that if an employee quits, his or her wages
28 shall become due and payable not later than seventy-two (72) hours thereafter, unless the employee

1 has given seventy-two (72) hours' notice of his or her intention to quit, in which case the employee
2 is entitled to his or her wages at the time of quitting.

3 77. California Labor Code section 203 provides that if an employer willfully fails to pay,
4 in accordance with California Labor Code sections 201 and 202, any wages of an employee who is
5 discharged or who quits, the wages of the employee shall continue as a penalty from the due date
6 thereof at the same rate until paid or until an action therefore is commenced; but the wages shall not
7 continue for more than thirty (30) days.

8 78. At the time that Plaintiff and Aggrieved Employees' employment with Defendants
9 ended, Defendants knowingly and willfully failed to pay Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees all
10 wages owed to them pursuant to California Labor Code sections 201 and 202, including, without
11 limitation, overtime wages, minimum wages, earned commissions, and meal and rest period premium
12 wages.

13 79. Such conduct violates California Labor Code sections 201, 202, and 203.

14 **Failure to Provide Compliant Wage Statements**

15 80. California Labor Code section 226(a) provides that every employer shall furnish each
16 of its employees an accurate itemized statement in writing showing (1) gross wages earned, (2) total
17 hours worked by the employee, (3) the number of piece-rate units earned and any applicable piece rate
18 if the employee is paid on a piece-rate basis, (4) all deductions, provided that all deductions made on
19 written orders of the employee may be aggregated and shown as one item, (5) net wages earned, (6)
20 the inclusive dates of the period for which the employee is paid, (7) the name of the employee and his
21 or her social security number, (8) the name and address of the legal entity that is the employer, and (9)
22 all applicable hourly rates in effect during the pay period and the corresponding number of hours
23 worked at each hourly rate by the employee.

24 81. Defendants intentionally and willfully failed to provide employees with complete and
25 accurate wage statements. The deficiencies include, among other things, the failure to state all correct
26 rates of pay, all hours worked, all meal period premium wages earned, all rest period premium wages
27 earned, and the name and address of the legal entity that is the employer.

28 82. Such conduct violates California Labor Code section 226.

1 **Failure to Keep Requisite Payroll Records**

2 83. California Labor Code section 1174(d) requires an employer to keep at a central
3 location in the state or at the plants or establishments at which employees are employed, payroll
4 records showing the hours worked daily by and the wages paid to, and the number of piece-rate units
5 earned by and any applicable piece rate paid to, employees employed at the respective plants or
6 establishments. These records shall be kept in accordance with rules established for this purpose by
7 the commission, but in any case, shall be kept on file for not less than three years.

8 84. Defendants intentionally and willfully failed to keep accurate and complete payroll
9 records showing the hours worked daily and the wages paid to Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees.

10 85. As a result of Defendants' violation of California Labor Code section 1174(d), Plaintiff
11 and the Aggrieved Employees have suffered injury and damage to their statutorily protected rights.

12 86. More specifically, Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees have been injured by
13 Defendants' intentional and willful violation of California Labor Code section 1174(d) because they
14 were denied both their legal right and protected interest, in having available, accurate and complete
15 payroll records pursuant to California Labor Code section 1174(d).

16 **Failure to Reimburse Necessary Business Expenses**

17 87. Pursuant to California Labor Code sections 2800 and 2802, an employer must
18 reimburse its employees for all necessary expenditures incurred by the employee in direct consequence
19 of the discharge of his or her job duties or in direct consequence of his or her job duties or in direct
20 consequence of his or her obedience to the directions of the employer.

21 88. Plaintiff and the Aggrieved Employees incurred necessary business-related expenses
22 and costs that were not fully reimbursed by Defendants.

23 89. Defendants intentionally and willfully failed to reimburse Plaintiff and the Aggrieved
24 Employees for all necessary business-related expenses and costs.

25 90. Such conduct violates California Labor Code sections 2802.

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1 **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

2 Plaintiff, individually, and on behalf of Aggrieved Employees pursuant to the California
3 Private Attorneys General Act, prays for relief and judgment against Defendants, jointly and severally,
4 as follows:

5 1. For the imposition of civil penalties pursuant to California Labor Code sections 2699,
6 210, 558, 226, 226.3, 1174.5, and 1197.1 and all other penalties allowed by the California Labor Code
7 and/or other applicable statutes;

8 2. For statutory attorneys' fees and costs pursuant to sections 210, 218.5, and 2699(g)(1)
9 of the California Labor Code; and

10 3. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem proper.

