DECLARATION OF ALAN WILCOX

I, Alan Wilcox, declare as follows:

1. I am an attorney in good standing admitted in the State of California and the United States District Courts for the Central, Southern, Eastern, and Northern Districts of California. I am a Senior Attorney at Wilshire Law Firm, PLC (“WLF”), counsel of record for Plaintiff Tamim Hakimzada (“Plaintiff”). I have personal knowledge of the facts set forth in this declaration and could and would competently testify to them under oath if called as a witness.

2. This declaration is submitted concurrently with the [Proposed] Order Granting Plaintiff’s Motion for Preliminary Approval of Class Action and PAGA Settlement, revised pursuant to the Court’s June 30, 2026 Order (the “Order”).

3. In response and pursuant to the Court’s Order, Sections 10 and 20 of the Class Notice were revised.

4. The third paragraph of Section 10 was revised to state: “Proceeds of checks which remain uncashed after 180 days from the date of issuance will be voided, and the funds will irrevocably be lost to you because they will be paid to a court-approved non-profit organization or foundation. If your settlement check is lost or misplaced, you should contact the Settlement Administrator immediately to request a replacement. If your check is already void, you will have no way to recover the money.”

5. The second paragraph of Section 20 was revised to state: “Class members may appear at the final approval hearing in person or remotely using the link for Department 5 (Afternoon Session), and should review the remote appearance instructions beforehand: <https://santaclara.courts.ca.gov/online-services/remote-hearings>. Class members who wish to appear remotely are encouraged to contact class counsel at least three days before the hearing, if possible, so that potential technology or audibility issues can be avoided or minimized.”

6. A true and correct copy of the fully executed Settlement Agreement is attached as **Exhibit 1**. A true and correct copy of the amended Class Notice is attached thereto as **Exhibit A**.

7. In addition, the parties met and conferred in good faith and agreed that all

1 unclaimed funds shall be transmitted by the settlement administrator to the Greg E. Knoll Justice
2 Gap Fund, the designated cy pres recipient, subject to the Court's approval.

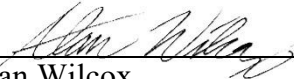

**CLASS ACTION AND PAGA
SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT**

This Class Action and PAGA Settlement Agreement (“Agreement”) is made by and
between Plaintiff Tamim Hakimzada (“Plaintiff”) and Defendant My Wireless NCC, Inc.
 (“Defendant”). The Agreement refers to Plaintiff and Defendant collectively as “Parties,” or
individually as “Party.”

1. DEFINITIONS.

1.1 “Action” means Plaintiff’s class and PAGA representative action lawsuit alleging
wage and hour violations against Defendant captioned *Tamim Hakimzada v. Wireless NCC, Inc.*,
Santa Clara County Superior Court, Case No. 24CV441948, initiated on June 27, 2024.

1.2 “Administrator” means Apex Class Action Administration, the neutral entity the Parties

have agreed to appoint to administer the Settlement.

1.3 “Administration Costs” means the amount the Administrator will be paid from the Gross Settlement Amount to reimburse its reasonable fees and expenses in accordance with the Administrator’s “not to exceed” bid submitted to the Court in connection with Preliminary Approval of the Settlement.

1.4 “Aggrieved Employee” means all current and former employees of Defendant who worked for Defendant in a non-exempt position in California at any time during the PAGA Period.

1.5 “Class” means all current and former employees of Defendant who worked for Defendant in California in a non-exempt position at any time during the Class Period.

1.6 “Class Counsel” means Benjamin H. Haber, Chase M. Stern, Alan Wilcox, and Bradford Smith of Wilshire Law Firm, PLC.

1.7 “Class Counsel Fees Payment” means an award of attorneys’ fees granted to Class Counsel and paid from the Gross Settlement Amount. The Parties have agreed Plaintiff will request approval from the Court of up to one-third (1/3) of the GSA (currently estimated to total \$76,666.66).

1.8 “Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment” means the amount allocated to Class Counsel for reimbursement of reasonable expenses and costs incurred to prosecute the Action and paid from the Gross Settlement Amount.

1.9 “Class Data” means Class Member identifying information in Defendant’s possession, custody, or control, including the Class Member’s name, last-known mailing address, Social Security number, and number of Workweeks and PAGA Pay Periods.

1.10 “Class Member” or “Settlement Class Member” means a member of the Class, as either a Participating Class Member or Non-Participating Class Member (including a Non-Participating Class Member who qualifies as an Aggrieved Employee).

1.11 “Class Member Address Search” means the Administrator’s investigation and search for current Class Member mailing addresses using all reasonably available sources, methods, and means including, but not limited to, the National Change of Address database, skip traces, and direct contact by the Administrator with Class Members.

1.12 “Class Notice” means the Court approved Notice of Settlement and hearing date for Final Approval, to be mailed to Class Members in English - in the form, without material variation, attached as Exhibit A and incorporated by reference into this Agreement.

1.13 “Class Period” or “Class Settlement Period” means the period from June 27, 2020 through March 12, 2025.

1.14 “Class Representative” means the named Plaintiff in the Action.

1.15 “Class Representative Service Payment” or “Enhancement Award” means the payment to the Class Representative for initiating the Action, providing services in support of the Action, and executing a general release.

1.16 “Court” means the Superior Court of California, County of Santa Clara.

1.17 “Defendant” means named Defendant My Wireless NCC, Inc.

1.18 “Defense Counsel” means Brian J. Mills and Erin D. Leach of Snell & Wilmer L.L.P.

1.19 “Effective Date” means the date by which both of the following have occurred: (a) the Court enters a Judgment on its Order Granting Final Approval of the Settlement; and (b) the Judgment is final. The Judgment is final as of the latest of the following occurrences: (a) if no Participating Class Member objects to the Settlement, the day the Court enters Judgment; (b) if one or more Participating Class Members objects to the Settlement, the day after the deadline for filing a notice of appeal from the Judgment; or (c) if a timely appeal from the Judgment is filed, the day after the appellate court affirms the Judgment and issues a remittitur.

1.20 “Final Approval” means the Court’s order granting final approval of the Settlement.

1.21 “Final Approval Hearing” means the Court’s hearing on the Motion for Final Approval of the Settlement.

1.22 “Final Judgment” means the Judgment entered by the Court upon granting Final Approval of the Settlement.

1.23 “Gross Settlement Amount” or “GSA” means \$230,000.00, which is the total amount Defendant agrees to pay under the Settlement and the maximum amount Defendant can be required to pay under the Settlement, except employer-side payroll taxes and as provided in Paragraph 8 below.

1.24 “Individual Class Payment” means the Participating Class Member’s pro rata share of the Net Settlement Amount calculated according to the number of Workweeks worked by each Participating Class Member during the Class Period.

1.25 “Individual PAGA Payment” means the Aggrieved Employee’s pro rata share of 25% of the PAGA Penalties calculated according to the number of PAGA Pay Periods worked by each Aggrieved Employee during the PAGA Period.

1.26 “Judgment” means the judgment entered by the Court based upon the Final Approval.

1.27 “LWDA” means the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency, the agency entitled, under Labor Code section 2699, subd. (i).

1.28 “LWDA PAGA Payment” means the 75% of the PAGA Penalties paid to the LWDA under Labor Code section 2699, subd. (i).

1.29 “Net Settlement Amount” means the Gross Settlement Amount, less the following payments in the amounts approved by the Court: PAGA Penalties payment, Enhancement Award, Class Counsel Fees Payment, Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, and the Administration Costs Payment. The remainder is to be paid to Participating Class Members as Individual Class Payments.

1.30 “Non-Participating Class Member” means any Class Member who opts out of the Settlement by sending the Administrator a valid and timely Request for Exclusion.

1.31 “Operative Complaint” means the operative First Amended Class and Representative Action Complaint filed in the Action on April 9, 2025.

1.32 “PAGA” means the Private Attorneys General Act (Labor Code §§ 2698, et seq.).

1.33 “PAGA Notice” means Plaintiff’s June 19, 2024 letter (LWDA-CM-1034959-24) to the LWDA and Defendant providing notice pursuant to Labor Code section 2699.3, subd.(a).

1.34 “PAGA Penalties” means the total amount of PAGA civil penalties to be paid from the Gross Settlement Amount (\$15,000.00), allocated 25% to the Aggrieved Employees (\$3,750.00) and 75% to LWDA (\$11,250.00) in settlement of PAGA claims.

1.35 “PAGA Period” means the period from June 19, 2023 through March 12, 2025.

1.36 “PAGA Pay Period” means any Pay Period during which an Aggrieved Employee

worked for Defendant for at least one day during the PAGA Period.

1.37 “Participating Class Member” means a Class Member who does not submit a valid and timely Request for Exclusion from the Settlement.

1.38 “Plaintiff” means Tamim Hakimzada, the named plaintiff in the Action.

1.39 “Preliminary Approval” means the Court’s Order Granting Preliminary Approval of the Settlement.

1.40 “Released Class Claims” means the claims being released as described in Paragraph 5.2 below.

1.41 “Released PAGA Claims” means the claims being released as described in Paragraph 5.3 below.

1.42 “Released Parties” means Defendant, and its former and present owners, parents, subsidiaries, and all of its current and former officers, directors, members, managers, employees, consultants, partners, shareholders, joint venturers, agents, successors, assigns, accountants, insurers, or legal representatives.

1.43 “Request for Exclusion” means a Class Member’s submission of a written request to be excluded from the Class Settlement signed by the Class Member.

1.44 “Response Deadline” means forty-five (45) days after the Administrator mails Notice to Class Members and Aggrieved Employees and shall be the last date on which Class Members may: (a) fax, email, or mail Requests for Exclusion from the Settlement, or (b) fax, email, or mail his or her Objection to the Settlement. Class Members to whom Notice packets are resent after having been returned undeliverable to the Administrator shall have an additional fourteen (14) calendar days beyond the Response Deadline has expired.

1.45 “Settlement” means the disposition of the Action effected by this Agreement and the Judgment.

1.46 “Workweek” means any week during which a Class Member worked for Defendant during the Class Period using dates of employment and prorated for partial weeks at the beginning or end of their employment if those arose during the Class Period.

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1 2. **RECITALS.**

2 2.1 On June 27, 2024, Plaintiff commenced this Action by filing a class action complaint
3 alleging Defendant: (1) failed to pay minimum and straight time wages; (2) failed to pay overtime
4 wages; (3) failed to provide meal periods; (4) failed to authorize and permit rest periods; (5) failed
5 to timely pay final wages at termination; (6) failed to provide accurate itemized wage statements;
6 (7) failed to indemnify employees for expenditures; and (8) violated California's Unfair
7 Competition Law, California Business and Professions Code section 17200, *et seq.* On June 19,
8 2024, pursuant to Labor Code § 2699.3, subd.(a), Plaintiff gave notice to the LWDA and
9 Defendant that Plaintiff intended to proceed with a representative action under PAGA (LWDA-
10 CM-1034959-24). On April 9, 2025, Plaintiff filed an amended complaint titled "First Amended
11 Class and Representative Action Complaint," adding a cause of action for civil penalties under
12 PAGA, Labor Code §§ 2699, *et seq.*

13 2.2 Defendant denies the allegations in the Action, denies any failure to comply with the
14 laws identified in the Action, and denies any and all liability for the causes of action alleged in
15 the Action.

16 2.3 On January 15, 2025, the Parties participated in an all-day mediation presided over by
17 mediator Sonya Goodwin, Esq. With the help of Ms. Goodwin, the Parties were able to reach an
18 agreement on general settlement terms at mediation and executed a Memorandum of
19 Understanding thereafter.

20 2.4 In advance of mediation, Class Counsel conducted a thorough investigation into the facts
21 of, and applicable law to, the Action. Prior to mediation, Plaintiff obtained and analyzed the time
22 and payroll data for all Class Members and the necessary policy documents through informal
23 discovery to properly evaluate the strengths and weakness of the claims and engage in meaningful
24 settlement discussions. Plaintiff's investigation was sufficient to satisfy the criteria for court
25 approval set forth in *Dunk v. Foot Locker Retail, Inc.*, 48 Cal.App.4th 1794, 1801 (1996) and
26 *Kullar v. Foot Locker Retail, Inc.*, 168 Cal.App.4th 116, 129-130 (2008) ("*Dunk/Kullar*").

27 2.5 The Court has not granted class certification because the Parties engaged in mediation
28 before any class certification.

2.6 The Parties, Class Counsel, and Defense Counsel represent that they are not aware of any other pending matter or action asserting claims that will be extinguished or affected by the Settlement.

3. **MONETARY TERMS.**

3.1 Gross Settlement Amount. Except as otherwise provided by Paragraph 8 below, Defendant will pay \$230,000.00 to fully settle, resolve, and extinguish all claims asserted in the Action, including without limitation all claims asserted in the PAGA Notice. The Gross Settlement Amount is non-reversionary and does not include employer-side payroll taxes owed on the wage portions of the Individual Class Payments, which Defendant will pay separately.

3.2 Payments from the Gross Settlement Amount. The Administrator will make and deduct the following payments from the Gross Settlement Amount, in the amounts specified by the Court in the Final Approval:

3.2.1 To Plaintiff: A payment for the Enhancement Award to Plaintiff of not more than \$10,000.00 in addition to any Individual Class Payment and any Individual PAGA Payment the Class Representative is entitled to receive as a Participating Class Member. Defendant will not oppose Plaintiff's request for an Enhancement Award that does not exceed this amount. As part of the motion for the Class Counsel Fees and Litigation Expenses Payments, Plaintiff will seek Court approval for any Enhancement Award no later than 16 (sixteen) court days prior to the Final Approval Hearing, or as otherwise ordered by the Court. If the Court approves an Enhancement Award less than the amount requested, the Administrator will retain the remainder in the Net Settlement Amount to be distributed to Participating Class Members. The Administrator will pay the Enhancement Award using IRS Form 1099. Plaintiff assumes full responsibility and liability for employee taxes owed on the Enhancement Award and holds Defendant harmless, and indemnifies Defendant, from any dispute or controversy regarding any division or sharing of any of these Payments.

3.2.2 To Class Counsel: A Class Counsel Fees Payment of not more than one-third (1/3) of the GSA, which is currently estimated to be \$76,666.66 and a Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment for actual costs. Defendant will not oppose requests for these payments.

Plaintiff and/or Class Counsel will file a motion for Class Counsel Fees and Litigation Expenses Payments no later than 16 (sixteen) court days prior to the Final Approval Hearing, or as otherwise ordered by the Court. If the Court approves a Class Counsel Fees Payment and/or a Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment less than the amounts requested, the Administrator will allocate the remainder to the Net Settlement Amount for distribution to Participating Class Members. Released Parties shall have no liability to Class Counsel or any other Plaintiff's counsel arising from any claim to any portion of Class Counsel Fee Payment and/or Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment. The Administrator will pay the Class Counsel Fees Payment and Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment using one or more IRS 1099 Forms. Class Counsel assumes full responsibility and liability for taxes owed on the Class Counsel Fees Payment and the Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment and holds Defendant harmless, and indemnifies Defendant, from any dispute or controversy regarding any division or sharing of any of these Payments.

3.2.3 To the Administrator: An Administrator Costs Payment for actual costs, not to exceed \$6,000.00 except for a showing of good cause and as approved by the Court. To the extent the Administration Costs are less or the Court approves payment of less than requested, the Administrator will retain the remainder in the Net Settlement Amount to be distributed to Participating Class Members.

3.2.4 To Each Participating Class Member: An Individual Class Payment is calculated by (a) dividing the Net Settlement Amount by the total number of Workweeks worked by all Participating Class Members during the Class Period, and (b) multiplying the result by each individual Participating Class Member's Workweeks.

3.2.4.1 Tax Allocation of Individual Class Payments. 33% of each Participating Class Member's Individual Class Payment will be allocated to the Settlement of wage claims (the "Wage Portion"). The Wage Portion is subject to tax withholding and will be reported on an IRS W-2 Form. The remaining 67% of each Participating Class Member's Individual Class Payment will be allocated to the settlement of claims for interest and penalties (the "Non-Wage Portion"). The Non-Wage Portions are not subject to wage withholdings and will be reported on IRS 1099 Forms. Participating Class Members assume full responsibility and liability for any employee

taxes owed on their Individual Class Payment, except for employer taxes on wages, which will be paid by Defendant..

3.2.4.2 Effect of Non-Participating Class Members on Calculation of Individual Class Payments. Non-Participating Class Members will not receive any Individual Class Payments and will not be included in the calculation of the total Workweeks at issue for purposes of calculating the amount of Individual Class Payments.

3.2.5 To the LWDA and Aggrieved Employees: PAGA Penalties in the amount of \$15,000.00 to be paid from the Gross Settlement Amount, with 75% (\$11,250.00) allocated to the LWDA PAGA Payment and 25% (\$3,750.00) allocated to the Individual PAGA Payments.