RE: *Triada Pallidou v. TJB Gearys, LLC dba Gearys Beverly Hills*

To Whom It May Concern:

This office represents Triada Pallidou (“Claimant”) with respect to their claims under the California Labor Code against TJB Gearys, LLC dba Gearys Beverly Hills (including all affiliates, subsidiaries, parents, directors, and officers) (collectively referred to herein as “Employers”). This letter is being sent simultaneously to Employers by certified mail.

Employers employed Triada Pallidou from approximately October 2023 to December 2023 as a non-exempt, hourly-paid employee. Triada Pallidou worked as a Sales Associate for Employers and was based out of Employers’ facility located at 351 N. Beverly Hills Drive, Beverly Hills, CA 90210.

Claimant intends to bring a representative action seeking penalties for violations of the California Labor Code which are recoverable under the Labor Code Private Attorneys General Act of 2004, California Labor Code sections 2698, *et seq.* (“PAGA”). Claimant is seeking penalties on behalf of his or herself and in a representative capacity on behalf of the State of California and all current and former hourly-paid and/or non-exempt employees who worked for Employers in the State of California during the relevant statutory period (“Aggrieved Employees”). This letter is being sent in compliance with California Labor Code section 2699.3 and shall serve as Claimant’s notice of the provisions of the California Labor Code alleged to have been violated, including the facts and theories in support thereof.

As detailed below, Employers violated several of California’s wage and hour laws during Claimant’s employment, including but not limited to California Labor Code sections 201, 202, 203, 204, 226(a), 226.7, 510, 512(a), 1174(d), 1194, 1197, 1197.1, 1198, 2800, 2802, and the applicable Industrial Welfare Commission Wage Order (“IWC Wage Order”).

The claims made on behalf of Claimant and Aggrieved Employees are based upon the following facts and theories:

1. FAILURE TO PAY FOR WORK PERFORMED AT CORRECT RATES OF PAY, INCLUDING COMMISSIONS, MINIMUM WAGES, STRAIGHT TIME WAGES, AND OVERTIME COMPENSATION

Employers engaged in numerous unlawful practices which resulted in the failure to pay Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees for all time worked at the correct rates of pay, including minimum wages, straight time wages, and overtime compensation.

California Labor Code sections 1194, 1197, and 1197.1 and the applicable IWC Wage Order require employers to pay at least the legal minimum wage to their employees. California Labor Code sections 510 and 1198 and the applicable IWC Wage Order further require employers to pay no less than one and one-half times an employee's regular rate of pay for hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours in one workday, for hours worked in excess of forty (40) hours in one workweek, and for the first eight (8) hours worked on the seventh day of work in any one workweek, and to pay no less than twice an employee's regular rate of pay of the employee for hours worked in excess of twelve (12) hours in one workday and for any work in excess of eight (8) hours on any seventh day of a workweek.

Throughout the relevant time, Employers regularly required Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees to perform work off-the-clock including, among other things, answering communications in between shifts as well as working during meal periods. Employers failed to compensate Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees for any of this off-the-clock work, in violation of California law.

This uncompensated work often resulted in the total number of hours worked by Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees exceeding the daily and/or weekly triggers for overtime wages, yet Employers failed to pay Claimant and Aggrieved Employees applicable overtime rate(s) for these hours.

Employers also failed to accurately record the actual time worked by Claimant and Aggrieved Employees.

Employers also failed to pay overtime to Claimant and Aggrieved Employees for all overtime hours worked based on regular rates of pay correctly calculated to include all applicable remuneration, including non-discretionary commissions, non-discretionary bonuses, and non-discretionary performance pay.

As a result of the foregoing practices, Employers failed to pay Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees for all wages earned at the correct rates of pay, including commissions, minimum wages, straight time wages, and overtime compensation. Accordingly, Employers violated the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor Code sections 204, 221, 510, 1194, 1197, 1197.1 and 1198.

Claimant and Aggrieved Employees will therefore seek PAGA default penalties pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699; penalties pursuant to the applicable IWC Wage Orders; penalties pursuant to California Labor Code sections 558, 1197.1, and 1199; and attorneys' fees and costs.