3.2.5.1 The Administrator will calculate each Individual PAGA Payment by (a) dividing the amount of the Aggrieved Employees' 25% share of PAGA Penalties (\$3,750.00) by the total number of PAGA Pay Periods worked by all Aggrieved Employees during the PAGA Period, and (b) multiplying the result by each individual Aggrieved Employee's PAGA Pay Periods. Aggrieved Employees assume full responsibility and liability for any taxes owed on their Individual PAGA Payment.

3.2.5.2 If the Court approves PAGA Penalties of less than the amount requested, the Administrator will allocate the remainder to the Net Settlement Amount to be distributed to Participating Class Members. The Administrator will report the Individual PAGA Payments on IRS 1099 Forms.

4. SETTLEMENT FUNDING AND PAYMENTS.

4.1 Class Workweeks and Aggrieved Employee Pay Periods. Based on a review of its records, Defendant represents that as of the date of the mediation of this case on January 15, 2025, there were approximately 199 Class Members who collectively worked a total of approximately 6,785 Workweeks during the Class Period and approximately 117 Aggrieved Employees who collectively worked a total of approximately 1,500 PAGA Pay Periods during the PAGA Period through the date of mediation.

4.2 Class Data. Not later than seven (7) days after the Court grants Preliminary Approval of the Settlement, Defendant will deliver the Class Data to the Administrator, in the form of a

1 Microsoft Excel spreadsheet. To protect Class Members' privacy rights, the Administrator must
2 maintain the Class Data in confidence, use the Class Data only for purposes of this Settlement
3 and for no other purpose, and restrict access to the Class Data to Administrator employees who
4 need access to the Class Data to effect and perform under this Agreement. Defendant has a
5 continuing duty to immediately notify Class Counsel if it discovers that the Class Data omitted
6 class member identifying information and to provide corrected or updated Class Data as soon as
7 reasonably feasible. Without any extension of the deadline by which Defendant must send the
8 Class Data to the Administrator, the Parties and their counsel will expeditiously use best efforts,
9 in good faith, to reconstruct or otherwise resolve any issues related to missing or omitted Class
10 Data.

11 4.3 Funding of Gross Settlement Amount. Defendant shall fully fund the Gross Settlement
12 Amount and the amounts necessary to fully pay Defendant's share of payroll taxes by transmitting
13 the funds to the Administrator no later than 14 (fourteen) calendar days after the Effective Date.

14 4.4 Payments from the Gross Settlement Amount. Within seven (7) days after Defendant
15 fully funds the GSA, the Administrator will mail checks for all Individual Class Payments, all
16 Individual PAGA Payments, the LWDA PAGA Payment, the Administration Costs Payment, the
17 Class Counsel Fees Payment, the Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, and the
18 Enhancement Award. Disbursement of the Class Counsel Fees Payment, the Class Counsel
19 Litigation Expenses Payment, and the Enhancement Award shall not precede disbursement of
20 Individual Class Payments and Individual PAGA Payments.

21 4.4.1 The Administrator will issue checks for the Individual Class Payments and/or
22 Individual PAGA Payments and send them to the Class Members via First Class U.S. Mail. The
23 face of each check shall prominently state the date (180 days after the date of mailing) when the
24 check will be voided ("Void Date"). The Administrator will cancel all checks not cashed by the
25 Void Date. The Administrator will send checks for Individual Settlement Payments to all
26 Participating Class Members (including those for whom the Class Notice was returned
27 undelivered). The Administrator will send checks for Individual PAGA Payments to all
28 Aggrieved Employees including Non-Participating Class Members who qualify as Aggrieved

Employees (including those for whom Class Notice was returned undelivered). The Administrator may send Participating Class Members a single check combining the Individual Class Payment and the Individual PAGA Payment. Before mailing any checks, the Settlement Administrator must update the recipients' mailing addresses using the National Change of Address Database.

4.4.2 The Administrator must conduct a Class Member Address Search for all other Class Members whose checks are returned undelivered without USPS forwarding address. Within seven (7) days of receiving a returned check, the Administrator must re-mail checks to the USPS forwarding address provided or to an address ascertained through the Class Member Address Search. The Administrator need not take further steps to deliver checks to Class Members whose re-mailed checks are returned as undelivered. The Administrator shall promptly send a replacement check to any Class Member whose original check was lost or misplaced, requested by the Class Member prior to the void date.

4.4.3 For any Class Member whose Individual Class Payment check or Individual PAGA Payment check is uncashed and canceled after the void date, the Administrator shall transmit the funds represented by such checks to the California Controller's Unclaimed Property Fund in the name of the Class Member thereby leaving no "unpaid residue" subject to the requirements of California Code of Civil Procedure Section 384, subd. (b).

4.4.4 The payment of Individual Class Payments and Individual PAGA Payments shall not obligate Defendant to confer any additional benefits or make any additional payments to Class Members (such as 401(k) contributions or bonuses) beyond those specified in this Agreement.

5. **RELEASES OF CLAIMS.** Effective on the date when Defendant fully funds the Gross Settlement Amount and all employer payroll taxes owed on the Wage Portion of the Individual Class Payments, Plaintiff, Class Members, and Aggrieved Employees will release claims against all Released Parties as follows:

5.1 **Plaintiff's Release.** Plaintiff discharges Released Parties from all claims, transactions, or occurrences, that occurred during the Class Period, including, but not limited to, all claims that were, or reasonably could have been, alleged, based on the facts contained in the Action or that relate in any way to Plaintiff's employment with Defendant; and include any

1 statutory claims, including claims under the Fair Employment and Housing Act, California
2 Business and Professions Code, Americans with Disabilities Act, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act
3 of 1964, the California Labor Code, and all equivalent claims under federal law (“Plaintiff’s
4 Release”). Plaintiff’s Release does not extend to any claims or actions to enforce this Agreement,
5 or to any claims for vested benefits, unemployment benefits, disability benefits, social security
6 benefits, workers’ compensation benefits that arose at any time, or based on occurrences outside
7 the Class Period. Plaintiff acknowledges that Plaintiff may discover facts or law different from,
8 or in addition to, the facts or law that Plaintiff now knows or believes to be true but agrees,
9 nonetheless, that Plaintiff’s Release shall be and remain effective in all respects, notwithstanding
10 such different or additional facts or Plaintiff’s discovery of them.

11 5.1.1 Plaintiff’s Waiver of Rights Under California Civil Code Section 1542. For
12 purposes of Plaintiff’s Release, Plaintiff expressly waives and relinquishes the provisions, rights,
13 and benefits, if any, of section 1542 of the California Civil Code, which reads:

14 A general release does not extend to claims that the creditor or releasing party does
15 not know or suspect to exist in his or her favor at the time of executing the release
16 and that, if known by him or her, would have materially affected his or her
17 settlement with the debtor or released party.

18 5.2 Released Class Claims: All Participating Class Members will waive and release the
19 Released Parties from any and all claims, causes of action, damages, wages, benefits, expenses,
20 penalties, debts, liabilities, demands, obligations, attorneys’ fees, costs, and any other form of
21 relief or remedy in law, equity, or whatever kind of nature, arising from the claims pled in the
22 Action and any claims based on facts alleged in the Operative Complaint, including all claims for
23 failure to pay for all hours worked, failure to pay overtime wages, meal period violations, rest
24 break violations, failure to pay minimum wage, failure to pay straight time wages, wages not
25 timely paid upon termination, non-compliant wages statements, failure to reimburse necessary
26 business expenses, and unlawful business practices under the California Labor Code and/or the
27 California Business and Professions Code, including all claims for restitution or equitable relief,
28 liquidated damages, penalties of any nature whatsoever, attorneys’ fees and costs, asserted or that

might have been asserted by any Class Member against the Released Parties based on the facts or claims alleged in the Action during the Class Period. This includes claims meeting the above definition(s) under any and all applicable statutes, including without limitation California Labor Code sections §§ 201, 202, 203, 204, 226, 226.7, 510, 512, 558, 1174, 1194.2, 1197, 1198, 2800, 2802; the California Unfair Competition Law, and in particular, California Bus. and Prof. Code §§ 17200 et seq, as well as the applicable Industrial Welfare Commission Wage Orders (collectively the “Released Class Claims”).

5.3 Released PAGA Claims: The claims released by Aggrieved Employees, including Non-Participating Class Members who are Aggrieved Employees, are all claims for civil penalties under PAGA arising during the PAGA Period that were alleged in Plaintiff’s PAGA Notice dated June 19, 2024 to the LWDA or that could have been alleged by Plaintiff based on the factual allegations asserted in the PAGA Notice (collectively the “Released PAGA Claims”).

6. **MOTION FOR PRELIMINARY APPROVAL**. Plaintiff will prepare and file a motion for preliminary approval (“Motion for Preliminary Approval”).

6.1 Plaintiff’s Responsibilities. Plaintiff will prepare all documents necessary for obtaining Preliminary Approval, including: (i) a draft of the notice, and memorandum in support, of the Motion for Preliminary Approval that includes an analysis of the Settlement under *Dunk/Kullar* and a request for approval of the PAGA Settlement under Labor Code Section 2699, subd. (f)(2)); (ii) a draft proposed Order Granting Preliminary Approval and Approval of PAGA Settlement; (iii) a draft proposed Class Notice; (iv) a signed declaration from Plaintiff confirming willingness and competency to serve and disclosing all facts relevant to any actual or potential conflicts of interest with Class Members, and/or the Administrator; (v) a signed declaration from Class Counsel firm attesting to its competency to represent the Class Members; its timely transmission to the LWDA of this Agreement (Labor Code section 2699, subd. (l)(2)); and (vi) all facts relevant to any actual or potential conflict of interest with Class Members, and/or the Administrator. In their Declarations, Plaintiff and Class Counsel shall aver that they are not aware of any other pending matter or action asserting claims that will be extinguished or adversely affected by the Settlement.

6.2 Responsibilities of Counsel. Class Counsel and Defense Counsel are jointly responsible for expeditiously finalizing the Motion for Preliminary Approval. Class Counsel will obtain a prompt hearing date for the Motion for Preliminary Approval, file the Motion for Preliminary Approval no later than 16 (sixteen) court days before the hearing, unless otherwise ordered by the Court, and deliver the Court's Preliminary Approval Order to the Administrator.

6.3 Duty to Cooperate. If the Parties disagree on any aspect of the proposed Motion for Preliminary Approval and/or the supporting declarations and documents, Class Counsel and Defense Counsel will expeditiously work together on behalf of the Parties by meeting in person or by telephone, and in good faith, to resolve the disagreement. If the Court does not grant Preliminary Approval or conditions Preliminary Approval on any material change to this Agreement, Class Counsel and Defense Counsel will expeditiously work together on behalf of the Parties by meeting in person or by telephone, and in good faith, to modify the Agreement and otherwise satisfy the Court's concerns.

7. SETTLEMENT ADMINISTRATION.

7.1 Selection of Administrator. The Parties have jointly selected Apex Class Action Administration to serve as the Administrator and verified that, as a condition of appointment, the Administrator agrees to be bound by this Agreement and to perform, as a fiduciary, all duties specified in this Agreement in exchange for payment of Administration Costs. The Parties and their Counsel represent that they have no interest or relationship, financial or otherwise, with the Administrator other than a professional relationship arising out of prior experiences administering settlements.

7.2 Employer Identification Number. The Administrator shall have and use its own Employer Identification Number for purposes of calculating payroll tax withholdings and providing reports to state and federal tax authorities.

7.3 Qualified Settlement Fund. The Administrator shall establish a settlement fund that meets the requirements of a Qualified Settlement Fund ("QSF") under US Treasury Regulation section 468B-1 for the funding of the GSA. Any interest that accrues on the GSA sums paid into the QSF prior to distribution by the Administrator will become part of the NSA for distribution

1 to Participating Class Members.

2 7.4 Notice to Class Members.

3 7.4.1 No later than five (5) calendar days after receipt of the Class Data, the Administrator
4 shall notify Class Counsel that the list has been received and state the number of Class Members,
5 Aggrieved Employees, Workweeks, and Pay Periods in the Class Data.

6 7.4.2 Using best efforts to perform as soon as possible, and in no event later than 14 days
7 after receiving the Class Data, the Administrator will send to all Class Members identified in the
8 Class Data, via first-class United States Postal Service ("USPS") mail, the Class Notice
9 substantially in the form attached to this Agreement as Exhibit A. The first page of the Class
10 Notice shall prominently estimate the dollar amounts of any Individual Class Payment and/or
11 Individual PAGA Payment payable to the Class Member, and the number of Workweeks and
12 PAGA Pay Periods used to calculate these amounts. Before mailing Class Notices, the
13 Administrator shall update Class Member addresses using the National Change of Address
14 database.

15 7.4.3 Not later than five (5) calendar days after the Administrator's receipt of any Class
16 Notice returned by the USPS as undelivered, the Administrator shall re-mail the Class Notice
17 using any forwarding address provided by the USPS. If the USPS does not provide a forwarding
18 address, the Administrator shall conduct a Class Member Address Search, and re-mail the Class
19 Notice to the most current address obtained. The Administrator has no obligation to make further
20 attempts to locate or send Class Notice to Class Members whose Class Notice is returned by the
21 USPS a second time.

22 7.4.4 The deadlines for Class Members' written objections, challenges to Workweeks
23 and/or Pay Periods, and Requests for Exclusion will be extended an additional 14 days beyond
24 the 45 days otherwise provided in the Class Notice for all Class Members whose notice is re-
25 mailed. The Administrator will inform the Class Member of the extended deadline with the re-
26 mailed Class Notice.

27 7.4.5 If the Administrator, Defendant, or Class Counsel is contacted by or otherwise
28 discovers any persons who believe they should have been included in the Class Data and should

1 have received Class Notice, the Parties will expeditiously meet and confer in person or by
2 telephone, and in good faith in an effort to agree on whether to include them as Class Members.
3 If the Parties agree, such persons will be Class Members entitled to the same rights as other Class
4 Members, and the Administrator will send, via email or overnight delivery, a Class Notice
5 requiring them to exercise options under this Agreement not later than 14 days after receipt of
6 Class Notice, or the deadline dates in the Class Notice, whichever are later.

7 7.5 Requests for Exclusion (Opt-Outs).

8 7.5.1 Class Members who wish to exclude themselves (opt-out of) the Class Settlement
9 must send the Administrator, by fax, email, or mail, a signed written Request for Exclusion not
10 later than 45 days after the Administrator mails the Class Notice (plus an additional 14) days for
11 Class Members whose Class Notice is re-mailed). A Request for Exclusion is a letter from a Class
12 Member or his/her representative that reasonably communicates the Class Member's election to
13 be excluded from the Settlement and includes the Class Member's name, address and email
14 address or telephone number. To be valid, a Request for Exclusion must be timely faxed, emailed,
15 or postmarked by the Response Deadline.

16 7.5.2 The Administrator may not reject a Request for Exclusion timely submitted as
17 invalid because it fails to contain all the information specified in the Class Notice. The
18 Administrator shall accept any Request for Exclusion as valid if the Administrator can reasonably
19 ascertain the identity of the person as a Class Member and the Class Member's desire to be
20 excluded. The Administrator's determination shall be final and not appealable or otherwise
21 susceptible to challenge. If the Administrator has reason to question the authenticity of a Request
22 for Exclusion, the Administrator may demand additional proof of the Class Member's identity.
23 The Administrator's determination of authenticity shall be final and not appealable or otherwise
24 susceptible to challenge.

25 7.5.3 Every Class Member who does not submit a timely and valid Request for Exclusion
26 is deemed to be a Participating Class Member under this Agreement, entitled to all benefits and
27 bound by all terms and conditions of the Settlement, including the Participating Class Members'
28 Releases under paragraphs 5.2 and 5.3 of this Agreement, regardless of whether the Participating

1 Class Member actually receives the Class Notice or objects to the Settlement.

2 7.5.4 Every Class Member who submits a valid and timely Request for Exclusion is a
3 Non-Participating Class Member and shall not receive an Individual Class Payment or have the
4 right to object to the class action components of the Settlement. Because future PAGA claims are
5 subject to claim preclusion upon entry of the Judgment, Non-Participating Class Members who
6 are Aggrieved Employees are deemed to release the Released PAGA Claims identified in
7 Paragraph 5.3 of this Agreement and are eligible for an Individual PAGA Payment.

8 7.6 Challenges to Calculation of Workweeks and Pay Periods. Each Class Member shall
9 have 45 (forty-five) days after the Administrator mails the Class Notice (plus an additional 14
10 (fourteen) days for Class Members whose Class Notice is re-mailed) to challenge the number of
11 Class Workweeks and PAGA Pay Periods allocated to the Class Member in the Class Notice. The
12 Class Member may challenge the allocation by communicating with the Administrator via fax,
13 email or mail. The Administrator must encourage the challenging Class Member to submit
14 supporting documentation. In the absence of any contrary documentation, the Administrator is
15 entitled to presume that the Workweeks contained in the Class Notice are correct so long as they
16 are consistent with the Class Data. The Administrator's determination of each Class Member's
17 allocation of Workweeks and/or Pay Periods shall be final and not appealable or otherwise
18 susceptible to challenge. The Administrator shall promptly provide copies of all challenges to the
19 calculation of Workweeks and/or Pay Periods to Defense Counsel and Class Counsel and the
20 Administrator's determination of the challenges.