2. MEAL BREAK VIOLATIONS

California law requires employers to provide employees with an opportunity to take an uninterrupted meal period of no less than thirty (30) minutes before the end of the fifth hour of work when an employee works more than five (5) hours in a day. Cal. Lab. Code §§ 226.7 & 512(a). Employers must provide a second meal period of no less than thirty (30) minutes before the end of the tenth hour of work when an employee works more than ten (10) hours in a day. *Id.* For each day that an employer fails to provide compliant meal period(s), the employer must pay the employee a meal penalty equal to one hour of pay at the employee's regular rate of compensation. *Id.*

During the relevant time period, Employers failed to provide Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees with legally compliant 30-minute meal periods. Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees were required by Employers to work more than five (5) hours per day but were not provided with uninterrupted 30-minute meal periods. Further, Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees were not provided with a second uninterrupted 30-minute meal period when they worked over ten (10) hours per day. Employers regularly required Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees to work through their first and second meal periods, to take their first meal period after their fifth (5th) hour of work, and/or to take their second meal periods after their tenth (10th) hour of work. Meal breaks, when provided, were oftentimes interrupted and/or cut short.

Employers' policies, practices, and procedures were responsible for the violations alleged above and prevented Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees from taking timely, complete and duty-free meal periods because, amongst other reasons: (1) Employers did not have legally-compliant policies regarding the provision and timing of meal periods or systematically disregarded their own purported meal period policies; (2) Employers' management at various levels failed and refused to implement and enforce legally compliant meal period policies and practices; (3) Employers failed to adequately inform and train Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees regarding their right to take timely, uninterrupted, and duty-free meal periods; (4) Employers failed to adequately inform and train Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees about their right to premium wages for non-compliant meal periods; (5) Employers failed to ensure that there was adequate staffing to allow Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees to take timely, uninterrupted, and duty-free meal periods; (6) Employers required Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees to respond to work-related requests at all times, including during meal periods; and (7) Employers' policy and culture prevented Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees from taking timely, uninterrupted, and duty-free meal periods because of the priority placed on maximizing profits over employees' right to receive timely, uninterrupted, and duty-free meal periods.

Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees did not receive an extra hour of wages at their regular rate of pay for each day a compliant meal period was not provided to them in compliance with California law.

Accordingly, Employers violated the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor Code sections 226.7, 512(a) and 1198.

Claimant and Aggrieved Employees will therefore seek PAGA default penalties pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699; penalties pursuant to paragraph of the applicable IWC Wage Orders; penalties pursuant to California Labor Code sections 558 and 1199; and attorneys' fees and costs.

3. REST BREAK VIOLATIONS

California law requires employers to authorize and permit employees to take an uninterrupted rest period of no less than ten (10) minutes for every four (4) hours, or major fraction thereof, worked. Cal. Lab. Code § 226.7. For each day that an employer fails to authorize and permit a compliant rest period, the employer owes the employee one hour of pay at the employee's regular rate of compensation. Cal. Lab. Code § 226.7(c).

Employers failed to authorize and permit Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees to take compliant 10-minute rest periods. Employers required Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees to work through rest periods. Claimant and Aggrieved Employees were not provided with uninterrupted, duty-free rest periods when they worked more than four (4) hours or a major fraction thereof. Further, Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees were not provided with a second uninterrupted, duty-free rest period when they worked more than six (6) hours in a day, or a third uninterrupted, duty-free rest period after working more than ten (10) hours in day. In the rare event that a rest period was taken, it was frequently interrupted or cut short. Moreover, Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees were not completely relieved of duty as required by *Augustus v. ABM Security Services, Inc.*, 2 Cal.5th 257 (2016).

Employers' policies, practices, and procedures were responsible for the violations alleged above and prevented Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees from taking timely and complete rest periods because, amongst other reasons: (1) Employers did not have legally-compliant policies regarding the provision and timing of rest periods or systematically disregarded its own purported rest period policies; (2) Employers' management at various levels failed and refused to implement and enforce legally compliant rest period policies and practices; (3) Employers failed to adequately inform and train Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees regarding their right to take timely, uninterrupted, and duty-free rest periods; (4) Employers failed to adequately inform and train Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees about their right to premium wages for non-compliant rest periods; (5) Employers failed to ensure that there was adequate staffing to allow Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees to take timely, uninterrupted, and duty-free rest periods; (6) Employers required Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees to respond to work-related requests at all times, including during rest periods; and (7) Employers' policy and culture prevented

Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees from taking timely, uninterrupted, and duty-free rest periods because of the priority placed on completing job requirements over employees' right to receive rest periods.

Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees did not receive an extra hour of wages at their regular rate of pay for each day a rest period was not provided to them in compliance with California law. Accordingly, Employers violated the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 1198.

Claimant and Aggrieved Employees will therefore seek PAGA default penalties pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699; penalties pursuant to the applicable IWC Wage Orders; Labor Code sections 558 and 1199 penalties; and attorneys' fees and costs.

4. FAILURE TO TIMELY PAY WAGES DURING EMPLOYMENT

California Labor Code section 204 requires that all wages earned by any person in any employment between the 1st and the 15th days, inclusive, of any calendar month, other than those wages due upon termination of an employee, are due and payable between the 16th and the 26th day of the month during which the labor was performed, and that all wages earned by any person in any employment between the 16th and the last day, inclusive, of any calendar month, other than those wages due upon termination of an employee, are due and payable between the 1st and the 10th day of the following month.

California Labor Code section 204 also requires that all wages earned for labor in excess of the normal work period shall be paid no later than the payday for the next regular payroll period. During the relevant time period, Employers failed to timely pay all wages earned because Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees were not paid all the wages they were owed including, *inter alia*, overtime compensation, straight time wages, minimum wages, commissions, and meal and rest period premiums. For these reasons, among others, Employers violated California Labor Code section 204.

Claimant and Aggrieved Employees will therefore seek PAGA default penalties pursuant to Labor Code section 2699; penalties pursuant to California Labor Code sections 210 and 1199; and attorneys' fees and costs.

5. FAILURE TO PROVIDE ACCURATE ITEMIZED WAGE STATEMENTS

California Labor Code section 226(a) requires an employer semimonthly or at the time of each payment of wages to furnish wage statements to its employees setting forth, *inter alia*, (1) gross wages earned, (2) total hours worked by the employee, (3) the number of piece-rate units earned and any applicable piece rate if the employee is paid on a piece-rate basis, (4) all deductions, provided that all deductions made on written orders of the employee may be aggregated and shown as one item, (5) net wages earned, (6) the inclusive dates of the period for which the employee is paid, (7) the name of the employee and only the last four digits of his or her social security number or an employee identification number other than a social security

number, and (8) the name and address of the legal entity that is the employer.

As a result of the practices described above, the wage statements provided to Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees failed to include the actual hours worked (including time spent working off-the-clock), the actual gross wages earned (including wages owed for time spent working off the clock and meal and rest period premiums), and the correct rates of pay. The wage statements provided to Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees also failed to include the name of the legal entity that employed Claimant and the Aggrieved Employees. Accordingly, Employers violated California Labor Code section 226(a).

Claimant and Aggrieved Employees will therefore seek PAGA default penalties; penalties pursuant to California Labor Code section 226.3; and attorneys' fees and costs.

6. FAILURE TO MAINTAIN ACCURATE RECORDS

California Labor Code section 1174(d) requires an employer to keep, at a central location in the state or at the plants or establishments at which employees are employed, payroll records showing the hours worked daily by and the wages paid to, and the number of piece-rate units earned by and any applicable piece rate paid to, employees employed at the respective plants or establishments. These records shall be kept with rules established for this purpose by the commission, but in any case, shall be kept on file for not less than three years. During the relevant time period, Employers have failed to maintain accurate records relating to Claimant and other Aggrieved Employees' work periods, meal periods, total daily hours worked, and total hours worked per payroll period. Accordingly, Employers violated the applicable IWC Wage Order and California Labor Code sections 1198.5 and 1174(d).

Claimant and Aggrieved Employees will therefore seek PAGA default penalties pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699; penalties pursuant to paragraph of the applicable IWC Wage Orders; California Labor Code section 1174.5 penalties; and attorneys' fees and costs.