21 7.7 Objections to Settlement.

22 7.7.1 Only Participating Class Members may object to the class action components of the
23 Settlement and/or this Agreement, including contesting the fairness of the Settlement, and/or
24 amounts requested for the Class Counsel Fees Payment, Class Counsel Litigation Expenses
25 Payment and/or Enhancement Award.

26 7.7.2 Participating Class Members may send written objections to the Administrator, by
27 fax, email, or mail. In the alternative, Participating Class Members may appear in Court (or hire
28 an attorney to appear in Court) to present verbal objections at the Final Approval Hearing. A

1 Participating Class Member who elects to send a written objection to the Administrator must do
2 so not later than 45 days after the Administrator's mailing of the Class Notice (plus an additional
3 14 days for Class Members whose Class Notice was re-mailed).

4 7.7.3 Non-Participating Class Members have no right to object to any of the class action
5 components of the Settlement.

6 7.8 Administrator Duties. The Administrator has a duty to perform or observe all tasks to be
7 performed or observed by the Administrator contained in this Agreement or otherwise.

8 7.8.1 Website, Email Address and Toll-Free Number. The Administrator will establish,
9 maintain and use an internet website to post information of interest to Class Members including
10 the date, time and location for the Final Approval Hearing and copies of the Settlement
11 Agreement; Motion for Preliminary Approval; Preliminary Approval Order; Class Notice;
12 Motion for Final Approval; Motion for Class Counsel Fees Payment, Class Counsel Litigation
13 Expenses Payment and Enhancement Award; the Final Approval Order; and the Judgment. The
14 Administrator will also maintain and monitor an email address and a toll-free telephone number
15 to receive Class Member calls, faxes and emails.

16 7.8.2 Requests for Exclusion (Opt-outs) and Exclusion List. The Administrator will
17 promptly review on a rolling basis Requests for Exclusion to ascertain their validity. Not later
18 than five (5) days after the expiration of the deadline for submitting Requests for Exclusion, the
19 Administrator shall email a list to Class Counsel and Defense Counsel containing (a) the names
20 and other identifying information of Class Members who have timely submitted valid Requests
21 for Exclusion ("Exclusion List"); (b) the names and other identifying information of Class
22 Members who have submitted invalid Requests for Exclusion; (c) copies of all Requests for
23 Exclusion from Settlement submitted (whether valid or invalid).

24 7.8.3 Weekly Reports. The Administrator must, on a weekly basis, provide written reports
25 to Class Counsel and Defense Counsel that, among other things, tally the number of: Class
26 Notices mailed or re-mailed, Class Notices returned undelivered, Requests for Exclusion (whether
27 valid or invalid) received, objections received, challenges to Workweeks and/or Pay Periods
28 received and/or resolved, and checks mailed for Individual Class Payments and Individual PAGA

1 Payments (“Weekly Report”). The Weekly Reports must include the Administrator’s assessment
2 of the validity of Requests for Exclusion and attach copies of all Requests for Exclusion and
3 objections received.

4 7.8.4 Workweek and/or Pay Period Challenges. The Administrator has the authority to
5 address and make final decisions consistent with the terms of this Agreement on all Class Member
6 challenges over the calculation of Workweeks and/or Pay Periods. The Administrator’s decision
7 shall be final and not appealable or otherwise susceptible to challenge.

8 7.8.5 Administrator’s Declaration. Not later than 14 days before the date by which
9 Plaintiff is required to file the Motion for Final Approval of the Settlement, the Administrator
10 will provide to Class Counsel and Defense Counsel, a signed declaration suitable for filing in
11 Court attesting to its due diligence and compliance with all of its obligations under this
12 Agreement, including, but not limited to, its mailing of Class Notice, the Class Notices returned
13 as undelivered, the re-mailing of Class Notices, attempts to locate Class Members, the total
14 number of Requests for Exclusion from Settlement it received (both valid or invalid), the number
15 of written objections and attach the Exclusion List. The Administrator will supplement its
16 declaration as needed or requested by the Parties and/or the Court. Class Counsel is responsible
17 for filing the Administrator’s declaration(s) in Court.

18 7.8.6 Final Report by Settlement Administrator. Within 10 days after the Administrator
19 disburses all funds in the Gross Settlement Amount, the Administrator will provide Class Counsel
20 and Defense Counsel with a final report detailing its disbursements by employee identification
21 number only of all payments made under this Agreement. At least 15 days before any deadline
22 set by the Court, the Administrator will prepare, and submit to Class Counsel and Defense
23 Counsel, a signed declaration suitable for filing in Court attesting to its disbursement of all
24 payments required under this Agreement. Class Counsel is responsible for filing the
25 Administrator's declaration in Court.

26 8. **ESCALATOR CLAUSE**. The GSA was calculated based on Defendant’s estimate that 199
27 Class Members collectively worked a total of 6,785 Workweeks during the Class Period up until
28 the date of mediation. Should the total number of Workweeks increase by more than 10% (i.e.

more than 678.5 Workweeks), the GSA will increase on a proportional basis equal to the percentage increase in the number of Workweeks worked by the Class Members above 10% (for example, if the final number of total Workweeks increases by 11%, the GSA will increase by 1%).

9. **DEFENDANT’S RIGHT TO WITHDRAW.** If the valid Requests for Exclusion identified in the Exclusion List represent more than an aggregate total of 10% of Class Members (i.e. more than 20 opted-out), Defendant may, but is not obligated, to elect to withdraw from the Settlement. The Parties agree that, if Defendant withdraws, the Settlement shall be *void ab initio*, have no force or effect whatsoever, and that neither Party will have any further obligation to perform under this Agreement; provided, however, Defendant will remain responsible for paying all Settlement Administration Costs incurred to that point. Defendant must notify Class Counsel and the Court of its election to withdraw not later than 5 (five) business days after the Administrator sends the final Exclusion List to Defense Counsel; late elections will have no effect.

10. **MOTION FOR FINAL APPROVAL.** Not later than 16 (sixteen) court days before the calendared Final Approval Hearing, unless otherwise scheduled by the Court, Plaintiff will file in Court, a Motion for Final Approval of the Settlement that includes a request for approval of the PAGA settlement under Labor Code section 2699, subd. (l); a Proposed Final Approval Order; and a proposed Judgment (collectively “Motion for Final Approval”). Plaintiff shall provide drafts of these documents to Defense Counsel prior to filing the Motion for Final Approval. Class Counsel and Defense Counsel will expeditiously meet and confer in person or by telephone, and in good faith, to resolve any disagreements concerning the Motion for Final Approval.

10.1 **Response to Objections.** Each Party retains the right to respond to any objection raised by a Participating Class Member, including the right to file responsive documents in Court no later than five (5) court days prior to the Final Approval Hearing, or as otherwise ordered or accepted by the Court.

10.2 **Duty to Cooperate.** If the Court does not grant Final Approval or conditions Final Approval on any material change to the Settlement (including, but not limited to, the scope of release to be granted by Class Members), the Parties will expeditiously work together in good

1 faith to address the Court's concerns by revising the Agreement as necessary to obtain Final
2 Approval. The Court's decision to award less than the amounts requested for the Enhancement
3 Award, Class Counsel Fees Payment, Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, and/or
4 Administrator Costs Payment shall not constitute a material modification to the Agreement within
5 the meaning of this paragraph.

6 10.3 Continuing Jurisdiction of the Court. The Parties agree that, pursuant to Code of Civil
7 Procedure section 664.6, after entry of Judgment, the Court will retain jurisdiction over the
8 Parties, the Action, and the Settlement solely for purposes of (i) enforcing this Agreement and/or
9 Judgment, (ii) addressing settlement administration matters, and (iii) addressing such post-
10 Judgment matters as are permitted by law.

11 10.4 Waiver of Right to Appeal. Provided the Judgment is consistent with the terms and
12 conditions of this Agreement, specifically including the Class Counsel Fees Payment and Class
13 Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment as set forth in this Settlement, the Parties, their respective
14 counsel, and all Participating Class Members who did not object to the Settlement as provided in
15 this Agreement, waive all rights to appeal from the Judgment, including all rights to post-
16 judgment and appellate proceedings, the right to file motions to vacate judgment, motions for new
17 trial, extraordinary writs, and appeals. The waiver of appeal does not include any waiver of the
18 right to oppose such motions, writs or appeals. If an objector appeals the Judgment, the Parties'
19 obligations to perform under this Agreement will be suspended until such time as the appeal is
20 finally resolved and the Judgment becomes final, except as to matters that do not affect the amount
21 of the Net Settlement Amount.

22 10.5 Appellate Court Orders to Vacate, Reverse, or Materially Modify Judgment. If the
23 reviewing Court vacates, reverses, or modifies the Judgment in a manner that requires a material
24 modification of this Agreement (including, but not limited to, the scope of release to be granted
25 by Class Members), this Agreement shall be null and void. The Parties shall nevertheless
26 expeditiously work together in good faith to address the appellate court's concerns and to obtain
27 Final Approval and Entry of Judgment, sharing, on a 50-50 basis, any additional Administration
28 Costs reasonably incurred after remittitur. An appellate decision to vacate, reverse, or modify the

Court's award of the Enhancement Award or any payments to Class Counsel shall not constitute a material modification of the Judgment within the meaning of this paragraph, as long as the Gross Settlement Amount remains unchanged.

11. **AMENDED JUDGMENT.** If any amended judgment is required under Code of Civil Procedure section 384, the Parties will work together in good faith to jointly submit a proposed amended judgment.

12. **ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS.**

12.1 No Admission of Liability, Class Certification or Representative Manageability for Other Purposes. This Agreement represents a compromise and settlement of highly disputed claims. Nothing in this Agreement is intended or should be construed as an admission by Defendant that any of the allegations in the Operative Complaint has merit or that Defendant has any liability for any claims asserted; nor should it be intended or construed as an admission by Plaintiff that Defendant's defenses in the Action have merit. The Parties agree that class certification and representative treatment is for purposes of this Settlement only. If, for any reason, the Court does grant Preliminary Approval, Final Approval, or enter Judgment, Defendant reserves the right to contest certification of any class for any reason, Defendant reserves all available defenses to the claims in the Action, and Plaintiff reserves the right to move for class certification on any grounds available and to contest Defendant's defenses. The Settlement, this Agreement and Parties' willingness to settle the Action will have no bearing on, and will not be admissible in connection with, any litigation (except for proceedings to enforce or effectuate the Settlement and this Agreement).

12.2 Confidentiality Prior to Preliminary Approval. Plaintiff, Class Counsel, Defendant, and Defense Counsel separately agree that, until the Motion for Preliminary Approval of Settlement is filed, they and each of them will not disclose, disseminate and/or publicize, or cause or permit another person to disclose, disseminate or publicize, any of the terms of the Agreement directly or indirectly, specifically or generally, to any person, corporation, association, government agency, or other entity except: (1) to the Parties' attorneys, accountants, or spouses, all of whom will be instructed to keep this Agreement confidential; (2) counsel in a related matter; (3) to the

1 extent necessary to report income to appropriate taxing authorities; (4) in response to a court order
2 or subpoena; or (5) in response to an inquiry or subpoena issued by a state or federal government
3 agency. Each Party agrees to immediately notify the other Party of any judicial or agency order,
4 inquiry, or subpoena seeking such information. Plaintiff, Class Counsel, Defendant, and Defense
5 Counsel separately agree not to, directly or indirectly, initiate any conversation or other
6 communication, before the filing of the Motion for Preliminary Approval, with any third party
7 regarding this Agreement or the matters giving rise to this Agreement except to respond only that
8 “the matter was resolved,” or words to that effect. This paragraph does not restrict Class Counsel’s
9 communications with Class Members in accordance with Class Counsel’s ethical obligations
10 owed to Class Members.

11 12.3 No Publicity. Plaintiff and Class Counsel agree that they will not issue any press releases,
12 initiate any contact with the press, respond to any press inquiry or have any communication with
13 the press about this case and/or the fact, amount or terms of the Settlement. In addition, Plaintiff
14 and Class Counsel agree that they will not engage in any advertising or distribute any marketing
15 materials relating to the Settlement, including but not limited to any postings on any websites
16 maintained by Class Counsel; provided, however, that Class Counsel may state that it has settled
17 a class action claim against a company so long as neither Defendant, nor the Plaintiff are
18 identified. In addition, Class Counsel may list the case name, number, and a brief description of
19 the claims in their declarations in support of qualifications as class counsel in future filings.

20 12.4 No Solicitation. The Parties separately agree that they and their respective counsel and
21 employees will not solicit any Class Member to opt out of or object to the Settlement, or appeal
22 from the Judgment. Nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to restrict Class Counsel’s ability
23 to communicate with Class Members in accordance with Defense Counsel’s and Class Counsel’s
24 ethical obligations and Class Counsel’s fiduciary duties owed to Class Members.

25 12.5 Integrated Agreement. Upon execution by all Parties and their counsel, this Agreement
26 together with its attached exhibits shall constitute the entire agreement between the Parties
27 relating to the Settlement, superseding any and all oral representations, warranties, covenants, or
28 inducements made to or by any Party.

1 12.6 Attorney Authorization. Class Counsel and Defense Counsel separately warrant and
2 represent that they are authorized by Plaintiff and Defendant, respectively, to take all appropriate
3 action required or permitted to be taken by such Parties pursuant to this Agreement to effectuate
4 its terms, and to execute any other documents reasonably required to effectuate the terms of this
5 Agreement including any amendments to this Agreement.

6 12.7 Cooperation. The Parties and their counsel will cooperate with each other and use their
7 best efforts, in good faith, to implement the Settlement by, among other things, modifying the
8 Settlement Agreement, submitting supplemental evidence and supplementing points and
9 authorities as requested by the Court. In the event the Parties are unable to agree upon the form
10 or content of any document necessary to implement the Settlement, or on any modification of the
11 Agreement that may become necessary to implement the Settlement, the Parties will seek the
12 assistance of a mediator and/or the Court for resolution.

13 12.8 No Prior Assignments. The Parties separately represent and warrant that they have not
14 directly or indirectly assigned, transferred, encumbered, or purported to assign, transfer, or
15 encumber to any person or entity and portion of any liability, claim, demand, action, cause of
16 action, or right released and discharged by the Party in this Settlement.

17 12.9 No Tax Advice. Neither Plaintiff, Class Counsel, Defendant nor Defense Counsel are
18 providing any advice regarding taxes or taxability, nor shall anything in this Settlement be relied
19 upon as such within the meaning of United States Treasury Department Circular 230 (31 CFR
20 Part 10, as amended) or otherwise.

21 12.10 Modification of Agreement. This Agreement, and all parts of it, may be amended,
22 modified, changed, or waived only by an express written instrument signed by all Parties or their
23 representatives, and approved by the Court.

24 12.11 Agreement Binding on Successors. This Agreement will be binding upon, and inure
25 to the benefit of, the successors of each of the Parties.

26 12.12 Applicable Law. All terms and conditions of this Agreement and its exhibits will be
27 governed by and interpreted according to the internal laws of the state of California, without
28 regard to conflict of law principles.

12.13 Cooperation in Drafting. The Parties have cooperated in the drafting and preparation of this Agreement. This Agreement will not be construed against any Party on the basis that the Party was the drafter or participated in the drafting.

12.14 Confidentiality. To the extent permitted by law, all agreements made, and orders entered during Action and in this Agreement relating to the confidentiality of information shall survive the execution of this Agreement.

12.15 Headings. The descriptive heading of any section or paragraph of this Agreement is inserted for convenience of reference only and does not constitute a part of this Agreement.

12.16 Calendar Days. Unless otherwise noted, all reference to “days” in this Agreement shall be to calendar days. In the event any date or deadline set forth in this Agreement falls on a weekend or federal legal holiday, such date or deadline shall be on the first business day thereafter.

12.17 Notice. All notices, demands, or other communications between the Parties in connection with this Agreement will be in writing and deemed to have been duly given as of the third business day after mailing by United States mail, or the day sent by email or messenger, addressed as follows:

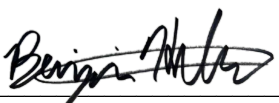

You may be eligible to receive money from an employee class and representative action lawsuit (“Action”) against My Wireless NCC, Inc. (“Defendant”) for alleged wage and hour violations. The Action was filed by former employee, Tamim Hakimzada, and seeks (1) payment of unpaid wages, meal period penalties, rest break penalties, and other relief for a class of current and former non-exempt or hourly-paid employees (“Class Members”) who worked for Defendant in California in such a position at any time during the Class Period (June 27, 2020, through March 12, 2025); and (2) penalties under the California Private Attorneys General Act (“PAGA”) for all Class Members who worked for Defendant in California in a non-exempt or hourly-paid position at any time during the PAGA Period (June 19, 2023, through March 12, 2025) (“Aggrieved Employees”).