7. FAILURE TO REIMBURSE NECESSARY EXPENDITURES

California Labor Code sections 2800 and 2802 require an employer to reimburse its employees for all necessary expenditures incurred by the employee in direct consequence of the discharge of his or her job duties or in direct consequence of his or her obedience to the directions of the employer. The applicable IWC Wage Order requires employers to provide employees with the tools or equipment necessary for the performance of their job. During the relevant time period, Claimant and Aggrieved Employees incurred necessary business-related expenses and costs that were not fully reimbursed by Employers.

Accordingly, Employers violated the applicable IWC Order and California Labor Code sections 2800 and 2802. Claimant and Aggrieved Employees will therefore seek PAGA default penalties pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699; penalties pursuant to paragraph of the applicable IWC Wage Orders; and attorneys' fees and costs.

8. FAILURE TO TIMELY PAY ALL WAGES UPON TERMINATION

California Labor Code sections 201 and 202 provide that if an employer discharges an employee, the wages earned and unpaid at the time of discharge are due and payable immediately, and if an employee quits his or her employment, his or her wages shall become due and payable not later than seventy-two (72) hours thereafter, unless the employee has given seventy-two (72) hours' notice of his or her intention to quit, in which case the employee is entitled to his or her wages at the time of quitting.

During the relevant time period, upon the termination of employment (including but not limited to when they were temporarily laid off, laid off, discharged, and/or resigned), Employers failed to pay all wages due to their employees within twenty-four (24) hours of termination or even within seventy-two (72) hours for those who resigned. Specifically, as a result of Employers' practices of requiring Claimant and Aggrieved Employees to work off-the-clock without compensation, failing to pay proper overtime compensation, failure to properly calculate regular rates, and failure to accurately record all hours actually worked, Employers failed to pay Claimant and Aggrieved Employees for all straight time wage, minimum wages and overtime compensation owed to them upon termination of their employment. Employers also failed to pay Claimant and Aggrieved Employees for meal period premiums and rest period premiums they were owed, amongst other wages. Accordingly, Employers violated California Labor Code sections 201 and 202.

Claimant and Aggrieved Employees will therefore seek PAGA default penalties pursuant to California Labor Code section 2699; penalties pursuant to California Labor Code sections 203 and 1199; and attorneys' fees and costs.

9. EMPLOYER'S OTHER VIOLATIONS OF THE CALIFORNIA LABOR CODE

Finally, pursuant to *Huff v. Securitas Security Services USA, Inc.* (2018) 25 Cal.App.5th 745 ("*Huff*"), as an Aggrieved Employee, Claimant has standing, and intends to pursue civil penalties on behalf of the LWDA against Employers for any and all other Labor Code violations committed by Employers. In *Huff*, the California Court of Appeals held that an employee alleging a single violation of the Labor Code under PAGA may also bring PAGA claims against Employer for all other alleged Labor Code violations, even those suffered by other employees of the same employer. According to the *Huff* decision, Claimant, as an "aggrieved" employee affected by at least one Labor Code violation may, and hereby does, pursue penalties on behalf of LWDA for all Labor Code violations by Employer.

Employers are in direct violation of numerous California wage and hour laws including but not limited to said sections stated above. Claimant hereby provides notice to the LWDA under the California Labor Code Private Attorneys General Act of 2004, California Labor Code Sections 2698, *et seq.*, and specifically asks for an investigation, or if the agency does not intend to investigate the alleged violations, a letter confirming the same so that Claimant may allege a cause

of action under PAGA against Employers for the violations discussed in this letter.

This letter is sent in compliance with the reporting requirements of California Labor Code section 2699.3. By law, an employee alleging a violation of one of the above referenced sections must notify his or her employer and the Labor and Workforce Development Agency (LWDA) before he or she can invoke the provisions of Sections 2699, *et seq.*, by seeking redress in court. Cal. Lab. Code § 2699.3(a)(1). The LWDA must then notify the employer and the employee within 60 calendar days regarding whether it intends to investigate the alleged violation. Cal. Lab. Code § 2699.3(a)(2)(B). If the LWDA advises it will not investigate, or if no notice is provided within 65 calendar days, the employee may file a lawsuit invoking the provisions under Labor Code § 2699. Cal. Lab. Code § 2699.3(a)(2)(A). It is Claimant's intention to file a civil complaint and to bring the appropriate claims under California Labor Code § 2699 on behalf of themselves, the State of California and all Aggrieved Employees should your office not address Employers' alleged violations within this timeframe.