Based on Defendant’s records, and the Parties’ current assumptions, **your Individual Class Payment is estimated to be \$ [REDACTED] (less withholding) and your Individual PAGA Payment (if applicable) is estimated to be \$ [REDACTED]**. The actual amount you may receive likely will be different and will depend on a number of factors. (If no amount is stated for your Individual PAGA Payment, then according to Defendant’s records you are not eligible for an Individual PAGA Payment under the Settlement because you didn’t work for Defendant in California in a non-exempt or hourly-paid position during the PAGA Period.)

Defendant's records indicate that you worked for Defendant in California in a non-exempt or hourly-paid position at some point(s) during the Class Period, from June 27, 2020, to March 12, 2025, and are therefore a member of the Class for purposes of this Settlement.

You received this Notice because you have a right to know about a proposed Settlement of the Action, and about all of your options, before the Court decides whether to finally approve the Settlement. The Settlement will resolve all Class Members' claims, which are described below, during the Class Period. The Settlement will also resolve claims for civil penalties brought under PAGA. If you are a Class Member, you are also an Aggrieved Employee if you worked for Defendant in California in a non-exempt or hourly-paid position during the PAGA Period, of June 19, 2023, through March 12, 2025.

If the Court grants Final Approval to the Settlement, a settlement Administrator appointed by the Court will issue the payments provided for by the Settlement to Class Members. You are encouraged to always keep your address up to date with the Administrator (the Administrator's contact information can be found in Section 12, below).

This Notice package explains the allegations and background regarding the lawsuit, the Settlement, your legal rights, what benefits are available, who is eligible for them, and how to receive those benefits.

The Court in charge of the Action is the Santa Clara County Superior Court. The case is titled *Tamim*

Hakimzada v. My Wireless NCC, Inc., Case No. 24CV441948. The person who sued, Tamim Hakimzada, is the Plaintiff, and the company sued, My Wireless NCC, Inc., is the Defendant.

2. WHAT IS THE LAWSUIT ABOUT?

The Plaintiff in the lawsuit alleges wage and hour violations against Defendant for: (1) failure to pay minimum and straight time wages; (2) failure to pay overtime wages; (3) failure to provide meal periods and pay meal period premiums; (4) failure to provide rest periods and pay rest period premiums; (5) failure to pay all wages earned and unpaid at separation; (6) failure to furnish accurate itemized wage statements; (7) failure to indemnify employees for all necessary business expenditures; (8) violation of California's Unfair Competition Law, California Business and Professions Code section 17200, *et seq.*; and (9) civil penalties pursuant to PAGA based on the alleged violations of the California Labor Code listed above (the "Claims"). Defendant denies Plaintiff's Claims and denies any wrongdoing.

3. WHY IS THIS A CLASS ACTION?

In an employment class action, one or more people called "Class Representatives" (in this case, the Plaintiff) sue on behalf of all workers who they contend have similar claims. All of these workers are a Class or Class Members. Bringing one lawsuit, as opposed to many small ones, saves money, time and court resources. The court resolves the issues for all Class Members, except for those who exclude themselves from the Class.

4. WHY IS THERE A SETTLEMENT?

The Court did not decide in favor of the Plaintiff or Defendant on the merits of the claims alleged in the lawsuit. Plaintiff believes Plaintiff would win at trial. Defendant thinks that Plaintiff's lawsuit would not proceed to a trial and/or that Plaintiff would not win at trial. However, there has been no trial. Instead, in acknowledgement of the risk that both Parties face should the case proceed, the Parties have agreed to a negotiated settlement. This way, all Parties avoid the cost of preparing for and conducting a trial, the risk of losing the right to a trial, and the workers affected by the alleged violations receive compensation. The Settlement represents a compromise and settlement of highly disputed claims.

WHO IS INCLUDED IN THE SETTLEMENT?

5. WHO IS INCLUDED IN THE SETTLEMENT?

If you received this Notice, you are a Class Member for settlement purposes. The Class includes: all non-exempt, hourly individuals that worked for Defendant in California in such a position at any time during the Class Period.

6. ARE THERE EXCEPTIONS TO BEING INCLUDED?

You are not a Class Member if you already have resolved the claims asserted in this lawsuit, whether by settlement (including separation agreement) or a separate legal proceeding (i.e., another lawsuit). You may, however, still be entitled to an Individual PAGA Payment if you are an Aggrieved Employee.

THE SETTLEMENT BENEFITS—WHAT YOU GET

7. WHAT DOES THE SETTLEMENT PROVIDE?

Defendant has agreed to pay a Gross Settlement Amount (“Gross Settlement Amount” or “GSA”) of \$230,000.00 to settle the lawsuit. From the GSA, Class Counsel will apply to the Court for attorneys’ fees of one-third (1/3) of the GSA, currently estimated to total \$76,666.66, and reimbursement for reasonable costs (“Litigation Expenses”); an Enhancement Award of \$10,000.00 to the Plaintiff (for Plaintiff’s work and efforts prosecuting this case and Plaintiff’s broader general release); a PAGA Penalties payment of \$15,000.00 to resolve the PAGA claims (“PAGA Penalties”); and Settlement Administration Costs in an amount not to exceed \$6,000.00. The exact amount of the Class Counsel’s Fees and Litigation Expenses, Class Representative Service Payment, and Administration Costs will be determined by the Court at the Final Approval hearing. The remaining portion of the Settlement amount is the “Net Settlement Amount” or the “NSA.” The NSA will be apportioned and paid out as Individual Class Payments to the Settlement Class Members, who are the Class Members that do not request to be excluded (“opt out”) from the Settlement.

PAGA Penalties payment: As part of the PAGA portion of the Settlement, the Parties will ask the Court to approve a \$15,000.00 PAGA Penalties payment in settlement of claims for civil penalties under PAGA. As required under PAGA, 75% of the PAGA Penalties payment, or \$11,250.00, will be paid to the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency. The remaining 25% of the PAGA Penalties payment, or \$3,750.00, will be distributed to the Aggrieved Employees as Individual PAGA Payments.

8. HOW MUCH WILL MY PAYMENT BE?

An approximation of your Individual Class Payment appears on the first page of this Notice. If you are also an Aggrieved Employee, an approximation of your Individual PAGA Payment will also appear on the first page of this Notice.

Individual Class Payment: Your Individual Class Payment is based on the number Workweeks you worked, as represented in Defendant’s records, in comparison to the total number of Workweeks worked by all Class Members during the Class Period. Sixty-seven percent (67%) of each Class Member’s Individual Class Payment will be treated as a payment in settlement of the alleged claims for civil and statutory penalties and interest on unpaid wages and any other non-wage related amount, if any, which will be reported on an IRS Form 1099 by the Settlement Administrator. Thirty-three percent (33%) of each Class Member’s Individual Class Payment will be treated as a payment in settlement of alleged claims for unpaid wages. The 33% allocated as unpaid wages will be reduced by applicable payroll tax withholdings and deductions and reported on an IRS Form W-2.

Individual PAGA Payment: If you are also an Aggrieved Employee, you will receive an Individual PAGA Payment in addition to your Individual Class Payment. The Individual PAGA Payments are based on the number of PAGA Pay Periods worked by each Aggrieved Employee in comparison to the total amount of PAGA Pay Periods worked by all Aggrieved Employees during the PAGA Period. One hundred percent (100%) of each Aggrieved Employees’ Individual PAGA Payment will be characterized as penalties and will not be reduced by payroll tax withholdings and deductions. The Individual PAGA Payment will be reported on an IRS Form 1099 by the Settlement Administrator. An approximation of

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your anticipated Individual PAGA Payment appears on the first page of this Notice.

For the Class Members who are also Aggrieved Employees, their Individual Class Payment will be combined with their Individual PAGA Payment, and they will receive a single check for the combined payments. If a Class Member chooses to opt-out of the Settlement, they will still receive an Individual PAGA Payment, as Aggrieved Employees cannot opt-out of the PAGA portion of the Settlement. *See, e.g., Robinson v So. County Oil*, 53 Cal. App. 476 (2020).

HOW YOU GET A PAYMENT

9. HOW DO I RECEIVE A PAYMENT?

You do not need to do anything to receive a payment. However, if you believe that the number of Workweeks or PAGA Pay Periods you worked is incorrect, please correct it and provide any supporting evidence to the settlement Administrator, whose contact information is listed in Section 12 below.

10. WHEN WOULD I GET MY PAYMENT?

The Court will hold a Final Fairness Hearing on [REDACTED], to decide whether to approve the Settlement. If the Judge approves the Settlement, and anyone objects, there may be appeals. It is always uncertain when these objections and appeals can be resolved and resolving them can take time. If there is no objection, the Effective Date of the Settlement will be the date of entry of the Court's Order granting final approval.

Following the Effective Date and the Court's approval of the Settlement becoming final, including resolution of any appeals, Individual Class Payments and Individual PAGA Payments will be mailed to Participating Class Members and Aggrieved Employees after the Settlement is fully funded, which will not occur until approximately 28 days after the Effective Date.

Settlement checks should be cashed promptly upon receipt. Proceeds of checks which remain uncashed after 180 days from the date of issuance will be voided, and the funds will irrevocably be lost to you because they will be paid to a court-approved non-profit organization or foundation. If your settlement check is lost or misplaced, you should contact the Settlement Administrator immediately to request a replacement. If your check is already void, you will have no way to recover the money.

11. WHAT AM I GIVING UP TO GET A PAYMENT?

If the Court approves this Settlement and unless you exclude yourself, you will become a Participating Class Member, and that means that you cannot sue, continue to sue, or be part of any other lawsuit against Defendant concerning the legal claims being resolved in this Settlement. Specifically, you will be giving up or "releasing" the Released Class Claims described below against Defendant, and its former and present owners, parents, subsidiaries, and all of its current and former officers, directors, members, managers, employees, consultants, partners, shareholders, joint venturers, agents, successors, assigns, accountants, insurers, or legal representatives ("Released Parties"). The releases become effective once the GSA is fully funded by Defendant.

Released Class Claims: All Participating Class Members will waive and release the Released Parties from any and all claims, causes of action, damages, wages, benefits, expenses, penalties, debts, liabilities, demands, obligations, attorneys' fees, costs, and any other form of relief or remedy in law, equity, or whatever kind of nature, arising from the claims pled or could have been pled in the Action and any claims based on facts alleged in the Operative Complaint, including all claims for failure to pay for all hours worked, failure to pay overtime wages, meal period violations, rest break violations, failure to pay minimum wage, failure to pay straight time wages, wages not timely paid upon termination, non-compliant wages statements, failure to reimburse necessary business expenses, and unlawful business practices under the California Labor Code and/or the California Business and Professions Code, including all claims for restitution or equitable relief, liquidated damages, penalties of any nature whatsoever, attorneys' fees and costs, asserted or that might have been asserted by any Class Member against the Released Parties based on the facts or claims alleged in the Action during the Class Period. This includes claims meeting the above definition(s) under any and all applicable statutes, including without limitation California Labor Code sections §§ 201, 202, 203, 204, 226, 226.7, 510, 512, 558, 1174, 1194.2, 1197, 1198, 2800, 2802; the California Unfair Competition Law, and in particular, California Bus. and Prof. Code §§ 17200 et seq, as well as the applicable Industrial Welfare Commission Wage Orders.

Released PAGA Claims: All Aggrieved Employees, including Non-Participating Class Members who are Aggrieved Employees, and the State of California will release and discharge all claims for civil penalties under PAGA arising during the PAGA Period that were alleged in Plaintiff's PAGA Notice dated June 19, 2024 to the LWDA or that could have been alleged by Plaintiff based on the factual allegations asserted in the PAGA Notice.

EXCLUDING YOURSELF FROM THE SETTLEMENT

12. HOW DO I EXCLUDE MYSELF FROM THE SETTLEMENT?

To exclude yourself from the Settlement, you must send the Settlement Administrator a written and signed request for exclusion which must be postmarked no later than 45 days after Class Notice is mailed. Be sure to include your name, address, and telephone number, and any other information you think would be helpful to the settlement Administrator to identify you. If you ask to be excluded from the Settlement, you will not be legally bound by anything that happens in the Action, except as it relates to settlement of the PAGA claim. If you ask to be excluded from the Settlement you will not be able to object to the Settlement and you will not receive an Individual Class Payment, but you will still receive an Individual PAGA Payment if you worked for Defendant during the PAGA Period. If you ask to be excluded, you may be able to sue (or continue to sue) Defendant in the future.

13. IF I DON'T EXCLUDE MYSELF, CAN I SUE DEFENDANT FOR THE SAME THING LATER?

No. Unless you exclude yourself, you give up any right to sue Defendant for the claims that this Settlement resolves. If you have a pending lawsuit, speak to your lawyer in that case immediately. You must exclude yourself from this Class to continue your own lawsuit. Remember, the exclusion deadline is 45 days after Class Notice is mailed.

14. IF I EXCLUDE MYSELF, CAN I GET MONEY FROM THIS SETTLEMENT?

Only if you are an Aggrieved Employee. Aggrieved Employees cannot opt-out of the PAGA portion of the Settlement, so they will receive their portion of the PAGA Penalties even if they exclude themselves from the rest of the Settlement. *See, e.g., Robinson v So. County Oil*, 53 Cal. App. 476 (2020). However, if you timely exclude yourself from the Settlement, you will not receive any of the Net Settlement Amount and you will retain the right to pursue your own legal action against Defendant for violations other than the Released PAGA Claims described above, if you desire.

16. HOW WILL THE LAWYERS BE PAID?

Class Counsel will ask the Court to approve \$76,666.66 (or one-third of the GSA) for attorneys' fees incurred in investigating the facts, litigating the case, and negotiating the Settlement. Class Counsel will also seek Court-approval of reasonable litigation expenses incurred in this matter. The Court may award Class Counsel less than what they request. Class Counsel will also ask the Court to approve a payment to Plaintiff in the amount of \$10,000.00 in addition to Plaintiff's Individual Class Payment and Individual PAGA Payment for the initiative, risk, time, and energy Plaintiff has spent in service to the Class as the Class Representative and as compensation for Plaintiff's broader general release. The Court may award a

Class Representative less than what is requested. If the Court awards Class Counsel and/or Plaintiff less than what they request, the difference between what is requested and what is awarded will be added to the Net Settlement Amount.

You can and have the right to tell the Court you do not agree with the Settlement or some part of it.

17. HOW DO I TELL THE COURT THAT I OBJECT TO THE SETTLEMENT?

If you don't think the Settlement is fair, you can object to some or all of the Settlement. 18. WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN OBJECTING AND REQUESTING EXCLUSION?

Objecting is simply telling the Court that you do not agree with something about the Settlement. You can object only if you stay in the Class.

Requesting exclusion is telling the Court that you do not want to be part of the Class. If you exclude yourself, you have no basis to object because the case no longer affects you, and you do not get any money from this Settlement. If you submit both an objection and a request to be excluded from the settlement, the request to be excluded will control and you will not get any money from this settlement.

THE COURT'S FAIRNESS HEARING

The Court will hold a Final Approval Hearing to decide whether to approve the Settlement. You may attend and you may ask to speak, but you don't have to.

SETTLEMENT?

The Court will hold a Final Approval Hearing at 1:30 p.m. on January 13, 2027, in Department 5 of the Santa Clara County Superior Court located at 161 North First Street, San Jose, CA 95113, to determine whether the Settlement should be finally approved as fair, reasonable, and adequate. If there are objections, the Court will consider them at that time. The Court will also be asked to approve the requests for the Class Representative Service Payment and the Class Counsel Fees and Litigation Expenses Payments.

20. DO I HAVE TO COME TO THE HEARING?

No. Class Counsel will answer questions the Court may have. However, you are welcome to attend. If you send an objection, you do not have to come to the Court to talk about it. As long as you mailed your written objection to the settlement administrator on time, the Court will consider it. You may also pay your own lawyer to attend, but it is not necessary.

Class members may appear at the Final Approval Hearing in person or remotely using the link for Department 5 (Afternoon Session) and should review the remote appearance instructions beforehand:

Class members who wish to appear remotely are encouraged to contact class counsel at least three days before the hearing, if possible, so that potential technology or audibility issues can be avoided or minimized.

IF YOU DO NOTHING

21. WHAT IF I DO NOTHING AT ALL?

If you do nothing, you will receive a Settlement payment, and you will be bound by the terms of Settlement, which means that you will not be able to start a lawsuit, continue a lawsuit, or be a part of any other lawsuit against the Defendant about the legal issues in the Action.
